

More on the January 2019 Delegation

We visited three projects of the Salvadoran Lutheran Church: a homeless shelter, an environmental/sustainable agriculture project on the shore of Lake Ilopango and a brand new trauma therapy project in a recently completed building funded by a German pastor. So far 16 pastors (not all Lutheran) have completed a two year training program and will each be donating four hours a week of trauma therapy there, as well as using their skills in their own parish. This is a much needed project and gives hope that the cycle of violence, which has been so prevalent in El Salvador since the civil war, can be stopped.

Another interesting meeting was with a group that was helping deportees from the US in their transition back to life in El Salvador. Many of these people are coming back with little family or social support, neighborhoods that have been taken over by the gangs and having left their children that were born in the US behind. This group is doing great things including sending teams of these returning deportees into high schools to tell the student about what it is really like to make the journey to the US and what the reality is for them once they get here, often working three jobs and sharing housing with 10 people to get by. It is sad to hear that many of the children left behind in the US start to do poorly in school and struggle without the parent's support. Some churches in the US are reaching out to these children and offering support and community.

The travelers are once again grateful for the opportunity to visit El Salvador. The people have so much faith, strength and love, despite the many challenges. Each of the eight people on this year's trip had a wonderful learning experience and a very good time and were greatly moved by their experiences and made strong connections with the people of El Salvador.

- 1. Devotions were from the Living Lutheran magazine. We read aloud the article written by our national ELCA Bishop, Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, entitled "What is God Up To?" She reminded us that as a declining church across the nation, we can too easily get trapped by asking the natural question "What Can WE Do?" as we try to do something to try and change our fortunes. The better question she offers is, "What is God Up To?" She acknowledges that the Western church is in a historical transition time, and that she does not have a clear vision of what the church is becoming, and that is fine because God always does. So our better questions are How is the Spirit re-shaping the church? How will God use us as Christ's living body in the world? We cannot exist to rebuild a memory. God will not bless that kind of effort. Instead, let's be about the work of getting more people to know more about Jesus. Pastor Jim reminded us that is exactly what he is hoping to lead St. Stephen's to do through our involvement with the Fresh Expressions US movement. This effort is helping us to leave our church building and do and be church out in our community.

HELP US HELP Lutheran World Relief

MMRR is starting a year- long service project to provide Lutheran World Relief with BABY CARE KITS. Keeping a new baby healthy, clean and comfortable takes a lot of resources. The items in a "Baby Care Kit" provide the basics to care for a newborn.

Each Baby care Kit provides:

- Two light weight cotton t-shirts,
- Two long or short sleeved gowns, or sleepers (no feet)
- Two medium weight receiving blankets, cotton or flannel or crocheted or knitted with light weight yarn 36" to 52"square,
- Four cloth flat fold diapers,
- One jacket, sweatshirt, or sweater with a hood or include a baby cap.
- Two pair of socks
- One hand towel (preferably a dark color)
- Two or three bath-size bars of gentle soap in the original wrapping
- Two diaper pins

To make sure the kits contain all the proper items, the Circle is asking you to sponsor a baby care kit by contributing \$20 for each kit. We will purchase the items in bulk, assemble the kits and ship them off. We will be placing envelopes on a table in the Narthex. You can help sponsor a baby kit by donating \$20 to purchase items for the kit. MMRR has provided seed money to get the project started and we will be applying for a Thrivent Action Team card of \$250 giving us \$300 dollars for seed money. We are hoping that members of the congregation will donate matching funds. Let's see how many baby care kits St. Stephens can ship to LRW in one year. Look for the envelopes.
