

Tragic news from our Sister Parish

For those of who have been on a Santa Cruz al Salvador delegation, you must remember our driver, Kike. He always greeted us with a warm smile and helping hand as he loaded our luggage into the back of the bus. He was always there, willing to engage in conversation even with the language barrier. His driving skills were exemplary and he kept us all safe as he drove through the countryside.

On April 17th we received an email from Brenda Hubbard, our in-country coordinator saying that Kike had been murdered.

Here is Christina's first-hand story from the uncle . . . "Kike's tio, Don Samuel, father of our beloved Samuel, asked Kike for help, like we all do, with his microbus, he needed to fix some seats or something. Kike always willing to help.

Kike said he knew a place in Soyapango and they met up at a gas station there. Don Samuel was nervous about where they were going, thought it was very dangerous and Kike said he knew the place well and had been there many times. So they went to this workshop and were working inside the micro taking out the seats and cleaning it up, and a little kid came in and was talking a bit to Kike. Don Samuel did not hear what was said.

They decided to look for lunch and went out and walked around to find lunch and went back and were standing in front of the micro eating their lunch, out on the street i think, and suddenly another micro backed up in front of them and 3 guys jumped out and grabbed Kike and Don Samuel said WHAT??? WHY??? and they shoved him and said shut up and pushed Kike in the micro without saying anything. Don Samuel was totally panicked and went into the workshop and said I'm gonna call someone and the guy said DON'T CALL ANYONE THEY WILL KILL US ALL.

So Don Samuel drove to a gas station on the carretera de oro and called the police. He noticed a blue car there near him and when the police arrived it left. 2 police patrol cars highly armed and with polarized windows arrived, they took him back to the workshop and he explained everything, they kept him inside so no one would see him but he saw that blue car again there.

Meanwhile Kike's body was found a ways away on a street, shot in different places. Don Samuel later identified 2 of the gang guys from photos at the police and it is possible that they got those 2, we are not sure. However, if they do, Don Samuel can only testify to "kidnapping" or depriving Kike of his freedom since Don Samuel did not see them kill him.


It is known that little kids work as lookouts and pass on information to the gang members so a big hypothesis is that the kid that spoke with Kike got some kind of information, where he lived or something, and if someone goes to one gang's territory but have an identification card with an address from the opposing gang's territory, they will kill them. The fact that they were there so long and out in open walking around, could possibly raise suspicions. Don Samuel thinks there is a young assistant guy in the workshop that may be involved some way.

That is the tragic infuriating senseless heart breaking story of the dearest sweetest kindest best father husband friend I have ever known. At least as much as I could get straight from the mouth of Don Samuel, heartbroken and shaken to the core."

Guillermo F. Sensente says, "Soyapango is one of the most dangerous cities in El Salvador and we never go into it because of that." This devastating news has created a big hole in our hearts. We all loved him and give thanks for having known him. A very gentle soul. He will be missed and always remembered. Please pray for Kike's wife, Lorena & their family, Kevin, Gabriela and Andrea.

from Pastor Jim...

"Into the Wilderness...to Share the Good News"



I say "serendipitous" because we were struggling with how to put our theme concisely and interestingly, when I went to the office work room to make some copies of the application. When I opened the copier lid, I found a Sunday School coloring page that had been left on the glass. I picked it up to move it and I noticed that it was a picture of Jesus in a desert wilderness setting with cactus, rock formations, lizards and other desert critters. As I laid it down on the counter I noticed that at the bottom were the handwritten words "Into the Wilderness... to Share the Good News". This reflected the scripture theme of that Sunday when we read about Jesus being tempted in the wilderness during the season of Lent. The words were the first and last ones of the passage in the gospel of Mark.

When I brought it back to the group it was as if an angel had appeared and given us God's blessing for what we were trying to do. Tears came to my and Jeanette's eyes as we realized it exactly expressed what we had been trying to say.

I had suggested that I wanted to spend 40 days and 40 nights in the wilderness in order to be renewed through time and experiences in God's natural creation. At the same time we were trying to incorporate how St. Stephen's would experience renewal through the sabbatical time too. I had suggested that part of my time would be spent exploring new ways that more traditional churches like ours are overcoming the typical trend of slow decline, and were reaching their communities in creative ways. This was the 'good news' we were seeking in the wilderness of a post -Christian American culture.

So now we wait and see. Our application reflected many of the same things that previously successful ones did. So we have high hopes!



That means we need to be prepared to be creative with how that happens and to be ready to go out into the community and be the church where it is needed the most.
- 2. Betsy Wilson from MidPen Housing was our guest attendee. They are having some complications securing the property tax exemption due to the ground lease arrangement we have with each other. We decided that we needed to consult with the Bishop and Synod attorneys to get their input first. Once we receive their go-ahead, we will be able to make the necessary changes so that MidPen can qualify for a "welfare exemption".
- 3. Pastor Jim, Bill Schraft, Kent Madsen and Jeannette Dawson completed the Lily Endowment Clergy Renewal Grant application for Pastor Jim's hoped for sabbatical in the Summer of 2019. It was an extensive process that was completed and submitted one week before the deadline. They acknowledged that they had received it and will be notifying us in August about their decision. The theme is "Into the Wilderness...to Share the Good News".

