from Pastor Jim...

There have been many Election Days since I have been pastor here. But this one seems very different and more important than any other I have ever known. It is because our present national political situation has never felt so much in opposition to so much of what I believe in as a Christian person, and so much of what I stand for as a Lutheran pastor. Much of the direction our President,



Congress and up to 40% of the American public are headed, flies in the face of a great deal of what I have come to know about God's will for humanity through careful study of the Bible and through lessons learned in the history of the Christian church.

Parker Palmer, Protestant author of the book The Company of Strangers: Christians and the Renewal of American Public Life, and founder of The Center for Courage and Renewal, speaks my mind and heart in a recent contribution to The Christian Century magazine:

"Now I pause to sigh, even cry, over the condition of civil society in the United States. The crude, abusive, deceptive, manipulative, wealth-obsessed, egomaniacal, racist, sexist, xenophobic and fear-driven politics we are suffering from can be summed up with ease: it's plug-ugly. As the apostle Paul reminds us, we are members of one another- and we'd do well to work hard to reclaim the well-being of our body politic before it becomes too ugly to be redeemed." (10/24/18 p.24)

In this time when we are celebrating a movement of God's Spirit in history through the Protest-ant Reformation, it is abundantly clear that something must be done to change course very soon. As we have been praying each Sunday for the past few months to begin our worship service, it is time to "stand up for what is right and act for what is just". What we are seeing played out in our country has gone too far, and a good portion of the Christian church has been co-opted and lost its sense of the essence of Christ's message. We must reclaim our heritage of protest when we see any part of our church going astray and forgetting its calling to side with and serve the "least of these" and live as the Good Samaritan.

We cannot turn a blind eye to the things Palmer lists above, and be lulled into complacency that somehow things will just work out. We must be the Luther-ans - the ones like Martin Luther -who point out deception, falsehood, injustice and motivation by fear. We can be the ones who participate in a new kind of reformation that changes the direction of where some in the Christian church are heading as they follow economic power rather than God's call. We must be the Christ-ians - the ones like Christ who find the ways to defeat fear with a powerful, self-giving love that seeks the well-being of ALL our neighbors.

Several solutions were agreed to, including a new "Visitor Tag" system for housing visitors, possible leasing of some spaces for MidPen staff, and temporary barricades during preschool hours to keep residents guests and deliveries from driving past the church offices. Some additional permanent signage may also be added on the playground fence and on the trash enclosure.

Brand New Pipe Organ Booklet Now Available

"St. Stephen's Celebrate Music With the Abbot & Sieker Pipe Organ" booklet is now completed and available for all to enjoy! Copies will be located at the end of each pew, and of course we hope you enjoy the music from this lovely and unique organ. This brochure will provide its history and an introduction about pipe organs, which enhances our music and worship services.

This lovely brochure about St. Stephen's pipe organ has been the project of the Worship and Music Committee and has taken several years to complete. The idea originated with our organist, Gary Roberts, who wanted to show case this spectacular organ with photos and some history to share with church and community members. In 2017 Barbara Rice, enlisted the help of her brother-in-law, Gary Toops, a master organist and college music instructor. With information available in the church office files, they further researched and identified additional history. He also clarified terminology and concepts of music specific to the organ and wrote much of the brochure with edits by Barbara. Thank you all!

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Advent Wreath Making for all ages November 25 @ 9:30 am

Advent is the season when Christians make spiritual preparation for the coming of Jesus at Christmas. Celebrating with an Advent wreath is a meaningful custom in many Christian traditions. The Advent wreath is a circular garland of evergreen branches representing eternity. On that wreath, four or five candles are typically arranged. During the season of

Advent, one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord. Set on the branches of the Advent wreath are four candles: three purple candles and one pink candle. As a whole, these candles represent the coming of the light of Christ into the world.

Catholic tradition states that the four candles, representing the four weeks of vent, each stand for one thousand years, to total the 4,000 years from the time of Adam and Eave until the birth of the Savior.

Celebrating with an Advent wreath during the weeks before Christmas is an excellent way for us to keep Christ at the center of Christmas, and for parents to teach their children the true meaning of Christmas. Join the fun with Barbara Johnston & Ruth Mitchell as our craft leaders.

Song & Silence: Taize Service

November 18 @ 6:00 pm (Third Sunday of each month)

This evening service offers an opportunity for reflection on whatever subject occupies you at this time. The service is made up of the repetitive singing of simple harmonized tunes interspersed with periods of silence. The tunes are contemporary and were composed by the Taizé Community. Sunday morning music at St. Stephen's often includes Taizé music, especially hymn 472, "Eat this bread, drink this cup" and hymn 616, "Jesus, remember me."

The Taizé Community is an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity in Taizé, Saône-et-Loire, Burgundy, France. It is composed of more than one hundred brothers, from Catholic and Protestant traditions, who originate from about thirty countries across the world.
