Sabbatical Journeys



This seemed like the right title for my

article this month as a way to thank the congregation and share with you some of my ideas for this gift of a summer off.

I do mainly see this sabbatical as a gift of time to refresh and reflect on my time as your pastor and what that might mean for our future together. As you may have heard at our Annual Meeting, a sabbatical for the pastor is recommended by the ELCA every seven years as a benefit for years of service and as a way help the pastor stay healthy as a leader. (This really helped me after our first seven years) The pastor, in turn, agrees to stay with the congregation at least two more years to serve as the refreshed spiritual leader.

The word "sabbatical" has its roots in the word "Sabbath" which means "rest", as in God rested on the seventh day in the creation story of Genesis. I plan on resting by taking some long journeys "away from it all" and spending 40 days and 40 nights in the wilderness. I have always wondered what it was like for Jesus to do that, and I have spent a lot time over the years, dreaming about some of the places I would like to explore in God's beautiful creation. It is important to me to do this "backpacking" style because I think things of the Spirit become clearer when there are fewer man-made things between me and God's natural creation. When I return in Sept., I'll be sharing some of my reflections from a daily journal I'll keep on the journey.

Retired pastor Herb Schmidt has agreed to serve in my absence, as he did seven years ago. Leslie will still be at church, except for her regular vacation time. Thanks again, church! It means a great deal to me and my family.

Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice

Christian concern for the environment is shaped by the Word of God spoken in creation, the Love of God hanging on a cross, the Breath of God daily renewing the face of the earth.

We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are deeply concerned about the environment, locally and globally, as members of this church and as members of society.

Even as we join the political, economic, and scientific discussion, we know care for the earth to be a profoundly spiritual matter.

As Lutheran Christians, we confess that both our witness to God's goodness in creation and our acceptance of care-giving responsibility have often been weak and uncertain. This statement:

- offers a vision of God's intention for creation and for humanity as creation's caregivers;
- acknowledges humanity's separation from God and from the rest of creation as the central cause of the environmental crisis:
- recognizes the severity of the crisis; and
- expresses hope and heeds the call to justice and commitment.

This social statement was adopted by the churchwide assembly in 1993. It summons us, in particular, to a faithful return to the biblical vision.

Understanding & Ending—HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Unfavorable circumstances of people's lives that urge them to pursue a better life, are a major factor contributing to people being trafficked around the world. A few of these "push" factors that foster human trafficking are the following:

- poverty
- lack of education
- gender inequality
- war or armed conflict

- lack of employment
- ethnic discrimination
- political oppressiondomestic abuse
- It is easy to understand how these circumstances can make a person vulnerable, especially when an opportunity arises to experience life that offers something better. When the victims realize that the promises made were simply a ruse to entrap them, it is too late, and they become

subjects of many forms of abuse and violence at the hands of their abusers.

One easy way for interested people to become engaged in opposing human trafficking is to join the Blue Heart Campaign, http://www.unodc.org/blueheart/.

Another simple, but valuable opportunity to act right away is by signing the following petition. **California Against Slavery** is presently circulating a petition to get 600,000 signatures in order to place an initiative on the November ballot that will

strengthen present laws against human trafficking and give California the toughest and best human trafficking law in the United States.

All interested parties can either go on-line to sign the petition, at <u>www.californiaagainstslavery.org</u>, or I, Truett Bobo, will have a petition available during the coffee time following the second service.

In order to sign the petition, you must be registered to vote in Santa Cruz County and provide a residence address (no P. O. Box addresses).
