

MISSION STATEMENT

(EI Salvador continued)

"The cross known as "The Subversive Cross" is a simple, white cross which leans against the front, left wall of Resurrection Church in San Salvador. The cross is covered with hand-written messages—messages for peace and prosperity from the people of Resurrection. The cross was made in 1989, during the Salvadoran Civil War.

<u>Bishop Medardo Gomez</u> wanted to give his people the opportunity to express their sorrow for the sins of their country, and also the hopes and prayers they had for the future of El Salvador. One Sunday, during the offering, he invited the worshippers to come forward and to write down the sins, and the hopes and prayers on a plain, white cross.

At that time, the government decided to crack down on guerrilla fighters who had successfully taken control of the neighborhoods outside of San Salvador. Here, the fighters hid among the poorest of the poor. The government bombed these areas and targeted religious leaders as supposed protectors of the guerrilla fighters. This is the time at which six priests were killed at the UCA.

Soldiers came to Resurrection Church to investigate and to search for Bishop Gomez. Their intent was certainly to question him, but perhaps their intent was even more dangerous for him. Bishop Gomez had fortunately escaped a mere 15 minutes before the soldiers entered the church. The soldiers searched the church, and seized the white cross as evidence of subversion.

Government soldiers continued to terrorize Christians. They arrested Lutheran missionaries and clergy across the country. Eventually these captives were released, but the government kept the white cross. As the cross stood among the soldiers, these men read the messages which were written upon it. Their hearts were turned, and they were convinced that the sins described on the cross were their sins. By this time, Bishop Gomez returned from exile, and was invited to the President's house. Bishop Gomez used this opportunity to ask the President about the white cross.

Some time later, the President requested that the white cross be brought to his home. The soldiers turned it over to the President. As the cross stood in the President's house, he read the messages and pondered the sins of the government. He was moved to send the cross back to Bishop Gomez.

The people of Resurrection Church see the cross as a sign of God's Spirit working in the world. Now known as "The Subversive Cross," this cross stands as a testimony to the power of God and a beacon of hope for the poor of the community."

We will present the cross to the congregation on Rally Day, and it will be on display in the Narthex. We hope that it will stand as a testimony to the power of God in your lives also.

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Travel and Child Sex Trafficking

"God's Work......Our Hands....." An effort to reduce sexual exploitation of children and assure the protec-

tion of children's rights by the travel and tourist industry is being led by the Christian Brothers Investment Services (CBIS). A six-point code has been developed by ECPAT (End Child Prostitution, Child Pornography and Trafficking), and hotels are being asked to adopt it as an expression of support for this endeavor. Some major hotel chains have adopted these standards, but many have not responded, and thousands of children and youth continue to be victimized by traffickers who "rent" them to johns in hotel rooms across America. Action by hotels, promoting a familyfriendly atmosphere, would seem to be a "no brainer," yet there has not been any wave of hotel operators getting on board. So, action by travelers is being promoted: whenever you stay in a hotel or motel, it is suggested that you provide them with a personalized copy of a sample letter that you can find at (Word document about halfway down the page under the heading "FOR ALL OTHER TRAVELERS"): www.cbisonline.com/sriaction.

Upon checking into a hotel, let the management know your concern regarding human trafficking and inquire whether they have any policies or practices that address the issue of patrons engaging in sex trafficking, especially of children. Encourage them to take action, and support the ECPAT code in their effort to end human trafficking. You can also email CBIS about your actions and responses, <u>sriaction@cbisonline.com</u>.

It may seem a small thing, but if travelers begin to take this seriously, we can have a wholesome influence toward change. Happy traveling!

Council Highlights

1. Received the financial report and other on going Task Force reports from council Members.

- 2. Reviewed the Lease Option document from Mid Peninsula Housing regarding the details of our low income Senior Housing project. Members of the Housing Committee had met with Reuben Helick and suggested a number of possible changes to the document. These changes will be discussed with Mid Pen. Housing and when a final Option Document is developed it will be given to the congregation for approval.
- 3. Council President Paul Powers reported on follow up actions regarding the Easement documents with our neighboring property owner and his support for the Housing Development.
- 4. The Council President was directed to negotiate with the AA group about their request for developing storage space.
- 5. The council took a close look at the finances and the reason this year looks out of balance is the payment for a Sabbatical Interim Pastor. It was suggested that perhaps each year the congregation should set aside at least \$1000 so that in seven years when the next Sabbatical would be scheduled the money might be there. This idea will be considered when the next year's budget is developed.

(Why Our Offerings Are Important continued)

Compared to many people in the world, all of us — to one degree or another — have been richly blessed by God. That's why we need to apply Paul's counsel to our lives. As we follow his instruction, giving in the name of the Lord Jesus to meet the needs of others, we "lay up treasures" for the coming age.

One of the primary reasons God provides material blessings to us His children is that we might through those material provisions minister in His name to other people. According to Matthew 25:40, when we do that, even to what Jesus described as the "least" of His brethren, it is as though we have done it unto Him.

As one writer expressed it so well, "Investing in the lives of others and growing in our relationship with God are spiritual treasures. They are not subject to destruction or thievery. They are fully protected. Their value never diminishes." Or as an anonymous poet wrote, "Shall the great Judge say, when my task is through, that my soul had gathered some riches, too? Or shall at the last it be mine to find that all I had worked for was left behind?"

As you consider your true wealth and what really counts for eternity, think about this: How much better to be a poor person who is spiritually rich than a rich person who is spiritually poor.

How rich are you?

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Why Our Offerings Are Important

"Empowered by God-Responding by Grace"

How rich are you? Most of us would respond to that question with a recitation of our material possessions. We would list bank accounts and their contents, stocks, bonds, houses, vehicles, and other so-called assets as tangible evidence of our wealth.

But is that how rich we are? Not really. Adrian Rogers said this, "If you want to know how rich you are, add up everything you have that money can't buy and what you've sent on to heaven. That's how rich you really are."

There are two ways to send money on to heaven, or as the Bible phrases it, to "lay up treasures in heaven." One is to give to the work of the Lord. As we do that, particularly through giving our tithes and offerings here at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, we make deposits in what one writer described as the "Bank of Heaven." Another way to accomplish that goal is to give to meet the needs of other people. That's the admonition provided by the Apostle Paul in 1 Timothy 6:17-19 when he instructed Timothy, "As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God. . . . They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share."

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<u>The impact of the economy</u> <u>on our famil ies</u>

House meetings were held in May and June to learn the impact of the economy on St. Stephen's members. The information will be integrated with the results of house meetings from other COPA member institutions. The themes that emerged from the St. Stephen's meetings were:

- Cost of health care and long term health care
- Running out of health insurance

- Hospitals in region laying off nurses due to declining birth rate as people postpone children due to the economy.

- Class sizes at K-12 are increasing

- College students are paying more, but not finding the classes they need as classes are reduced due to budget cuts

- School teachers being laid off

- Pay cuts and furloughs at UCSC and other government institutions are difficult especially for single wage earners

- Recent college graduates having a difficult time finding jobs
- Foreclosures and the refusal of banks to modify loans
- Housing remains unaffordable for many
- Families forced to relocate to find jobs
- Local economy produces few decent paying jobs causing many to work over the hill
- Reduction in development impacting construction jobs adding to unemployment

These impact related stories are from St. Stephen's members. The feedback is important as COPA works with local government to improve the local economy.



House meetings regarding our five year plan, investment in the five year plan, and possible long range capital projects will be conducted from early October through mid November. These meetings will be held at the St. Stephen's on Sunday mornings either at 9:30 a.m. or Noon.