Faith

A living, daring confidence in God's grace.

When Lutherans talk about faith, we are talking about the relationship God's Holy Spirit creates with us. It's a relationship where God's promise of steadfast love and mercy in Jesus opens us to a life of bold trust in God and joyful, generous service to everyone we know and meet in daily life.

Martin Luther was exuberant when he described the freedom of "a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times." He once wrote, "Oh, it is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, this faith. It is impossible for it not to be doing good things unceasingly."

Faith convictions expressed as statements of belief flow from this confident trust in God. ELCA Lutherans share in the faith expressed in the Apostles', Nicene and Athanasian Creeds, in the Lutheran confessional writings (collected as the Book of Concord), and in the ELCA Confession of Faith.

At the same time faith does not close our minds to the world and our hearts to others. We continue to listen to the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. We listen to the witness of others and we watch for the ways God is active in the world around us. Faith opens a place for engaging others in conversation, for seeking the truth, for asking questions and speaking love in word and deed.

Faith is a full life, liberated for a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

Faith and Society

"Faithful participation in society is integral and vital to the mission of the ELCA. It is a church that believes God is calling us into the world — together. As part of this call, we seek the common good for society, provide moral vision and are committed to addressing social and cultural injustices and issues. The ELCA participates in God's just and loving purpose for all of creation in many different ways, from the daily actions of members as citizens, to efforts in social service, to public witness for justice.

The children's beautiful A-L-L-E-L-U-l-A banner remains above the altar as we contin-

ue to celebrate the resurrection. Alleluia! He is risen!

"The scent of Easter" The children were blindfolded and challenged to identify items: Perfume to represent the anointing of Jesus. Fresh baked bread to represent the body of Jesus. Grape juice to represent the blood of Jesus. Vinegar to represent Jesus dying for us on the cross. A seed (with dirt) to represent Jesus being buried in the tomb.

Why Easter Eggs? Coloring & hunting is certainly a fun tradition. But these kids want to know why we do what we do. Many early Christians regarded the egg as a symbol for the stone being rolled from the grave. Others saw the egg as a symbol of new life. At church, we simply use the opportunity to fill the bright plastic eggs with symbols that help understand our faith.

"Believe it or not!" You know Mr. Ripley's book of strange and amazing photos. Although they seem unbelievable, they were true events. Personally I find it hard to believe that a chicken laid a perfectly square egg. I'd have to see it to believe it. The kids especially liked the 3,000 foot hot dog weighing 885 pounds. If it's true, it's true, whether I believe it or not. Faith is not a science. You cannot prove it. That's why it's called Faith! Thomas didn't believe the other disciples when they spoke of Jesus resurrection. But Thomas believed when he actually touched the nail prints in Jesus hands. "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe" John 20:29 May we believe in our heart the truths we find in God's Word even though we can't see them with our eyes.

"Open Mind—Open Heart" Do you enjoy puzzles? Sometimes they are easy to figure out, other times I look and look but cannot figure out what goes where. Then my son comes in and figures it out instantly! Sometimes it takes us a while to see clearly. This lesson was of the disciples fear when they saw the risen Christ. They thought he was a ghost! Jesus convinced them by opening their minds. They touched him—ghosts don't have a body. Jesus ate their food—ghosts don't eat. Now they believed and were anxious to tell everyone about Jesus! Evidently desperate times called for desperate measures. Let us pray that he will open our hearts and minds to understand God's word. It was exciting to watch the kids light up as we played some word jumbles and the answer was revealed to them. The craft wasn't quite so revealing, but they were great listeners as they painted!

Child Development Center

Our preschool has much to be thankful for.

Our longtime goal to have a rainy-day fund is on track and we will reach our initial target amount by June ensuring that should something unexpected happen, we can cover payroll and expenses for over 2 months. This includes providing health insurance for our 3 full-time teachers. We still have more goals to reach financially regarding cost of living raises, but we have a very dedicated team that understands the wisdom of allowing responsible arowth to ensure longevity.

We have had generous donors, especially the Schraft and Rebecca Russell family who have given us so many gently used items to enrich our activities. We have another house, table and umbrella, and 2 shopping carts, to name a few. These items combined with a donation from our congregation of \$100 was used to purchase a Farmer's Market to create a dramatic play shopping experience on the playground. We have 3 playhouses now, so they can shop and take their items to the houses...so fun!

We have been in waitlist status for most of the school year. We have a few graduating, so we were able to enroll to our 2-year-old program; Amelia in April, Hailey, Ben, and Calvin on June 18, and Eva in September. We have 2 tours scheduled and a few more names on the waiting list to follow up on. After a year of full enrollment, we have discovered that serving 22 students provides a very good balance financially and gives us the ability to know each child well. Expansion would require more building space and we have taken up most of it already! Discussion about opening an infant classroom will be further explored in 2019/2020. There is a big need for this in our community.

May brings Parent Teacher Conferences which is our opportunity to discuss with families how their child has developed in fine motor, language/ literacy, cognitive, and social emotional areas, marked by the goals we set in fall 2017. We also assist families with finding services for speech therapy or developmental screening when indicated. It fills our hearts to watch a child's life be changed when enrolling here unable to speak clearly, and leave here feeling confident for their next educational experience, or find a school that meets their individual needs.
