# Let's Fish for People!!!



Last Sunday's Gospel from Matthew Ch. 4 is one of the most memorable stories about Jesus. Remember the Sunday School song? "I will make you fishers of men, if you follow me..."

The problem is that the underlying issue of sharing the good news of a new way of life with others, is so much more complicated and involved than a cheerful children's song, unfortunately.

I remember coming here as your pastor 17 years ago and being so full of enthusiasm and assurance about fishing for people, as I was called specifically to help St. Stephen's grow after many years of membership decline. We got the "new pastor bump" of about 30 new members in the first year or so. They were mostly young families like we were and we had several years of wonderful fellowship before most all of them moved on as it became unaffordable to stay here.

After that time it became more clear that people we knew and interacted with in the school and youth sports community just were not really interested in becoming a part of a church. We naively thought that by being involved in our kids lives and forming new relationships with others in the community, that people would naturally see that church wasn't so weird, and that they would want to be a part of St. Stephen's as their faith community.

When rejection after rejection, however polite, began to pile up, it became very difficult to keep that initial enthusiasm and hope. And add to that the fact that when you have been someplace 17 yrs. there are lots of 'goodbyes' that you have to endure, well... it starts to dampen one's hope about fishing for people.

But this is a lifelong calling that we have been given. It shouldn't be subject to something like how we handle our feelings of rejection. And so it is becoming clear that the folks of St. Stephen's are ready to do some more serious fishing for people as we think about our future as a congregation. And I am looking forward to helping equip and lead you with the same enthusiasm as I had when I first became your pastor. We may not be sure exactly how it's going to happen, but we believe that God is faithful and will show us the way.

### Council Highlights

- Devotions and prayer centered on the post-Christmas biblical stories of Simeon and Anna who were dedicated servants of God in the temple. We named some of our present-day folks whom we consider our Annas and Simeons. Then we shared our hopes and dreams for ministry in the coming year. Much of it centered on inviting and welcoming new people.
- 2. Truett and Carol Bobo read letters explaining that they were seeking another worshipping community. We prayed for them and thanked them for sharing their gifts in their 6 yrs. here. There were a lot of tears and hugs.
- 3. Bill Schraft, CDC board chair asked council to not participate in the ISSP program due to numerous concerns expressed by the Director, Staff and parents. This program would house and feed a group of 15 homeless people one night a week in the Fellowship Hall. It will be brought before the congregation at the Annual Meeting to see if there are any people willing to help.
- 4. It was clarified that 2 loans to the CDC of \$2500 and \$6000, made in 2012, were forgiven by the church council in August and that this needed to be reported to the Treasurers of the church and school for their records.
- Nominations for council were finalized: Judy Russell complete 2yr term vacated by Marta Duplantier & Jeanette Dawson, Ron Buswell, Robin Heppe for 3 yr. terms. Kent and Chris Madsen will be nominated as Synod Assembly delegates.

#### St. Stephen's Child Development Center

The New Year continues to bring growth to our student enrollment. We welcome Samuel our 13<sup>th</sup> student to our full time program. We are delighted to be moving in a positive direction.

Although we have been enjoying summer weather in January we have moved along with the winter curriculum. Jan Brett authored the story, "The Mitten", which is a story about a grandmother who knits white mittens for her grandson. She cautions him to keep track of them in the white snow. He loses his mitten in the snow. Along comes several forest animals to crawl in the mitten to keep warm. Eventually the mitten is stretched to capacity when the bear enters followed by a mouse who sits on his nose. The bear lets out a big sneeze and all of the animals tumble out as the mitten flies through the air and lands next to the boy. He returns home with a stretched mitten. We provide a headband of each animal and use a white sheet as the mitten so our children can act out the story. They truly enjoy bringing this story to life.

We are conducting parent teacher conferences this month. Each family is provided a written report of their child's progress. Additionally, goals are listed to meet individual developmental needs of each child and collaborated on with the family to foster working in partnership. We also provide a portfolio of art work, dictation, and photos of their experiences through the year.



## El Salvador Sister Parish News

Being part of a delegation to El Salvador has always been a life-changing experience. I guess that is why so many of us continue to go. However, for first time participants, it is

very insightful with what they come away with. Here are a couple of reflections we want to share with you.

From Rachel Lapp ~

Going to another country and experiencing another culture is something everyone needs to do at some point or another in their life. No matter how busy or intimidated you might be, this experience is one that deepens you as a person.

Coming from a materialistic culture it's hard to picture living any other way. The Salvadoran people may appear to be poor but what they lacked in material things, they make up for in spirit and strong relationships. They showed me how essential it is to make the time to stop and reflect on life and to remember what is truly important and what is not. They shared with me a culture of meaning. Through all their struggles and pain they understand the gift of life and take full advantage of it. This is something everyone can learn from.

The people there may not have floors or stable jobs but their values are solid and everything they do reflects that. Family and Faith come first.

What separates Santa Cruz al Salvador from other "mission trips" is that we build relationships in place of houses. We show the people that we understand their history and share their pain. We strengthen ourselves and raise awareness to create a better tomorrow.

The January 2014 Delegation is my third trip to El Salvador with Santa Cruz al Salvador. Each delegation is unique and meets a different set of challenges. On this delegation, those of us that had been in country be-

before took the opportunity to visit the community of El Pilar, a rural community badly in need of water storage and sanitation as well as education for their youth. We were warmly welcomed. I had the opportunity to help work with the children while others of our delegation met with the local leadership to find a way to help. Such bright and beautiful young faces. I can only hope we can do for them what we've been able to accomplish in Guillermo Ungo. While in Guillermo Ungo this trip, after awarding 120 scholarships to the local school children we met with 10 of our scholarship students attending college. Doctors, Lawyers, Linguists, Business Administration majors, Psychologists, Computer Scientists, Environmental Researchers... it was impressive and heartwarming. I'm very proud to be a part of an organization that has been able to bring about as much positive change as Santa Cruz al Salvador.

#### From Chris Madsen ~

I'm not a first-time visitor to El Salvador, but this trip I have an unusual perspective. I took a "virtual trip" (is that the correct term?) to El Salvador. I did not physically travel, but used technology to send and receive greetings. Ruth brought her trusty iPad to the hospital and I recorded greetings to "my family", a good friend, and the new worshipping community that meets in Guillermo Ungo. My prayer child Walter graduated last November, and his sister Nancy is now a scholarship recipient. They made a video of greetings to me. It isn't the same as being there, but it was so fun to see and hear them. I also received a video from Pedrina, who Ruth and I first met in 1998, when she was a health promoter and a leader of the community of Los Henriquez. Since then, she has been an alternate member of the legislative Assembly, and is now mayor of Suchitoto. These are two examples of 'Building Relationships' that we keep talking about that are so rewarding, and why I continue to be involved in this ministry.
