#### **Advent Wreath**

Growing up Lutheran, an Advent Wreath has always been part of counting the weeks until Christmas. It was exciting to watch each week as the wreath which hung from velvet ropes, was lowered from the ceiling so that

an acolyte could light the next candle. It has been my pleasure and privilege to construct the Advent Wreath for St. Stephen's these past years. This year as I thought about the wreath I wondered why this tradition became part of the Lutheran church so I did some research and I decided to share the information I found with you.

Advent means "the arrival". The symbol of the wreath helps us to focus on and remember the promised arrival of our Savior, Jesus and his promised return. The four candles on the wreath signify hope, peace, joy, and love, and the wreath itself is a circle of living greens to signify god's infinite love for mankind. The candle in the middle, the fifth candle is lit on Christmas Eve as a symbol of Christ's coming into the world. This is known as the Christ Candle.

But, what is the origin of the Wreath? Johann Hinrich Wichern was a Lutheran Missionary in Hamburg, Germany in 1833 where he ministered to the poor. He founded a school for neglected and orphaned children to feed, house and educate them. During the time leading up to Christmas, the children could not contain their excitement. To help them wait patiently Johann created the first Advent wreath. The first wreath had 24 candles. The four largest were white and lit on one of the four Sundays leading up to Christmas. The twenty smaller candles that circled the wreath were red and one was lit each day during daily prayers until Christmas Eve when the entire wreath was lit.

The tradition of lighting the Advent wreath spread throughout Germany. As the tradition evolved, the number of candles lessened so that there were only four white candles, one for each Sunday leading up to Christmas. In 1930 the Custom of the Advent Wreath spread to North America.

It is because of the historical significance of using white candles on the early wreaths that we use white candles on our Advent wreath at St. Stephen's. So this year as we lit each candle on the wreath and wait for Christmas I hope you will all take time out of you busy lives to give thanks and remember that Jesus came into this world as a baby and lived among us, died for us and rose again and we wait for the day that He will come again.

This year I am dedicating the Advent Wreath to my mother, Kathryn Lewis Greso, who started me on my faith journey. - Barbara Johnston

# from Pastor Jim...

This past month we observed the 30th anniversary of one of the most horrific events in El Salvador's history and modern church history, when 6 Jesuit priests, their housekeeper and her teenage daughter were brutally murdered in the middle of the night. What made it even more horrible was that it was carried



out by a group of soldiers who had been trained by our government. They were targeted for speaking out against the violence that they saw the poor experiencing as they tried to organize themselves for better lives.

Most times that our delegation goes to visit our sister parish in El Salvador, part of the itinerary is to visit the Pastoral Centre of the University where this atrocity took place. One of the more sobering experiences is viewing photographs of the unimaginable scene in the garden area where the bodies were found, and then walking through the same garden later on.

For me, it is something that will always be etched in my memory, along with visiting the chapel where Archbishop Oscar Romero was assassinated by a soldier with a machine gun as he celebrated Holy Communion at the altar. More recently, the same feelings, questions and commitments to fight against these things surfaced during my visit to Flossenburg, Germany to pay my respects to Rev. Dietrich Bonhoeffer's witness of faith as he was executed at the concentration camp there for his participation in a plot to assassinate Hitler.

Advent is a short season, but is filled with messages from the prophets about how God wants there to be justice for the poor and vulnerable and peace among the nations. This is in direct contrast to the values of whatever current empire is in physical power in our world and lives, where only the strong and well-off survive and deserve a better life.

As we prepare to send off another delegation to strengthen our relationships with our dear friends in El Salvador and continue to work for God's ways of justice and peace so that those things never happen again, and as we enter the hopeful anticipation of Advent, we are reminded of the very serious nature of the pursuit of the Christian faith. There are signs once again that the forces of empire in our own nation need to be held in contrast and accountable to the ways that our Creator hopes for us to live in. May our watching and waiting not be a passive endeavor that tacitly approves the things that led to the instances I shared above. May our focus stay strong and may we be willing to also put our lives on the line when it comes to speaking out for what is true, what is right and what is just. Amen.

#### **Council Highlights**

- 1. Devotions were from the book <u>From the Steeple to the Street</u>. We remembered that we are in a "Post-Christendom" society and that we will have to stop relying on typical ways to welcome new people, as we move toward possibly beginning a fresh expression of the church.
- 2. Rev. Herb Schmidt gave us an update about our work to help the homeless through the Assoc. of Faith Communities. 30 parking places are currently being offered in other church's parking lots and the Santa Cruz police station. We can help by providing a meal once a week at the Winter Emergency Shelter at the Vets Hall on 7th Ave near the church. Look for sign-ups. He thanked the congregation for the use of two parking spots to store their truck and trailer.
- 3. COPA continues to work to bring affordable housing and more behavioral health services as Kaiser seeks to build a new clinic in Live Oak. We will host a Behavioral Health Civic Academy on Sat. Feb. 8th to learn more.
- 3. The ELCA Model Constitution was updated last August and we will be bringing the changes for approval to the Annual Meeting, which was set for Sunday, January 26 after one service worship at 9:30a.
- 4. Kent Madsen introduced the 2020 budget for discussion. As stated in last years motion to approve an amended budget, a task force of the Council is working on bringing a proposal for how we may fund our budget into the future.


