

#### First-Timer in El Salvador

When I first signed up to go on a trip with Santa Cruz al Salvador, I basically knew little about El Salvador other than it had had a horrible civil war in the 1980s, was poor and had major gang violence. I was expecting to find malnourished, dirty, sad, withdrawn children.

Was I ever surprised with reality! Yes, El Salvador IS a poor country economically, but it is SO RICH in its people. I spent quality time with people in four different communities and found the people to be strong, kind, loving, hospitable, generous, positive, resilient, and hardworking. straight: family, community, education. They realize the importance that education plays in making changes.

In spite of the atrocities they suffered during their civil war, they can still smile. The testimony we heard from a lady who was 13 when the war began was UNBELIEVABLE! But instead of sitting around feeling sorry for themselves and having a pity-party, they are even MORE MOTIVATED to make positive changes. They don't just DREAM of a better future, they are ACTING in or-

A church where we look for ways to be church out in our community and meet the challenges of our culture.

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#### **Earth Day Action & Advocacy**

By ELCA Bishop Mark Hanson Written in 2005, still inspiring today



The liturgical celebration of Earth Day is not a romantic rite of spring. It is a matter of life and death.

Our celebration of Easter Sunday has passed, but the power and promise of Easter continues to reverberate throughout the world -- the whole world. According to Scripture, the Resurrection of Jesus is the first fruits of the day when all things will be made new (Revelation 21:5). Easter is God's promise to all humanity of new life in Christ, but Easter is for the Earth, too.

I also would like to urge each of you to translate your celebrations of Earth's Easter hope into concrete acts of public witness and advocacy. Reclaiming the Earth for Christ includes reclaiming it for the "the least of these" (Matthew 25:40), where brothers and sisters in Christ can live in health and safety and enjoy the blessings of God's good creation.

One specific example is the ELCA's northernmost congregation, Shishmaref Lutheran Church, located 20 miles south of the Arctic Circle on the Chukchi Sea, Alaska. The forces unleashed by global climate change are literally washing away the earth on which these 600 Inupiat Eskimos live. Due to increased storms, melting sea ice, thawing permafrost and rising sea levels, their island home will soon be under water. They must uproot themselves and their 4,000-year-old culture and find a new, yet-to-be-determined, place to live.

In the ELCA's 1993 social statement, "Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice," the church recognized the threat of "dangerous global warming, caused by the buildup of greenhouse gases, especially carbon dioxide" and announced that the idea of the Earth as a boundless warehouse, which lies behind such developments, has proven both false and dangerous.

Theologians recently called together by the National Council of Churches USA "called all Americans to acknowledge our sinful complicity in producing one-quarter of the world's carbon emissions which exacerbate global warming, even though we are only five percent of the planet's human population.

Easter celebrations of the Earth are quite different from secular celebrations of Earth Day. We know that we are complicit in the evil we decry. We are committed to repent of our own sinful misuse and abuse of the Earth, direct and indirect, when we confess our sins.

But we also are bold in our faith and hope, knowing that God calls and empowers us to confront these issues of life and death. We do this especially for the sake of the poor of the Earth, working on their behalf, even as we contend with entrenched political, economic and social forces.

God's people of Shishmaref Lutheran Church in Alaska, and all who suffer from our wasteful ways upon this graced and gifted Earth, should expect nothing less of us.

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#### **Child Development Center**

On March 14 we had our second Intergenerational activity with Senior Housing. Although it rained, we had fun following the colors of the rainbow marked by balloons to find treasure. After, we made bracelets in the dining room and ate snack.

This month we share with you how SSCDC works with children and families when handling behavioral challenges. Teacher parent communication is key, so guidance is consistent at home and school. The trend in education is focus on selfesteem of the child, and constant adult mediation. Although we honor each child, our philosophy blends in good old-fashioned cause and effect consequences. For instance, "If you keep hitting Johnny, he isn't going to choose to play with you anymore. If you want to play with him, you need to stop hitting."

Our one rule is to show kindness to self, others, and materials. We ask, "Was that kind, yes or no?" Young children mature to empathy. We model empathy, so children can see it represented. Learned socialization skills begin to build the empathy foundation within. Empathy learning is facilitated by helping the child you just hurt with an ice pack or waiting with them until they feel better before returning to play.

Redirection is the key. Blame or shame are not necessary to stop the action, rather guide the child back to kindness practices. If we all stop hitting, then no one will get hit. Our school will be safe for everyone. Blame leads to saying, "I'm sorry" then go do it again. Quick concise directives are essential to keeping a child's attention. They glaze over during long explanations. "You need to stop taking Johnny's toy, can you do that?" "Now it is your job to practice not taking Johnny's toy." It takes a lot of practice for children to mediate impulses of wanting everything to be their own way and to take turns with others. Balancing turn taking with allowing a child to finish their own idea with the materials rather than being rushed is patience in practice.

We replace "Time-out with time in." If a child is distraught, aggravated, or unruly they may just need 5-10 minutes in a kind embracing lap to cry it out or sit quietly
without having to explain. Sometimes they cannot put their distress in words. Our experience is when you put the time in, they have unrushed time to feel better. If a child
continues to be unkind to others they are simply invited to sit in the library until they
are ready to return and be kind.

At SSCDC we teach to the individual child honoring that they process socialization differently. If several attempts to redirect are not working, we stop and observe the natural consequence between children as they learn there are times in life when actions speak louder than words! We want our children to be able to practice problem solving and look for solutions rather than always reliant on parent's, teacher's, and later employers. We want our children to practice kindness when we are not looking!
