

El Salvador Sister Parish News

As you likely know, we have two delegations going to visit our sister community in Guillermo Ungo again this year. The November delegation is Nov. 18-26, with 20 people, with 2 first-timers from Lutheran Community in Watsonville and 2 more members from Advent Lutheran in Morgan Hill. Trinity Presbyterian will also have several new participants in this delegation.

The second delegation is January 5-14, 2012. This one will include first-timers from Hope Lutheran in Santa Clara and Christ Lutheran in Aptos, as well as 2 youth from Good Shepherd in Salinas going for the first time.

The original purpose of forming a non-profit was "strength in numbers". We always knew we could not do what we wanted to do alone, so our vision was to gather a group of small churches. As you can see, we are doing that! We are excited.

We ask that you keep all of the delegation members in your prayers as we prepare for and embark on our visits. We will share highlights of both trips early in 2012.

To all Prayer Partners: As we did last year, we will be contacting each one of you to personally thank you for your support and to give you a Prayer Partner brochure and ask you to recommit to being a Prayer Partner, or to let us know if you are not able to continue. We were able to talk to some of you on Rally Day. Our goal is to enhance your relationship with your prayer child and to help our organization identify opportunities to improve on our communications and support of the community. For those we don't see in church, we will mail the card in early October.

From Pastor Jim

Well, it was a very nice summer for our church as people seemed happy to be worshipping together at one service. We hadn't done that for a few years as we recognized it would be better for visitors to have a choice during the summer. This summer, after a Spring that saw a few too many empty pews, the church council felt it might be better to welcome visitors to a more full sanctuary. And it did feel good to be all together.



Already this Fall, though, some are wondering if we should have stayed at one service as the church feels more empty now. Why is that? We have about 375 people in our church and we struggle to have 100 people in church on a Sunday. There are many different kinds of reasons, of course, but I want to make sure we all know that worshipping together is THE priority for being a part of a church.

I know very well that with each passing year, worshipping on a Sunday morning is becoming more and more a thing of the past in the community and culture we live in. It is very easy for us to be swept up in the "normalcy" of doing something else on a Sunday morning because that is what most everyone else is doing. Some of us work, our kids have sports and other activities scheduled, or we're just so busy the rest of the time that church starts becoming another thing to do when all we want to do is just stay home for once!

In the midst of these post-modern changes, the scriptures still reach out and call us to a see life differently. We ARE a peculiar people and I challenge you to do what you can to "change what we care about most" (as we heard in Mt. 21) and reflect that in our decisions about coming to church each week. Everyone is needed and you are missed.

By making regular worship a priority in our lives, we leave no doubt as to where our hearts truly are as we offer them to God. And as we offer our lives to God regularly together, we are regularly filled with God's spirit and grace as we live as we were created to live. See you in church often!

Council Highlights

1. Pastor Jim led devotions reminding us that God's leaders are forgiven so that they can lead boldly and be free from fear. Our namesake day, Santa Cruz - Holy Cross, was Sept. 14, and this reminds us of the depth of the hope that God has for us. The cross shows us the power that forgiveness has as we act in faith striving to do God's will. Knowing we are forgiven gives us courage to move boldly into the future.
2. Pastor Jim reported that the director of the Growing Years preschool, which leases space from our church, has taken another job and is looking to sell the preschool. Irene was hoping that one of her teachers would be able to take over as the director, but that did not work out. The church council asked Pastor Jim to lead a Task Force comprised of Dusty Gipson, Tracy Fleming and Barbara Bautz, (all of whom have education and/or experience with preschoolers) to explore the possibility of having the preschool be run by the church.
3. A combined group of the Field Task Force and the Long Range Task Force met to discuss and set agendas for both groups in the near future. Ideas were discussed about how to fund the various capital improvements we would like to make and what to do with the lump-sum lease payment that will come from Mid-Peninsula. They also made a recommendation to the Council to deposit the \$30,000 advance from Mid-Pen in the Thrivent Building Fund, and to meet with an attorney as we move forward with the Ground Lease Agreement.

Applying Bible Principles

Have you ever asked yourself why you should give to God? After all, if God owns everything as the Scriptures claim, surely He doesn't need our help to pay His bills. Why, then, should the Christian faith place such a great emphasis on giving?

There are many reasons why we give, but one of the best motivators is that we should give as an act of worship, out of love and adoration for our blessed Lord who has given so much to us. Hearts that have been touched by God's love and by His sacrifice will naturally want to respond by giving. Such giving is an integral part of worship. In fact, it is worship, just as much as praying or singing or preaching. Or as one contemporary author expressed it, "Grace and gratitude belong together like heaven and earth. Grace evokes gratitude like the voice an echo. Gratitude follows grace as thunder follows lightning."

When we give in that spirit, out of gratitude for God's grace shown to us, our giving takes on a whole new dimension. Like Cornelius, one who "... gave alms generously to the people and prayed constantly to God," our prayers and gifts will ascend as a "memorial before God" (Acts 10:4). Thus, as we give to the Lord through our worship, we evidence the grace of God in our lives.



Bishop Mark Holmerud's Message

It's been a little over a month since the 2011 Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA ended in Orlando. 1,023 voting members, including 14 from our Synod, spent nearly a week together worshipping, studying, praying and voting, in between times for meals and Bible studies with people from other synods. I believe all those who attended the Assembly would say the experience was worthwhile. Attending a Churchwide Assembly is a great opportunity to sense the work of the larger church and how interdependent the congregations, synods and churchwide expressions of this church truly are.

If you have not yet had the opportunity to attend a Churchwide Assembly and would like to do so, your opportunity is at hand. In the conference and district gatherings that will take place over the next two months, nominations will be made for those who would like to attend the 2013 Assembly which will take place in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania from August 12-18, 2013. Among the items of business that will be considered during this particular Assembly will be an election for Presiding Bishop and consideration of plans to re-imagine the ministry of the ELCA through the L.I.F.T. (Living Into the Future Together) proposals. Voting members will be elected when we gather for our synod assembly in San Jose next May. If you'd like to know more about serving as a voting member please contact your pastor.

I encourage you to attend your conference/district meeting. It's a great opportunity to network with other congregational leaders in your area, and perhaps to learn about a new idea for your congregation's ministry. It's often what happens when we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit's guiding and leading. Thank you for the many faithful ways you have already responded to the Spirit's call in your daily and congregational ministries - and for your prayers for our synod's ministry and the ministry of the E.L.C.A.


