

Notes on the January 2019 Delegation

One of the fun "extra" activities the delega-
tion did as part of the January 2019 trip was
to visit the Salvadoran Lutheran Church's Agro-
Ecological Park on the shore of Lake Ilopango, a crater lake which fills an 8 by
11 km volcanic caldera in central El Salvador (Wikipedia). It's a beautiful set-
ting, but somewhat of an adventure to get to the park as it is not accessible by
car. One can only get there by foot on a moderately difficult trail, or boat. A
few of our group chose the boat (Kent included). It's a small boat and the wind
was fairly strong ... but the ride was beautiful and the destination worth it.



The site is a former refugee camp
operated by the church. With
sponsorship of Eine Welt, a mission
of the Lutheran Church in Bavaria,
the property is now being restored
for agriculture and a hostel-style
retreat center is being developed.
One of the people in charge told us
about the work underway there.
Some explored the site while oth-
ers soaked in the tranquil lakeside
ambiance. We tasted the fruit and

purchased coffee to take home. I'm currently using this coffee for my daily
brew and it is delicious!

On the way home, our bus climbed up onto the rim of the volcano and had lunch
(at a community called Santa Cruz) with a beautiful view of the lake far below
us. It was an inspirational side trip!

Lois Marie Claire Meeker: May 8, 1925 - March 1, 2019



Please let me introduce to you our sabbatical pastor:
Rev. Joel Miller



Pastor Joel is a retired Episcopalian minister who recently served as the Rector for Calvary Episcopal Church in downtown Santa Cruz (the wooden red church across from the Nickelodeon movie theater). He served there for about 10 years and was known for his compassionate outreach to the homeless population. He is presently serving on the Board for the Safe Spaces homeless parking program. He just completed an Interim Pastor ministry in Idaho, and has spent time serving a congregation in Geneva, Switzerland and in Tunisia before his arrival in Santa Cruz.

I got to know Pastor Joel through our involvement in COPA and out on the Monterey Bay as a fishing buddy. One of my most memorable experiences with him was when he and his son Joseph came fishing with me and we found ourselves in the midst of a large pod of a few hundred Risso's dolphins (twice as large as regular dolphins), and then a few Northern Right Whale Dolphins (black and white with no dorsal fins). The latter are smaller and rode our bow wake while Joseph reached down to touch their backs when they surfaced. They are so rare that I may never see them again. We also caught our limits of Ling Cod that day!

It is a great opportunity to welcome a pastor from the Episcopal church. The ELCA has been in Full Communion with the Episcopal Church since 2000. One of the results is that pastors from each denomination may serve in each others congregations.

Pastor Joel will be working around 20 hrs./ week planning and leading worship, bringing Holy Communion to the homebound, visiting those in the hospital, and attending to other pastoral care needs.

Pastor Joel can be reached on his cell phone at 419-8290 for any pastoral emergencies. He will be working with our Church Administrator, Leslie, so he can also be reached at church for anything other than emergencies. Leslie will be gone July 11 - Aug.2.

Council Highlights

1. The Council retreat was held on Sat. April 13 from 10a-2p in the Fireside Rm. We began with a spiritual focus on the foundations of why we may embark on beginning a Dinner Church somewhere other than our facility at some point in the near future. We read a story about a church similar to ours, with far fewer resources, that was probably going to close within 10 years. Now they have 11 different Dinner Church sites in the Seattle area that serve people who have never been a part of a church before. Pastor Jim will be spending 4 days with Rev. Verlon Fosner who helped lead his congregation in this effort.

2. We spent time in 2 one-one meetings talking about "What do you envision for the future of St. Stephen's?"

3. Follow-up on the Annual Meeting amendment to the budget regarding the task force that will assemble several financial scenarios regarding future pastoral leadership, was assigned to the Finance Comm. Additional people will be asked to help them with this task.

4. Council voted to not meet in July.

5. Discussion happened around the planning of 3 summer activities to coincide with the sabbatical theme of "Into the Wilderness to Chare the Good News". The congregation will be encouraged to participate in 3 outdoor related activities planned by Mutual Ministry Comm. and our sabbatical pastor, Pastor Joel.

6. There will be renewed efforts to engage with the "Reconciled in Christ" and "Amparros" programs, which help congregations be more welcoming of the LGBT community and Central American refugees, respectively.


STEWARD OF THE MONTH

John 12:1-8 "Mary anointed Jesus feet" This was a fun lesson - we used a diffuser to fill the room with incense, and played scent detectives with blindfolds and random aromatics. Our lesson was two fold.

#1 Mary gave the very best she could. Her most prized possession and her time in a very humble way. Regardless of Judas scolding. What can we give to show our love for Jesus?

#2 Like the aroma of perfume, joy and kindness spread their effect to everyone in the area. So do bitterness and anger. In this story, the line about the fragrance filling the house strikes a deep chord. Love, devotion, generosity—the impact of these things spreads. Both good and ill can infect the people close to the action, but the power of good can be so much greater if we'll just choose it.

Palm Sunday — the children impressed me with their willingness to participate, to pass out palms and lead the congregation into worship and then back out into the world. Hopefully the hands on experience will stay with them, and provide deeper meaning to their faith.

HELP US HELP Lutheran World Relief

MMRR is starting a year-long service project to provide Lutheran World Relief with BABY CARE KITS. Keeping a new baby healthy, clean and comfortable takes a lot of resources. The items in a "Baby Care Kit" provide the basics to care for a newborn.

Each Baby care Kit provides:

- Two light weight cotton t-shirts,
- Two long or short sleeved gowns, or sleepers (no feet)
- Two medium weight receiving blankets, cotton or flannel
or crocheted or knitted with light weight yarn 36" to 52" square,
- Four cloth flat fold diapers,
- One jacket, sweatshirt, or sweater with a hood or include a baby cap.
- Two pair of socks
- One hand towel (preferably a dark color)
- Two or three bath-size bars of gentle soap in the original wrapping
- Two diaper pins

To make sure the kits contain all the proper items, the Circle is asking you to sponsor a baby care kit by contributing \$20 for each kit. We will purchase the items in bulk, assemble the kits and ship them off. We will be placing envelopes on a table in the Narthex. You can help sponsor a baby kit by donating \$20 to purchase items for the kit. MMRR has provided seed money to get the project started and we will be applying for a Thrivent Action Team card of \$250 giving us \$300 dollars for seed money. We are hoping that members of the congregation will donate matching funds. Let's see how many baby care kits St. Stephens can ship to LRW in one year. Look for the envelopes.
