Another highlight was the day and a half of working in the clinic providing free consultations by the three doctors in our delegation (George Bunch, Kent Imai and Tim Friedrichs), physical therapy by Mitch Ronning, and dispensing medications by Jill and Wayne Adachi. Other members who helped in the clinic were Lisa Johnson from St. Stephen's, Vera Hope, Sarah Macway, David and Weston Gomez from Trinity Presbyterian and Walker Jones, Lisa's nephew who attends Pitzer. Lee Duffus from Trinity helped with crowd control. Mike Crudas and Tom Dunham applied fluoride treatments to about 90 children while Marie Imai and Emily Duffus entertained the children and their parents with games and bubble wands.

First time members (Kent, Marie, Vera, and Wayne) as well as previous delegation members met and spent quality time with their prayer child. During meal time in the homes of our prayer children, we learned about the life experiences of our host/hostess. We all felt a little closer to our Salvadoran family as our relationships deepen and we promised to keep them in our prayers and visit again, Dios quiere. (God willing). It was difficult to say our good-bye's.

The January delegation will participate in the scholarship awards and take pictures for us to enjoy upon their return. They will also hold VBS in a couple of different communities. The theme of VBS is 'The Good Samaritan' and the craft project will be Friendship Bracelet's and decorating picture frames with photos of each individual participate.

We look forward to sharing more stories with you in the near future. Thank you for your continued support of our work in El Salvador.

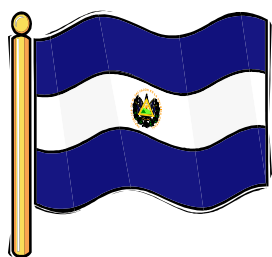
***“Administer true justice;

There were so many things going on in Advent - children showing us the Christmas Story in costume and bringing good news to those in jail with Christmas goodie bags, the dedication of new finely crafted Chrismons (Christ - Monograms) and the beautiful symbols they bring to our worship life as they adorn our tree, adult forums that deepen our appreciation of our fellow churchgoers faith journeys and our worship life together, TWO pilgrimages to visit our sister parish in El Salvador and the sharing of medical and other skills and abilities with a people who have little health care, 75 Christmas gifts and hand-knitted warming things for migrant farmworker children on our North Coast who live in drafty and inadequate housing, work towards a new Live Oak Family Resource Center facility nearing completion, beginning work with COPA toward a new Youth Center at Shoreline Middle School that will at least duplicate the Boys and Girls Club facility and program downtown, continued COPA work toward an expanded Sheriff’s Activity League that gives many youth and children alternative and positive choices, role models and expectations through various free sports programs, continued work and expanded vision towards meeting the needs of seniors in our community by providing affordable housing on our land...It’s been an amazing Advent which will lead to an even more amazing Epiphany season! You are the Light of Christ!!!

Homeless Service Center**

Council Highlights

1. Our devotions centered around reflecting on Luke 2:19 “And Mary pondered all of these things in her heart”. We took some time to remember the words of the hymn “O Little Town of Bethlehem” - ‘How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given.’ This led us to spend some time in silent prayer with one another as we pondered in our hearts what it means to be the least anxious person around as leaders in the church. We asked God to make known God’s gifts to us so that we could become gifts to others.
2. We approved a new three-year lease with Growing Years preschool at the same rate of \$1500 per month and a third of all utilities. People cited the fact that the preschool serves low-income families and special needs children as reasons to renew our relationship at the same rates. These are unique aspects of the preschool that are rare in Santa Cruz County and they coincide with the mission of our church. Also, enrollment has been flat and tuition has been lowered to stay even with the preschool that opened up adjacent to the church.
3. A balanced budget for 2011 was approved by the council to be presented to the congregation with very little changes from last year.
4. Pledges form our Stewardship emphasis increased from 42 to 52 (50% of households) this year and also increased by about \$14,000 over last year for a total of @\$126,000.
5. We will vote on the Option to Lease Agreement with Mid-Peninsula Housing Corp. (non-profit) at our Congregational meeting Jan. 30th. This will move us into the planning phase of building 27-30 units of affordable senior housing on our vacant lot.

