

meeting with the Bishop on several of our visits to El Salvador. He has asked us through the years to do three things:

#1. Pray for us, and support us politically

#2. Keep coming back and bring your Bishop

#3. Come work in the communities

On the November delegation during dinner at one of our prayer children's homes, Sandra the mother told us the story of how she ended up in a refugee camp. The camp was for children whose parents were killed or missing, the camp was run by Bishop Gomez.

Bishop Gomez will be one of the honored guests at this year's Synod Assembly this May, I encourage you all to attend and hear his story.

While visiting Suchitoto (the closest big town) a few years ago we met a man named Frank Cummings. He is a retired professor who lives in Suchitoto and has been working to develop scholarships and workshops for high school students from the campo so that they can be successful in technical schools or university. He is also on the board of directors of our dear friend Sister Peggy's Centro Arte para la Paz. In January we officially established a relationship with the Centro working directly with Frank and sister Peggy to provide guidance and counseling for our university scholarship students so that they may be more prepared. During last November's delegation sister Peggy spoke about God being the God of gaps, that we are ALL called upon to help fill those widening gaps, the rich and the poor, the strong and the weak, the healthy and the sick. By building and deepening our relationships with others, with our prayer children and their families, innkeepers, retired school teachers, crazy nuns and our own community here at home, we are living Gods intention.

El Salvador Sister Parish News

I keep thinking about one of the readings from that first Sunday in Lent. How we human beings are formed with the utmost care, that to be in relationship with the creator, creation and especially, with one another is God's purpose for us all. Our visits to that very small country of

El Salvador and our prayer children and their families help to remind us of this purpose. Through our many visits we have developed relationships not only with the families of our prayer children, but with many of the people we have met while planning the logistics of our visits. Damian is one of those people. He and his wife have been our innkeepers for the past several years while we are in San Salvador. It is only in the last few years that we have discovered his true identity! This quiet, unassuming man had been a leader in the rebel forces during the civil war. Then we found out that he lived in the Guazapa mountains of our sister community and that many, if not all of the former combatants in the ciudadela, know Damian. Damian is still our innkeeper and an elected member of the new assembly. I encourage everyone to come hear his story:

Lecture by Damian Alegria Thursday, April 7, 6:30—8:00 pm Trinity Presbyterian Church.

Another important relationship is that with the Bishop of the Salvadoran Lutheran Church (he is also President, Lutheran Churches in Central America and Panama) Bishop Gomez's commitment to defending human rights in El Salvador has made him a repeat nominee for the Nobel Peace Prize. During the Salvadoran Civil War, Bishop Gomez received numerous death threats and was detained and tortured. According to Bishop Gomez, the persecution of the Salvadoran Lutheran Church stirred him to greater faith in the power of the gospel of peace, and to a deeper public engagement of the church in favor of the poor. He continues to lead the church as it speaks for the voiceless people of society (Perkins School of Theology, SMU 03/15/11). We have had the

<u>Council Highlights</u>

1. These past few weeks have been filled with meetings and strategy to try and secure funding for a much-needed Youth Center in our community of Live Oak. An amazing coalition came together thanks initially to the vision and strategy of the Community Safety Team of COPA. Three years ago COPA formed its Shared Prosperity Agenda after months of House Meetings and Individual Meetings and conversations about what the pressures and needs are in our community. It became clear that one of the strongest ideas was for a Youth Center to be built in Live Oak.

This idea was seen as an essential piece in making the community safer because it addresses the prevention aspect. By giving youth and children affordable alternative activities and role models, they will make better decisions and have more positive relationships that hold them accountable to those better decisions.

We began by meeting with the Director of the Boys and Girls Club to form a relationship that would lead to future collaboration with the Live Oak School District who would generously provide the land for the Youth Center on the Shoreline Middle School campus. They put together a top-notch proposal that would cost \$13 million and serve over 200 kids a day. Then the Governor proposed raiding our local redevelopment funds to help balance the State budget. Initially the Supervisors only allocated \$2 million for a Youth Center. But after meeting with them individually and speaking at their public meetings, we were able to get a commitment of \$5 million for the Youth Center!

