



#### from Pastor Jim...

For my Pastor's Report at the Annual Meeting we held Sunday, January 26, I talked about where I think God may be calling us to next. I was reminded of the scripture verse I began my service with you as your pastor some 23 years ago - John 15:8 - which says "My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples".



We have borne much fruit together as we have sought God's will for our church in our particular community. Most recently we have borne much fruit that will last in the opening of St. Stephen's Senior Housing and the Child Development Center, which is now firmly established in its 8th year. After a very fruitful sabbatical time of "Into the Wilderness to Share the Good News", I am discerning where God may be leading us next as we enter the wilderness of the church/cultural landscape of declining participation and resources.

What has given me hope for breaking down the very solid barrier between our church and people becoming a part of this faith community, is something called Fresh Expressions US. This is a movement that began in the very traditional Anglican Church of England and has made its way across the pond to mostly the East Coast, with a few churches here in the West. I spent a week in Seattle last June visiting one of them and saw how people who normally don't go to church, found the Fresh Expression a very inviting and meaningful church experience. People came to church!

With the commitment of our church at the Annual Meeting to maintain our current level of pastoral and staff compensation, I am feeling called to lead us to begin a Fresh Expression of our own somewhere in our Live Oak neighborhood, away from our facility. The Council will soon finish our study of the seminal book of this movement that some are calling 'The New Reformation', and then I hope we will decide to engage in some contextual training with a leader to begin to plan how it will take shape.

It is important to remember that this movement is alongside our existing traditional church and not in place of it. We will be partners together as we follow God's Spirit "From the Steeple to Street". This may lead to some changes in things like service times for when we gather. We need to offer a better witness from our traditional church, as opposed to two mostly vacant and sad-feeling Sunday morning services.

Most of all, this is going to take a total commitment from every one of us to face up to the fact that if we do not set out in our wilderness and take some risks, we will be resigning ourselves to closure, as so many churches like us have done in the past 20 or so years. We all need to completely get behind our call to share the message of Jesus Christ with those who are not yet a part of this faith community. I, too, am apprehensive, but I only need to remember the stories of Scripture and our own church recently, to know that God is faithful! Amen!

#### **Council Highlights**

- 1. For our devotion time we continued studying "From the Steeple to the Street" by Travis Collins of Fresh Expressions US. We are nearing completion of the book as we prepare to engage in beginning our own Fresh Expression of our church somewhere in our surrounding community. We discussed Ch. 25 "Creating a Missional Culture, However, Is Critical (And Hard)"
- 2. Duncan Plumbing had to use a different repair method for our sewer line that cost \$1000 more than the initial estimate. The CDC contributed \$2950 toward the \$8800 cost.
- 3. Annual Meeting actions taken on Sun. Jan.26:
- a) Approved 2020 budget to maintain current staffing level, and a 5 year authorization to spend up to \$25,000 per year from our reserves of \$1.4 million. Vote was 31-13.
- b) Approved statement of welcome to become an official Reconciling in Christ congregation. This means that we will publicly offer this statement which specifically designates our church as welcoming and accepting of all LGBTQ persons as beloved children of God as they were created.
- c) Alyssa Burkhardt, Steven Hendrickson, and Paul Cunningham were elected to 3yr. Council terms.
- d) Kent Madsen and Barbara Rice were elected as our Synod Assembly delegates for May 1-3 in Fresno, where a new Bishop will be elected.

#### 2020 ELCA Advocacy Federal Policy Priorities

Looking ahead, 2020 is likely to be an eventful year. In the midst of societal shifts and opportunities, ELCA Advocacy has identified areas of priority for our work together on the federal level. "These priorities reflect ELCA Advocacy commitments for faithful and timely attention to pressing concerns that affect our neighbor's well-being and the wholeness of creation," says the Rev. Amy E. Reumann, Director of ELCA Advocacy.

In the ELCA we believe that, through baptism, God is calling us into the world to serve together. We are a church that views governments as helpful ways God is active in our world and that is energized by lively engagement in our faith and public life. When we, as ELCA members, lift our voices together to influence policies that advance the common good, we further God's work in our world.

Shaped by the ELCA's social teaching documents and the experiences of its congregations, ministries and partners, we advocate to end world hunger and stands up for policies that create opportunities to overcome poverty, promote peace and dignity, preserve God's creation and promote racial justice.

You will find ELCA faith-based advocates meeting with policy makers, taking joint action with values-sharing issue partners, writing letters, making public comments, talking with neighbors, asking questions in town hall meetings — listening, learning, educating and visibly and skillfully asserting policy considerations guided by faith foundations.

In addition to faith-based advocacy organized by local congregations and synods, by Lutheran state public policy offices and by Lutheran Office for World Community representation to the United Nations, ELCA Advocacy is active in Washington, D.C.

#### **Child Development Center**

It is the month to celebrate LOVE. We are fortunate to share plenty of love at our preschool.

The children are joyful with each other and give their teachers plenty of hugs. It is a blessing to experience the innocence of true regard for one another, and to observe the children's love for Jesus each week at Chapel.

The parent teacher conferences and holidays are behind us. In January, we began to apply the teacher's goals to individualized curriculum for our students. We discovered we had three students who are still trying to visually identify letters and numbers. They are excelling in the other areas but need extra support and observation in learning the visual component of letter and number identification. Visual discrimination continuum begins with objects, colors, shapes, letters, numbers, then letters and sounds. Currently we have a full staff so one teacher can take these three students into a private classroom and play games like numbers and letters Bingo, along with other games. The goal is to have them learn with children who are where they are in the learning process. They can notice they are not alone in their need and desire to learn, in this case to visually identify letters and numbers. Nor do they have children who know the answer and sharing the answer with the group before they get a chance to try and answer. Small group learning is beneficial in individualizing and showing the children that they are important and noticed. If improvement is observed, then we continue this process along with the regular group curriculum. If we do not notice progress, then the parents have a chance to pursue support through their local school district in preparation for their child's transition to Kindergarten.

Our overall goal is to foster a love for learning in a developmentally appropriate environment. You cannot force what naturally needs to emerge in each child. Whether it is hearing and speech, fine motor development and writing, social emotional support, or visual identification, we can seek problem solving skills from professionals paired with mainstream learning. Early Childhood Education is the opportunity to fill up their toolbox so they can confidently move to Kindergarten.