This kind of behavior is also possible when it comes to giving. We might like to convey the impression that we are “good givers,” and we might be reasonably successful in our efforts since other people usually do not actually “see” our financial situation and our giving. However, if we are trying to say one thing and do another concerning our giving to the Lord, we will be confronted by our deception every time we look at the register in our checkbook. Here’s why: Our checkbook will quickly and methodically strip away our pretense. We can deceive others; we can even deceive ourselves in many areas of life, but our checkbook always tells the truth about what is really important to us.

The Apostle Paul summed up this matter with this statement: the testimony of our conscience should be that “. . . we have behaved in the world with . . . godly sincerity, not by earthly wisdom but by the grace of God” (2 Cor. 1:12). In other words, by walking in holiness and sincerity that God provides in response to our obedience, what we do will match what we say, including in the area of giving.

Think about it: If your checkbook could talk, what would it say about you and about your giving to the work of the Lord at St. Stephen’s Lutheran Church? Would it testify that you are walking in holiness and sincerity in your giving, or would it have a different story to tell?



WHY OUR OFFERINGS ARE IMPORTANT

“Faithful Stewards of God’s Infinite Grace”

Nobody likes a hypocrite. The idea of someone saying that we should all be a certain way, and then they themselves doing the exact opposite, immediately turns us off. We have no respect for such people and we consequently reject whatever it was that they were saying.

We see this in the political realm frequently when a certain candidate promises to govern in a certain way and then faced with certain circumstances does not deliver on that promise. We also see it in the church. Church leaders have in been caught in various scandals that are in direct opposition with what they may have been saying others ought or ought not to do.

When it comes to the Christian life, sometimes we, too, say one thing and do another. We receive the grace of God freely and are loved by God unconditionally, but sometimes find it hard to be gracious and loving toward others. We pretend that everything is going well with us and put on a happy face when we really may be going through a difficult personal time and need the support of the church community. Instead of being honest, seeking out others, and coming to worship more regularly, we drift away and convince ourselves that nobody really cares and that we’re too busy to be in church. And sometimes we pretend to love other Christians, when, in reality, we can’t stand some of them.

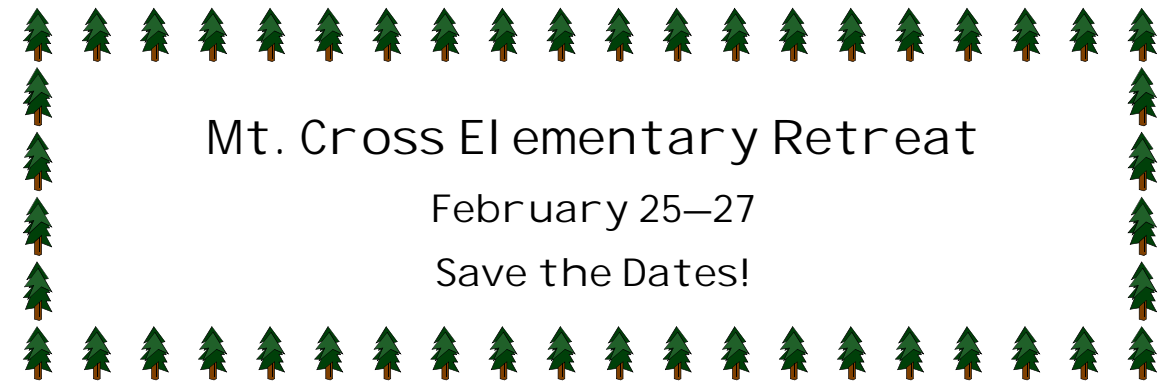

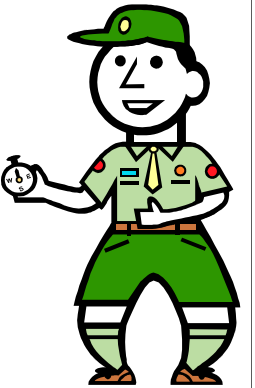