This will go a long way to fulfilling our mission as a congregation that "serves others with acceptance and love" as we provide hope for a new generation in our church's neighborhood.

A gentleman known as "Chaplain McCabe" was seeking to raise a million dollars for missions. In his quest, he often struggled with discouragement and disappointment as he encountered tight-fisted Christians who refused to give to God. One day, while going through the mail, he came across a tattered note from a young boy. As far as we know, no one forced that young boy to give all he had or even to write a letter. No one pressured him to part with his nickel. He did so willingly because somewhere in the recesses of his heart, he had decided to do so.

As you consider the St. Stephen's Lutheran Church ministry and all that takes place in and through our church for God's glory, will you do the same? Will you give "not reluctantly or under compulsion," but willingly from the heart, with the full realization that "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7)?

WHY OUR OFFERINGS ARE IMPORTANT

"Faithful Stewards of God's Infinite Grace"

"Coercion" is action which makes us do something, usually by force or threat or punishment. For example, the threat of a ticket or the fine which results causes us to regularly check our speed when driving. We are "coerced" into obeying the law, whether we want to or not.

Some people give to God because of coercion. They envision God as a glorified "bully" who is seeking to extract from them some of their hard-earned money. They reason, however incorrectly, that if they fail to give to God, then somehow, divine punishment will result.

That concept is totally foreign to the Scriptures. In fact, as the Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthian church, God wants us to give not because we have to, out of fear, or because we are required to do so. Rather, God's desire is for us to give because we want to, because we have decided in our hearts to give in a manner which makes our giving something to be richly enjoyed.

Search the Scriptures from Genesis to Revelation, and you will discover God's universal principle concerning giving: Give willingly from the heart. Not because someone is "coercing" you to give. Not because in a moment of emotional duress you made a commitment to give. Not because you desire to avoid punishment or discipline. Give because you want to, because you've decided in your heart to give.

Message from our Bishop...

I couldn't believe my eyes. We watched in horror as the tsunami struck Japan within minutes of the massive quake.

Images from a few years ago of a similar event in Sumatra came to mind, it was hard to imagine anything but that a tremendous loss of life would follow. Fears have become a reality, and now there is the threat of a nuclear disaster as well. Thousands are dead, tens of thousands are missing, and millions are without shelter, food, water and power.

Pr. Brian Deckinger of Trinity Lutheran in Pleasanton, our synod's disaster response coordinator, was on the phone, checking in with pastors and congregational leaders in coastal towns of our synod to determine what, if any, resources might be needed for assistance. According to some reports, it's likely we will be facing a disaster of our own at some point in the not-too-distant future. Will we be ready?

In the event that a disaster would strike in our synod, Pr. Brian and others will be available to contact those affected by fires, floods, earthquakes and even tsunamis. Networks of short-wave radio operators, mobile phones, text messaging and other means will be utilized to keep lines of communication open, and to try to bring assistance where needed. Our being as prepared as possible to deal with such a disaster is vital.

The ELCA Disaster Response, which over the last year has been a part of \$12.5 million in relief to Haiti, is now receiving donations to help alleviate the suffering of those who have lost everything in Japan - loved ones, homes, their lives as they knew them. You have already been helping through your previous gifts to the ELCA - we are already on the scene! You can offer additional help by logging on to www.elca.org. **100%** of donations made for the "Pacific Earthquake and Tsunami" will be used to respond to this disaster - NO administrative expenses will be taken from these donations.

<u>Camp and College Scholarships Available!</u>

Every year St. Stephen's Lutheran Church awards camp and college scholarships to members of our congregation and other well deserving individuals associated with the church. Camp scholarships are for the 50% of the amount of registration for the camp. College scholarships are awarded to those enrolled in junior colleges, 4 year colleges, and seminaries.
