It is noted elsewhere in this newsletter that about 40! people from our congregation have or will have helped in making the "Santa Cruz Style Oktoberfest" event a wonderful and fun community celebration. What started as a nostal-

gic conversation during our coffee time after worship one Sunday, has become an important expression of really trying to live out our central calling as a Christian church - to share the good news of God's love for all with those who are not yet a part of God's family.

Will all of this effort and planning automatically turn into a bunch of new people joining St. Stephen's ? Probably not, but we can't really think like that when it comes to doing God's will. Doing God's will has value in and of itself and reminds us that it is GOD who works in people's lives and that is out of our control.

The most we can do is be faithful and try to do what we can to get out of the way of God's working in people's lives. By offering our community this fun event we are getting out of the way of people's stereotypes of churches, by showing people that we aren't a stuffy, club-mentality gathering of followers of Jesus Christ. Instead the message is that we are down-to earth, salt-of-the-earth, people who are here because we LIKE being a part of a church and find it a central aspect of what makes life worth living.

Hopefully, as we try to break down some of the barriers people have against belonging to a church (like using a Martin Luther beer quote on our pint glasses!), there will be a better receptivity to the Spirit of God calling them to the blessings of a living faith shared with others.

Another part of our ministry to keep in prayer that helps fulfill this same calling, is the beginning of a middle school youth group. Although we have a few youth of our own, it is going to be the addition of about 6-8 youth that DON'T go to our church that will help make this a real possibility. Nelleke Meerman has been led by God's Spirit to work with me and co-lead this monthly gathering. We will welcome all faiths and non-faith in an attempt to show the radical hospitality of the gospel. It will be a safe and honest place where youth can form a meaningful peer group as they navigate the difficulties of growing through the teen years in Santa Cruz. Using Christian principles we hope to equip youth with some resources to make the better choices and really enjoy this exciting time of life.

May God bless all of our efforts and hopes for a healthy and vibrant church!

<u>St. Stephen's Child Development Center</u>



We welcomed back our families last month to fresh curriculum and the return of old favorites. Teaching our returning group is very rewarding as they picked up so much information last year as we had a combined age class. Kathy Berens is attending the SEEDS program sponsored by First 5. Kathy feels honored to be

selected from a group of applicants to attend. This program requires 2 nights a month and 6 Saturdays in 10 months. These classes are rich in content providing curriculum in literature, oral language, and math. SEEDS is an evidence based program created 10 years ago in Minnesota to bridge the socioeconomic gap between children with the goal of achieving their best reading potential by third grade. Children need to decode words by third grade in order to comprehend fourth grade textbook reading. Did you know that in some states they determine how many jails to build based on third grade reading scores?! SEEDS quality interactions are balanced and provide opportunities to build a strong foundation (self-image) on which learning and growth blossom. The key is quantity meaning the more you talk to a child in their early years the larger their vocabulary will grow. SEEDS teachers are sensitive, encourage, educate, and develop through self-image. This is done through conversation, alphabetic knowledge, book and print rules, phonological awareness, vocabulary building on background knowledge, and math. A SEEDS coach is assigned to support the growth and implementation of the curriculum on site for 10 visits. The first visit will include a 3 hour analysis of the current program using the Early Language & Literacy Classroom Observation (ELLCO) Pre-K tool followed by support until completion.

We have been busy harvesting our garden and planting fall flowers on the playground. September focused on returning to school, families and vacations, and "all about me". October is a very fun teaching month as there are so many wonderful books to share and creative activities based around Halloween and fall. Be sure to enjoy our main display board in the hallway and the others displays in the classrooms to see what the children are saying and creating.

We hope that everyone will attend the Teacher Installation (at both Worship Services) and Aebelskiver fundraising breakfast (9:30-12:30) in support of our Preschool Ministry on October 26. Tickets will go on sale after the 8:15 and 10:30 Worship Services for \$10.00 per person.

Worship & Music Committee

At the last meeting we discussed the participation in the service of those who worship. Did you know that having an active part in public worship stemmed from Martin Luther's revision of the Roman mass (way back in 1500). In fact, the word liturgy means, "the work of the people." This tradition recognized that the presiding pastor was not the only leader of worship ... one feature of contemporary worship is the emphasis on shared leadership to indicate that the service is not something that the pastor does while the people watch but is something which is an action shared by all who assemble to worship and over which one is called to preside. Moreover, the people are encouraged to provide the petitions of intercessions in the Eucharist (communion). Laypeople - women as well as men - ought to be encouraged to share in the assisting roles as their abilities allow, in addition to the clergy of the parish. They are not just helpers in the absence of ordained people; they have their own rightful role to fulfill. (pgs 9-10 Manual on the Liturgy, Augsburg Publishing House, 1979.)

As adults living in 2014 television and performance based culture we are trained to be recipients not participants. However the texting / computer culture of the younger generation will not tolerate a non participatory worship time. (See *The Show is Over* in the September *Lutheran Magazine*) St. Stephens as well as, the whole Christian Church needs ideas from you and me - how do we teach about a God who loves each of us so today's people can experience it? Prayer is one component - where you and I take time daily to pray for ways to include people in our lives; as well as in the worship experience. We each need to talk about how God's love has made a difference in our lives. How has being loved and acting in loving ways changed your life? Your neighbor? Think about it? Then share it.

Yes, St. Stephens does invite you to welcome the stranger, prepare the simple meal of bread and the fruit of the vine, share and clean up after; read and pray aloud; but more than that we need you to pray for the love of Jesus to dwell in your heart and bring you to worship to strengthen your faith and inspire each of us to live as the people of God - listening to news, it seems that forgiveness among individuals, groups, and nations is key. I guess Lutherans knew that as we start each service by offering God's forgiveness to each of us. Ah! What a relief.

El Pilar


