

#### Comment by Sept 23 on new SNAP rule

The USDA has proposed a <u>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)</u> rule that would eliminate an estimated 3.1 million children, families, disabled and older adults from access to SNAP benefits. This blockage of nutrition support for vulnerable and hungry people ignores the will of Congress when it <u>considered this very issue</u> in the 2018 Farm Bill. SNAP serves about 36 million people. The rule eliminates <u>broad based categorical eligibility</u> ("Cat El"), which is a mechanism used to reduce bureaucratic red tape and ensure that vulnerable populations receive the support they need. By eliminating Cat El, states are forced to follow procedures that add to the cost of providing SNAP to low-income populations in areas of wide-spread poverty. People in serious need of healthy, lifesustaining food are qualifying for SNAP by Cat El yet would be denied access if the proposed rule is adopted.

ELCA social teaching urges Lutherans to engage in service and advocacy for our neighbor in need of daily bread. These faith practices express our relationship with Jesus Christ, rooted in baptism that sends us out for the sake of the world.

"When we pray in the Lord's Prayer, 'Give us this day our daily bread,' we place ourselves in tension with economic assumptions of our society. Rather than being self-sufficient, we need and depend on what God gives or provides through people, practices, and systems. 'Daily bread' is not earned by efforts of individuals alone, but is made possible through a variety of relationships and institutions [note to Martin Luther's 'The Large Catechism']. God gives in ways that expand our notions of who 'us' includes, from people close at hand to those around the globe. In stark contrast to those who seek unchecked accumulation and profit, our attention is drawn to those who are desperate for what will sustain their lives for just this day." – From ELCA social statement Sufficient, Sustainable Living for All.

ELCA World Hunger works to change the systems that perpetuate poverty based on extensive ministry with our membership, congregations and communities, knowing we can't do it alone. Elected officials must carry out the essential role government plays to help people who need nutritious food.

Time is short, and your voice is essential now before Sept. 23! The proposed rule is harmful because it:

- Increases hunger for families by eliminating access to SNAP for 3.1 million vulnerable people.
- Ignores the will of Congress when it addressed this issue in the 2018 Farm Bill
- Harms grocery retailers and agricultural producers by reducing the amount of SNAP dollars available to spur local economic activity
- Threatens the health outcomes and learning potential of children

# Grammy nominated Tammi Brown Sunday, September 1 @ 9:30 worship

Her beautiful, hair-raising voice has woven itself into the cultural backdrop of the Monterey Bay area. Infused with the raw power of her gospel upbringing, her voice is rich with tone and six-octave range, from sultry tenor to the high peels of soprano. But it's the goosebumps on the back-of-the-neck affect she has that makes her presence so unforgettable.

Born into the musically fertile atmosphere of the Pentecostal Movement her parents belonged to in Oakland, she started singing her heart out in the kids choir. By the time she was four, she was standing up to play the Hammond organ.

"Within that kind of Christian environment music is everything," said Brown "Music drives the entire service. Music is so powerful it can work up the entire congregation into a frenzy."

Hence the goosebumps, which cross the threshold from the Christian environment into the human experience, period. When Brown opened for Joan Baez at the Esalen Institute, Native American Chief Little Bear came up to tell her how profoundly her performance of "Power of Prayer" had affected him. It "opened up a window to my ancestors that had long been closed" he said.

These are all emotions that come out of me from my heart," Brown said. "when I'm singing, I'm telling a tory. It has a lot to do with how you live your life, how you treat other people, the love you show, or the hate you show. All of that comes out as who you are through your voice. You're turning yourself inside out and showing the world who you are."

She appears regularly at the Kuumbwa Jazz Center, sang with the white Album Ensemble, and opened for Maya Angelou at the Civic Auditorium. She performs at the Monterey Jazz and Blues festivals, and received the 2013 Gail Rich Award for lifetime contribution to the arts and entertainment scene in SC.

There is no doubt that Brown, who calls the Soquel Hills home, is loved and embraced by her community, but it's critical that we get one thing clear: Tami Brown in no small town singer.

She has performed all over the world, from the storied Apollo Theater in NYC to the Mumbai Stadium in India. She has collaborated with an extensive list of acclaimed artists. Her work with Stanly Jordan on the 2008 tune "Stepppin' Out" received a Grammy nomination.

Through the pain of losing her mother at an early age, and the challenges of life itself, Tammi found peace in God and the healing power of music. "I found my joy through music ... When I'm singing, I'm telling a story."

### **Attending Sunday School Benefits Kids**

"Train up a child in the way he should go / Even when he is old he will not depart from it." The aim of Proverbs 22:6 isn't to force worship upon our children. You wouldn't expect a child to fall in love with math after a couple of multiplication tables. By exposing your child to Sunday School, you're laying a groundwork for them to reap all the benefits of your community of worship.

**Building a Moral Compass** If they don't have standards upon which to make decisions, how does anybody know what's right? Our values are guided by our parents and communities, but as your children's curiosity develops, they are sure to wonder upon what those values are based. For generations, parents have answered this question by pointing to the Word. This is fundamental to worship: each verse's wisdom has stood the test of millennia and has the power to answer any questions about what is right. Herein lies the value of early-age Bible study: by making the Word relevant to children's lives, they internalize valuable lessons for use throughout the rest of their lives.

**Community** The Church should be a place of peace, contemplation, and forgiveness. Through regular Sunday school and worship, your child will nurture tighter connections to their faith. They'll come to see church as a place of positivity and growth — as it should be!

**Relationship with God**It takes a long time to build a relationship with God—it's crucial to get started early so your child will be comfortable asking the Lord for guidance and forgiveness later in life. Like any other good habit, nightly prayer and humility toward God is something you must train. If your children don't grow up with the Church, when will they learn these good habits?

Setting your child forward on the right foot is a service you can't value in dollars. Everyone needs a platform to stand on, a road to walk: that's the essence of Solomon's wisdom in Proverbs 22:6. With the Lord's guidance, it's never too early for your child to start living the right life.


