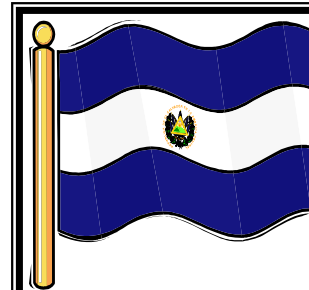

- 2- The Salvadoran people don't want our charity, but accompaniment.
- 3- We are all just the details in God's plan. Don't place so much importance on us. God will always be at work. Don't get in the way.

The question of how the church relates to certain unjust ways in our country continues to arise. It was clear from the story about "Vampire Corporations" (ie Coca-Cola) why American Christians have responsibility to the people who produce the goods that we consume. Connecting global and local mission: 'No one is irrelevant'

Bjorn Peterson's involvement with the ELCA and its Global Mission gatherings has him all fired up about the church. "I think it's the most exciting time ever to be in the ELCA," he says. "The church is not dying. It's being pruned ... and there's a new kind of blossom that looks different from what the plant used to."

The 28-year-old from Nativity Lutheran in Bend, Oregon is careful to add that this isn't about throwing out the old to bring in the new. "This is the trajectory of where the church has been going. It's not separate from where the church has been but is the natural consequence of it." Some people say they don't recognize the church anymore. He encourages them to see the changes as "God's evolution of what has been to what is to be" and says it's a natural progression. It's not about some people being irrelevant. It's about "how God is becoming relevant to new people and how we can all get behind that," says Bjorn. "No one is irrelevant."

The ELCA Mission Gatherings are a great place for conversations, Bjorn says — conversations about connecting global and local mission work, about working side by side no matter what age, about how the church is moving from colonialism to creating in a collaborative way.

The conversations are about expanding capacity, says Bjorn. That gets at the heart of the ELCA's emphasis on accompaniment as the model for both global and local mission. The ELCA's resource materials on mission define this model as walking together in such a way that "gifts, resources and experiences are shared with mutual advice and admonition to deepen and expand our work within God's mission."

From Pastor Jim

On Ash Wednesday, Sara Miles from St. Gregory of Nyssa Episcopal Church in San Francisco, walked in the Mission District with about a dozen others, all dressed in black cassocks, offering people the imposition of ashes on their foreheads. A mother unwrapped her week-and-a-half old baby boy and held him up. Miles crossed his forehead with ashes and said the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The mother said, "Thank you" - as did everyone else who received the ashes that day. Why, Miles wondered, would people say thank you when they are told they are going to die? "Because it's the truth," she decided. "And ashes on the skin show that, despite all the lies of our culture, nothing is hidden, or pretended, or made-up anymore. We are walking, as the Gospel tells us, in the light." (Journey with Jesus, April 17).

I like to think of St. Stephen's as such place where despite all the lies of our culture, we gather to lift up the truth of God's Spirit among us where nothing is hidden or pretended or made-up anymore. I hope you see your participation in our church as an affirmation of living life in the truth of God - seeking to bring that message to a culture that is too often easily deceived into thinking that there is something more worthy of our dedication and devotion than God. May all that we do lead us into the light of God's truth and will for all creation. Thank you God for loving us even when we hide or pretend or make-up something more valuable than you. Bring us into your light and truth. Amen.

Council Highlights

1. Devotions reminded us that the church is the Body of Christ in the world and that we need to have regular check-ups to see if we are a healthy body. In his report to the Synod Assembly, our Bishop Mark Holmerud provided us with a check-list for what a healthy congregation looks like. We fit many of the characteristics, but there were some areas we need to pay attention to.
2. We welcomed a special guest from ElderFocus, a non-profit that advocates for the needs of seniors and who is helping Mid-Pen Housing apply for the federal funding. He led us in an exciting discussion about the possible shared and new programs and relationships we might have with the residents of the new senior housing. These ideas were compiled into a letter along with a resolution that the council passed stating that we are committed to expanding existing programs, creating new programs and developing lasting relationships with other organizations in our community that will provide services for the senior residents.
3. Pastor Jim reported on his attendance at the Synod Assembly in Burlingame. Bishop Medardo Gomez, who in the mid-80's was abducted, imprisoned and tortured for his faith which called him to speak for the poor, was the guest of honor and preached at our worship. Kyle and Rachel Lapp attended as youth delegates. Resolutions regarding equitable pastoral compensation, and offering an alternative budget were passed. A \$1.7 million gift was received from the sale of Golden Gate Lutheran Church in San Francisco.

measure we give, we will in turn receive.

Jack Hartman, a Christian businessman, said it this way: “. . . the more we give to God, the more this opens the channel for God to see that we receive abundantly in return. If we withhold our giving, we are actually withholding the blessing that God wants to give us.”

Someone described non-essentials in life as “. . . playing Scrabble on the *Hindenburg* or rearranging deck chairs on the *Titanic*.” Maybe that's a picture of how you view giving — as a non-essential, something not very important in the totality of life. Could it be that is why your needs are not being met in full?

Think about this: What would happen if you began to place a rightful priority on your giving, even to the point of giving sacrificially? You see, you would then have the “right” to claim Philippians 4:19 with the expectation that in response to your giving, God would meet all of your needs. Your obedience to God's direction in your life to give would then result in having God meet your needs, even with the same “measure” that you give.

Remember, “We do not give to get, but when we give, we get.”



WHY OUR OFFERINGS ARE IMPORTANT

“Faithful Stewards of God’s Infinite Grace”

Here’s a little true or false test. Be forewarned that the question is somewhat tricky. True or false: A Christian can expect to have all of his or her needs supplied by God.

On the surface, that would seem to be true. After all, Philippians 4:19 says, “*And my God will fully satisfy every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus.*” But what many people fail to realize is that this promise is a conditional promise. The reason God will supply all of our needs is based on Philippians 4:18 where the Apostle Paul describes how his needs were met by the Christians at Philippi through the sacrificial offering which they had sent to him.

In other words, although those first-century Christians gave to Paul with the desire of assisting him in his ministry to the early church, because of their giving, they earned the “right” to expect that God would fully meet all of their needs. Because of their willingness to share their resources with Paul, as he indicated in Philippians 4:17, fruit would abound to their account. They could then look to God to supply all of their needs. Although they did not “give to get,” they would “get” because they gave.

That same principle holds true today. As one person expressed it so well, “*We do not give to get, but when we give, we get.*” That’s what the Lord Jesus said in Luke 6:38. He indicated that by whatever measure we give, we will in turn receive.

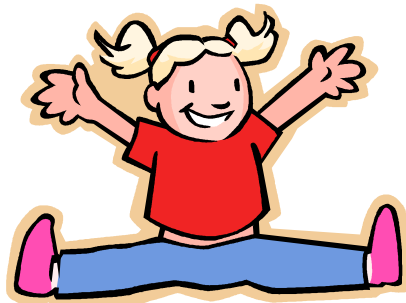
