Ruth & Mike Cruddas: the reason for the date for this particular delegation was for them to see the graduation of their prayer child Karla – a young woman with whom they have had a relationship since 1998. Obviously, seeing her cross the stage was extremely moving. For Mike, the graduation ceremony in general was a highlight; all these years of supporting children through school, and now to actually see a graduation was really exciting. For Ruth, the health clinic was an unexpected experience since she did not expect to participate in it. However, on the first day she spent 3-4 hours painting teeth of young children with fluoride – and the magnitude of teeth damaged by decay and the general poor oral health of children so young could not be called a highlight but was the most eyeopening experience of the trip. There is no question that we will start advocating for regular visits from the Salvadoran dental community!

Chris & Kent Madsen: Our highlights turned out to be very similar (maybe not so surprising after 22 years of marriage?). The graduation was a highlight. Besides those youth graduating from High School, there were youth graduating from ninth grade, and children "graduating" from preschool and kindergarten. We were very proud to see our prayer child Walter graduate from ninth grade, knowing he plans the 3-year High School path. (High School is normally two years, but Ungo has a 3rd year that is Vocational training). Another highlight was a quiet-time talk we had with Walter. He wanted to know what our daily life is like. This may not seem at all significant, but this is the first time in 15 years anyone has asked us anything about our lives. To us, this was a major step forward in trust and our relationship. We also agreed that sharing this experience and watching first-time delegates get involved is always a treat. This year, being able to share this experience with our goddaughter Ariana was a very special experience.

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El Salvador Sister Parish News

The November 2009 delegation to El Salvador, our thirteenth since starting in 1994, is now history — and what a delegation it was!

The 24 delegation members returned home Saturday, November 28. The time we spent with the people of the ciudadela Guillermo Ungo was filled with lots of activities — but also much love and emotion. We heard and saw messages of hope, from the worship service on our arrival day, to the moving graduation ceremony, to the awarding of 2010 scholarships, and finally, to the message from Bishop Medardo Gomez of the Salvadoran Lutheran Synod.

There were several firsts on this trip. We held our first clinic days (two of them) where many children and adults were seen by the medical personnel who were part of the delegation -- two doctors, a chiropractor, a physical therapist, two nurses and a nursing assistant. We also had the first movie night. We scheduled two childrens' activity times in addition to the major craft project. Due to the size of the delegation, we split into two groups for many of the meals. This meant that more families could be visited at mealtime. We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who con-tributed time, money or gifts to help make this delegation special.

We spent most of the delegation time in the community (six days) and had a short time in San Salvador on the last full day. Most of us visited some of the important historical sites in the city, while a smaller group visited the San Salvador volcano. Our delegation closed with Bishop Medardo Gomez, his wife Pastor Abelina Gomez and Pastor Martir Vigil sharing their thoughts with us after dinner. Now, we have returned to our daily reality here on the central coast of California, our memories rich with the sights, sounds and experiences of El Salvador.

Some highlights follow. The observations of the other delegates from

persistence and promises. Living close to the Animal Shelter helped considerably, as did Rachel's becoming old enough to finally volunteer there (with parent only). Cali (1 yr. old retriever mix) had been there 2 months and scared potential owners off because of her energy. Fortunately for her she found owners who needed more excuses to get out and walk around the neighborhood and beach more often. This is especially true now that one 45 yr. old person (arthritic hip, repaired ACL and all), can no longer play as much pick-up basketball on concrete as he may want to.

Not only does our new dog bring me physical health benefits, but all that walking provides plenty of time for spiritual reflection as well. It happens both in silence and through the many people I talk to when we're out and about. Specifically, I spoke with one woman who used to attend a Lutheran church as a girl. She was hurt by the fact that as a young girl she was allowed to acolyte but not allowed to go behind the altar. This was reserved for boy acolytes only. The final straw, however, came when she married and got her first dog. She had not been allowed to have a pet in her family as a child. As a huge animal-lover she was ecstatic and brought her dog to church one Sunday and asked her pastor to bless the dog. He promptly refused and walked away.

I was glad to have the opportunity to share the good news that she would find nothing like that at our church. She has recently been thinking about coming back to church so our encounter was good timing. She may not actually ever come, but she did ask ME about when our services were! That <u>never</u> happens.

The point is, we need to remember that we are the light of the world. Sometimes the church has participated in creating the darkness that keeps people against organized religion. We are called to SHINE the light of God's grace that is so often hidden by our own fears and inaction.

The season of Epiphany encourages us to be out there in the world, outside of our familiar territories (like the Magi) sharing our gifts so the world may see the Light. Let's remember that we really do have a lot of good news to share about our church and that people may just be waiting for us to tell them about it!

<u>Council Highlights</u>

- Devotions reminded us that we are the "light of the world" as the living Body of Christ-the church. We welcomed the Light in the Christ child, but now WE have that light and are called to shine it in the places of darkness in our world.
- Pastor Jim received a draft Letter of Intent from Jan Lindenthal of Mid-Peninsula Housing Corporation. Our Field Task Force will now review it and work on a final draft to begin a more formal working relationship. We will also begin working with the COPA Housing Strategy Team to begin planning our approach to the County Planning Department and Supervisor Leopold for approval for 27 units of affordable senior housing on our field.
- We have received about 40 pledges for a total of \$113,000 in commitments to God for our ministry through our church. This represents about 30% of our households. Follow-up will be taking place during January.

Why Our Offerings Are Important: "Empowered by God — Responding by Grace"

A Christian business owner once observed, "I would rather do business with a non-Christian any day than with a Christian." His statement was a descriptive commentary on a sad state in the lives of some Christians who fail to pay their bills or to deal with their debts as promised.

A debt simply represents a promise to pay. Nothing more. Nothing less. Whether the debt is to purchase a car, a house, braces for the kids' teeth, or to facilitate a purchase by using a credit card, the issue is the same. By creating a debt, we also create simultaneously an obligation and promise to pay.

Larry Burkett wrote this, "To define debt is not simple, but basically, it's an obligation to pay that can't be kept. . . . Probably forty percent of all American families are in debt in a typical year. They're unable to make the monthly payments on the money they borrowed. Many actually borrow more money to make payments on the money they've already borrowed."

We who are Christians — of all people — should pay our debts, not only for our reputations and personal integrity, but also because what we do is a direct reflection on our Lord. Or as the Apostle Paul expressed it so clearly in 1 Thessalonians 4:11-12, we are to behave properly towards people who are outside the family of God and outside His church.

Psalm 37:21 says that to borrow (to create a debt) and then not repay it is wrong. But on a positive note, this same verse also says that the person who is righteous shows mercy by repaying debts and by giving to the needs of others.

By the way, do people know you're a Christian by how you pay your bills and by how you give to others?
