

huge success and is very much appreciated by parents, students, and teachers, we also have the following programs:

- University Scholarships each year the graduating students have to decide whether their family can afford for them to go on to college or return to work in the fields to help support the family. We currently provide partial scholarships for 10 students. The annual cost for a student to attend the National University is \$1,200. We are encouraging vocational schools also.
- Health Clinic Dr. Roxana Orellana is new to the clinic as of February. When we met with her during our August visit, we were thrilled to learn that she has some great ideas about the clinic and is putting together her vision and plan for 2011. For the past two years we have been able to provide \$10,500 annually in support of the clinic. What we are able to give them depends on our ability to raise funds beyond the scholarship needs.
- The Lutheran Church in El Salvador we continue to meet with Bishop Medardo Gomez during each delegation. This past summer the Bishop of our Synod, Mark Holmerud, experienced life in El Salvador and expressed his appreciation for the work being done there. Our goal for this year is \$1,000.
- OTC Medications and 'Health Kit' I tems Needed antihistamines, ibuprofen, acetaminophen, antibiotic creams, toothbrushes, toothpaste, bar of soap, washcloths, combs. I tems can be placed in the blue basket located in the Narthex.

(I will share more about my sabbatical on Sun. Oct.10 at 9:30 am in the Fireside Rm.)



At our first council meeting since my return from a 3 month sabbatical, I led devotions that centered around Luke 16:19-31 and an article from The Christian Century. The article was reminding us that the human brain is changing the way it functions with the onset of

so much electronic technology so quickly in our culture. In the scripture reading, the story of the rich man's wanting to warn his five brothers NOT to neglect the things of God, has implications for how we are so easily distracted from the things of God and our faith.

The article by Harvard Divinity School professor Stephanie Paulsell, outlined how it is being scientifically proven that the very neural pathways of our brains are adapting to our new technologies by bypassing the parts of the brain we use for contemplation, reflection and expressing our faith and integrating our beliefs into our lives.

My sabbatical time also confirmed this in my own experience and was valuable beyond measure as a way to increase my capability for "sustained attention" to matters of the heart and spirit. I was stunned by how much of a difference it made to my mind and spirit to be unplugged from modern life for extended periods of time in the Alaskan wilderness with my son Kyle. Kyle also found the time to be invaluable as a way of being able to process and reflect on the profound experience of traveling with the Synod Youth Committee to our other sister Synod in Rwanda. Looking back he said, "Being able to have that kind of slower, quieter time in Alaska was exactly what I needed after the intense experience of Rwanda. I'm not sure I could have re-entered modern life very well".

Things have and are changing very rapidly. Even our brains are having to adapt in unprecedented ways. The result is that human beings capacity for faith and "sustained attention" to matters of the spirit is being diminished and bypassed. Is that what we want? In this particular time, being an active part of your church may be more important than it has ever been. Participating regularly in worship and the ministry we offer are wonderful, re-focusing and attention-sustaining experiences that draw us nearer to our true source of life and energize our spirits for a fuller life as God intended.

I am so glad to be with you in these endeavors and am so blessed to have been given the time to experience them myself. THANKYOU!

Council Highlights

1. Rev. Herb Schmidt was asked to attend the beginning of the meeting so that the council could formally thank him for his service as pastor while Pastor Jim was on a sabbatical. He was presented with a leather organizer and card signed by all. Pastor Herb thanked the council for the opportunity to serve and said he felt like having this time helped him heal from his severe bout with the shingles. He then encouraged us to join with other local churches in sponsoring a community-wide seminar on the topic of "Jesus, Politics and Empire" which will bring two of the leading biblical scholars on the Gospels to Santa Cruz in March.

2. Pastor Jim reported that he has been elected as Treasurer of the Mt. Cross Board. He asked for prayers for the camp as they had a very low summer and received \$66,000 less summer income than anticipated. Also the camp's reserves have been spent down by @ 25% in one year. Fortunately, the reserves are still healthy and there are some large retreat groups this Fall.

Why Our Offerings Are Important

"Empowered by God-Responding by Grace"

In 1935, Dr. R. A. Forrest, president of Toccoa Falls College in Georgia, embarked on a trip to visit former students who were serving the Lord on the mission field. R. G. LeTourneau, a prominent Christian businessman, heard him speak in Omaha and was very encouraged by what he heard. The night before Dr. Forrest sailed to Japan, a letter arrived at his hotel containing a check from Mr. LeTourneau for \$1,000. Mr. LeTourneau thought it would be nice if Dr. Forrest "had some money in his pocket as he went around the world to give to folks in a tough spot."

Dr. Forrest was elated and kept a detailed accounting of how he used that money to minister to people in need. When he returned to New York, he mailed the records to Mr. LeTourneau. A few days later, a reply came from Mr. LeTourneau that simply read, "Come see me." When Dr. Forrest arrived at Mr. LeTourneau's office in Peoria, he found a man who was deeply moved by Dr. Forrest's record of changed lives. He said, "If you can be trusted with \$1,000 and make that kind of impact, you can be trusted with \$10,000" and gave him a check in that amount.

Dr. Forrest had received "without payment," and he gave "without payment" (Matt. 10:8). He typified the kind of giving that God expects each of us to demonstrate as we respond to His good gifts by giving back to Him what was rightfully His in the first place.



The Church Council is considering a capital projects campaign in conjunction with the possible agreement with Mid-Peninsula Housing to develop 25-27 affordable senior housing units St. Stephens property.
