

#### News from Lutheran Campus Ministry of Monterey Bay

#### **Council Highlights**

- 1. Devotions were in the form of a time of silent prayer. During the Blue Christmas worship service Sun. evening, Dec. 18, Pastor Jim invited everyone into a time of silent prayer after some music and reflections had been shared. It was then that the power of the Holy Spirit was felt as the sighs and tears and the unburdening of grief and loss took place. Sometimes we need to be silent in the presence of God to prepare the way for God to speak to us and come into our lives.
- 2. The Annual Meeting agenda was formed and will include motions to begin our own preschool, allow Mid-Pen to pay for an attorney of our choice as we move into the ground lease, and engage the services of Kairos Inc. to assist us in a capital fund campaign in the coming year to complete our 5 year plan.
- 3. The 3 people nominated for church council are: Leanne Salandro, Kathy Allen and Mark Linder. We thank Paul Powers, Don Smawley and Scott Medling for their faithful service as they leave the council.
- 4. Tom Eagle presented a budget for 2012 for everything except the pastor's compensation. The Synod has a new formula for salary guidelines that is more accurately reflective of the cost-of-living in the area that a pastor may be serving in. This formula points out that we have been significantly underpaying our pastor whom we have had for 15 years. The Executive Comm. is meeting to address the discrepancy and make a proposal to the congregation.

#### TAKING OUR OFFERING SERIOUSLY

#### **Applying Bible Principles**

As we saw recently, our giving is to be done in secret. That kind of giving causes our Heavenly Father, who sees in secret, to reward us openly. If we draw attention to ourselves and to our giving, we will receive the praise of other people, but unfortunately, that praise then becomes all the reward we will receive.

But the Apostle Paul describes generous giving in 2 Corinthians 9:6-14 as something that will cause other people to praise God for our generosity. They will thank Him for our obedience that causes us to give in such a manner that the gospel is shared with them.

What a difference. On the one hand, if we attract attention to ourselves and our giving, people will praise us, and that's the end of it. On the other, if we give quietly and generously, any attention that action gains will cause people to praise God for us!

The Lord Jesus described a situation like that. Mary anointed Him with a costly perfume. Some criticized her because it seemed like a waste. After all, the perfume could have been sold and the money used for the poor. Was Mary crazy or what?

One writer summed up her actions this way:

Generous giving to the Lord may be labeled fanatical by others. But Jesus labeled it "love." In fact, He was so moved by the woman's giving that he vowed "wherever the gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told in memory of her."

So today, centuries later, just as Jesus said, we still remember Mary's devotion and generous giving.

What will people remember you for? Will it be for your accomplishments in life? Will it be for your talents and abilities? Will it be for your work with the poor and needy? Will it be for the ministry you have had for Christ here at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church? Will it be for your efforts to share the gospel with people along life's way? #### Youth Corner

A youth gathering—in New Orleans! Sounds like a party to me. I love parties. I love youth. "I wanna' go," I thought aloud. Someone heard. I was invited. Suddenly and delightedly, I was, officially, on the guest list as a chaperone for our youth: a participant in the "Citizen with the Saints" celebration, bound for the July 2012 flight to New Orleans.

I was asked to write "something from the heart, about *preparing* for New Orleans". Preparing? The truth of the matter is, I had been too busy preparing for the classes I teach each day to spend any time preparing my heart for what blessings may be in store at the "Citizens with the Saints" youth gathering this summer. So, with this prompting, I began to pray as I read the passage of scripture from the text around which the youth gathering is being built (Ephesians 2: 14–20). What should I do? How could I prepare? Have I been preparing without knowing it? Here are a few of the answers that came to me through introspection and prayer:

- 1) God started preparations for my attendance long before the event was on our calendar. Ephesians 2:10 says, "We are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." It is God who has prepared this opportunity for rejoicing with our youth in this particular step of their faith journey. Just as God prepares my heart for worship every Sunday, I trust God is working to prepare my heart for this privilege of building affirming relationships with our youth as they grow in their faith. As I make myself available as a spiritual support and a mentor to our youth, I know God will be working in our midst to unite us all as disciples of Christ.
- 2) In preparation for our shared New Orleans travels and "training ground", we chaperones will be meeting with the entire youth group (at least) once monthly for devotions and games. I trust the Holy Spirit will work in and through these gatherings toward the nurturing of our faith and our relationships---relative to each other and to God. Please keep our times together in your prayers as well.
- 3) The Gathering theme for 2012, "Citizens With the Saints," comes from Ephesians 2:14–20. I have been invited to participate as a citizen with the saints. As a citizen with the saints, I have simply responded to the invitation to gather together in peace. Through my acceptance of this invitation, and the privilege of accompanying our youth, God is preparing my heart and mind to rejoice, to dine, to play, to plan, to pray, and to celebrate in the goodness of God. As I acknowledge our young people as servants of God called to reflect the gospel of grace, I will simultaneously learn with them about pursuing peace with justice, as "citizens with the saints," here and across the world.
