



Tony Guerrero Memorial Service January 5 at 11:00 am.



Council Highlights

We continued our study of "From the Steeple to the Street" and discussed Ch. 7, which focused on theology, specifically how our understanding of God as a Trinity of Creator/Parent, God/Human in Jesus Christ, and Spirit/God in us helps us fulfill our mission to share the good news of God's love and ways with others.

We welcomed guests Rev. Herb Schmidt (ret.), who serves as our rep. with the homeless advocacy group Association of Faith Communities, Barbara Johnston & Mary Kelly, CDC Board President and V.P. They each made presentations regarding the proposed Safe Spaces Parking program that AFC is developing so that some screened & supervised homeless families who still are able to live in their vehicles could have a safe place to park overnight. Because there are many unanswered questions and the program is still developing and won't be running until March 2019, the Council decided to postpone further discussion until April. The discussion was very fruitful and respectful with new information shared regarding issues this would raise with our state licensing for the preschool and parents concerns. The CDC Board recommends Council not approve the program as it is currently defined. Herb will take the questions and concerns to the AFC, and Barbara will follow up with other churches who have preschools.

Pastor Jim served as a COPA leader at a recent community meeting about the prospect of Kaiser opening up a new clinic near the church. COPA will seek a Community Benefit Agreement with Kaiser as we look for ways for a new partnership with a new neighbor with significant resources that can help meet some of the needs that are important to our institutions.


Monthly Special Benevolence Offering



Epiphany

. . . Means "to show" or "to make known." It was first observed in the East as a feast commemorating Jesus' baptism as an adult. Later it became a celebration of Christ being made known to the Gentiles, beginning with the Wisemen (Magi) who came from the East to worship the Christ child. Another theme of Epiphany is God's light overcoming the darkness of evil and sin.

The color of Epiphany Day is white for light and purity. The Baptism and the Transfiguration of Jesus are celebrated during this season, so white is a reminder of Baptism robes and the gleaming white color of Jesus' clothes when he went up the mountain of transfiguration. On other Sundays in Epiphany the color is green.

The star that guided the wisemen to Bethlehem is a symbol of Epiphany.

Song & Silence: Taize Service

January 20 @ 6:00 pm (Third Sunday of each month)

This evening service offers an opportunity for reflection on whatever subject occupies you at this time. The service is made up of the repetitive singing of simple harmonized tunes interspersed with periods of silence. The tunes are contemporary and were composed by the Taizé Community. Everyone is invited. Bring friends: the more voices, the better the sound.

Sunday morning music at St. Stephen's often includes Taizé music, especially hymn 472, "Eat this bread, drink this cup" and hymn 616, "Jesus, remember me."

We lived Advent as we prepared for the pageant. The kids made the stars for the cold dark night and we used the olive trees that they painted last year. Each child got to choose what role they wanted. They could speak or not speak, run / twirl / jingle, even lay down and pretend to sleep. The wolf made a repeat appearance. Glitter or no glitter, each child shined! These are a few of our December lessons:

You are a king . . . John 18:37

Made me think of the song from Lion King "I just cant wait to be King". Simba was anxious to become king because he didn't want anyone telling him what to do. He didn't want to hear anyone saying "do this" or "stop that". He wanted to be free to run around all day doing everything his way. He also was looking forward to telling everyone else what to do.

"I'm gonna be a mighty king so enemies beware! I'm gonna be the mane event like no king was before. I'm brushing up on looking down. I'm working on my ROAR! Oh, I just can't wait to be king!"

Simba had a very poor idea of what it means to be a king. The real role of a king is to look after the needs of his people. A good king is more concerned with caring for his people than he is in being served. (Pause for emphasis) Jesus was born to be King. Do you thing Jesus ever thought about what he was going to be when he grew up? He could have become a carpenter like his father. Perhaps he might have chosen to be a wine maker (turned water into wine) or a Doctor (gift of healing) or even a fisherman like the disciples. Those are all good choices, but He was only interested in doing the will of his Father. He was born to be our King.

What should we do . . . Luke 3:10-11

"If you have two coats, give one of them to the one who has none. If you have food, share it with those who have none." That is the same message we need to hear today. If we want to experience the real joy that Jesus wants for us, then we must learn to share! By sharing what God has so generously given to us, we will receive an even great gift - - - the gift of joy. As we celebrate the birth of our Saviour, help us to remember those who are in need.

HELP US HELP Lutheran World Relief

MMRR is starting a year-long service project to provide Lutheran World Relief with **BABY CARE KITS**. Keeping a new baby healthy, clean and comfortable takes a lot of resources. The items in a "Baby Care Kit" provide the basics to care for a newborn.

Each Baby care Kit provides:

- Two light weight cotton t-shirts,
- Two long or short sleeved gowns, or sleepers (no feet)
- Two medium weight receiving blankets, cotton or flannel
or crocheted or knitted with light weight yarn 36" to 52" square,
- Four cloth flat fold diapers,
- One jacket, sweatshirt, or sweater with a hood or include a baby cap.
- Two pair of socks
- One hand towel (preferably a dark color)
- Two or three bath-size bars of gentle soap in the original wrapping
- Two diaper pins

To make sure the kits contain all the proper items, the Circle is asking you to sponsor a baby care kit by contributing \$20 for each kit. We will purchase the items in bulk, assemble the kits and ship them off. We will be placing envelopes on a table in the Narthex. You can help sponsor a baby kit by donating \$20 to purchase items for the kit. MMRR has provided seed money to get the project started and we will be applying for a Thrivent Action Team card of \$250 giving us \$300 dollars for seed money. We are hoping that members of the congregation will donate matching funds. Let's see how many baby care kits St. Stephens can ship to LRW in one year. Look for the envelopes beginning in January.
