

More on the January 2020 Delegation Trip


I mentioned some highlights last month: the Scholarship Ceremony and meeting prayer children and their families as we visited homes in the communities of Guillermo Ungo.

One new destination this year was the historic and beautiful town of Panchimalco, located southwest of San Salvador. The colonial church, Santa Cruz de Roma (Holy Cross of Rome), is shown above. According to Wikipedia, it is the oldest surviving colonial structure in El Salvador. Panchimalco is known as one of two surviving settlements with an indigenous Pipil population. It also is the home of many artists and galleries.

We spent a night in Suchitoto, where we stayed at the hostel in the "Centro", the Art Center for Peace. The Center is always bustling with art projects and classes. It is the local institution that handles our scholarship money for Guillermo Ungo. Sister Peggy, President, always has a creative take on current events; and she also works in a little theology for good measure.

Since we started the water and sanitation projects in El Pilar, comprised of Bendicion de Dios and Las Orquideas, it's important to include them. This year was no exception. While part of our group hosted a craft project for the kids, the board members met with the leadership of the two communities to discuss our ongoing latrine project. We have been using an NGO, ESNA, to be our people "on the ground" for the project. This year, we are trying something different: we have forged an agreement to work directly with community leaders and have worked out a way to transfer funds. We hope to save money this way and build more latrines!

from Pastor Jim...

The final chapter of the book study ("From the Steeple to the Street" by Travis Collins of Fresh Expressions US) we have been doing as a Church Council for the last year and a half, is entitled, "You and Your Church Can Do This".



All along, the main theme of the book has been to help churches live up to our true calling, purpose and mission: To share the message of God through Jesus Christ with those outside of the church. Beginning a Fresh Expression of the church out in the community and away from the church building is proving to be a worthwhile endeavor for many churches like ours who are more traditional and experiencing decline.

However, this idea is one we are not accustomed to undertaking and involves venturing out into a kind of wilderness and take some risks. Here are some of the most common questions that arise:

1. **"Is this going to grow our church?"** - Possibly. Some who attend the Fresh Expression of church eventually want a fuller experience with the Body of Christ, so they become part of the existing church.

Some in the larger community are drawn to a church that is being boldly creative. That witness opens up doors to people's hearts and helps them overcome perceived barriers to becoming part of the existing church community.

Alan Hirsch observed: "It seems that when the church engages at the fringes, it almost always brings life to the center."

Another biblical and spiritual concept is that when the church takes risks, gives away and sends itself out, it creates spaces that God can fill with even more than what was thought.

We must remember that numerical growth is never the point of the work of the church. The point is to be the kind of selfless, loving effort that embodies Christ for the world. Beginning a Fresh Expression of church is not really about *us*!

Steven Croft offers this helpful reminder: "Church never finds its true center by turning in on itself. When preoccupation with its own survival takes center stage, then the church ceases to live in harmony with its very life-force. When it loses sight of its very reason of existence, inevitable dysfunction and atrophy set in."

As we move in this direction as a church we will need to continually face these kinds of questions with a faithful focus and hope. Next month I'll talk about more of these kinds of common questions.

<u>Remembering Rev. Bonnie Bell:</u> <u>Liturgical Choreographer and Inclusive Theologian</u>

Our beloved Bonnie Bell bestowed a legacy gift through chosen selections at her Memorial Service. The liturgy had wonderful moments of creative spontaneity, especially in the hymn, Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ. Her note below the entry reads, "Maracas, sticks, whatever." A magical moment ensued as the instruments were distributed, and excited anticipation arose. Those who know Bonnie will attest to her desire for playful, not entirely serious approaches to worship.

Her inclusivity, from a theological perspective, shone forth in two distinctive ways. First, her musical selections had simple phrases, making it very easy for all to join into singing. She always wanted to include everyone, especially those who may not be versed in church hymnody. Another feature of her song selections is that they reflect human emotion, while praising and seeking Jesus. This is a beautiful synthesis of emotions and thought; for Bonnie was very much a feeling and emotional person, as well as being very competent in biblical knowledge and theology. Her well rounded spirituality extends to seeing all of creation in the Imago Dei, or the Image of God. This awareness was evident in her hymn selection: "All Creatures. Worship God Most High."

Along with the closing blessing which is attributed to St. Francis, Bonnie was encouraging us to expand our vision of the embodiment of God in the world. The closing hymn, "Lead Me, Guide Me," gives an emotional reminder of what was a favorite hymn during her years at Light of Life Lutheran Church. These examples of her parting words to us reveal a creative spirit that all can fondly remember. We pray for Bonnie's family and all who dearly love her. Praise be to God for her time with us, and an example of faithful creativity and inclusivity.

Luke 2:22-40 Simeon & Anna Rejoice at dedication of Jesus

What is a community? A group of people gathered together for shared reasons. A community is helpful in a number of ways:

- it can teach you things that you don't yet know.
- It can remind you of things you know but have forgotten.
- It helps you to keep doing the things that the community cares about and why you joined it in the first place.
- It listens to you and cares about what you say.

Just like Jesus grew up in a community that supported and encouraged him to be a person who paid attention to God, so too do you and I have a community that reminds us and teaches us about paying attention to God here at St. Stephen's. Like Simeon and Anna, OUR church community rejoices when YOU are here.

Matthew 5:13-20 You are the Light of the World

If a flashlight doesn't work, what might be the problem? They need batteries. If we are the flashlight, then God is our battery. Before our light will shine, we must be connected to God's power supply. We get that connection through worship and praise here at St. Stephen's.

Jesus the light of the world, calls us (his followers) to let the light of their good works shine before others. Through baptism we are sent into the world to shine with the light of Christ. "Be the salt of the earth and the light of the world, doing good works and keeping God's commandments." Just like dominos, and the ripple effect. We touch EVERYONE around us.

Dear St. Stephen's -

You gave a total of \$188 in

2019. Because of your generosity, last

year, 133 households comprised of 268 adults and kids have moved into permanent homes.

Like many across the nation, we are a community experiencing homelesssness. We all know someone who has been affected by the lasck of affordable housing and/or homelessness, whether directly or indirectly. Know that the team at Housing Matters, with the board and community's backing, works 24/7 to help our neighbors avoid homelessness or quickly get out of it. Your gifts show that SC has the compassion, innovative spirit, and steadfast commitment to build a future in which everyone has a home.

Our newest program, which serves young adults, housed its first client. We call it Youth Rapid Re-housing, which sounds more complicated thatn it is. Our community has identified that young adults ages 18-24 have unique needs, and in 2019 we launched a new program to serve them. A few months after launch, our first client is now in a home of his own. Now, he can focus on building a strong future, instead of worrying where he'll sleep tonight.

In 2019 our community rallied like never before. We hope you'll continue your commitment to resolving homelessness together in 2020. We are grateful for your continued support.

you may dine in, or order take out, and 30% of your order will be donated to our preschool's scholarship fund. Be sure to mention our group when you place your order, so we receive the donation!

St. Stephen's continues to strive to provide an affordable preschool option for families. Our scholarship fund has reduced such that next year we can only offer a scholarship discount for one student. Typically, we have had 3 students per year who are provided a significant discount. Over the years we have provided quality care and education to over a dozen families who otherwise could not have had their child attend. This is due to the generosity of 3 women in our congregation who originated the scholarship fund with monthly donations each of \$150.00, for 5 - 7 years. This year we are down to one monthly contributing donor. Another generous church member donated one day a week, for this school year, to a child who could only afford 2 days. This student is thriving and needed the extra day as it will be her only year in Preschool before kindergarten. There are various reasons why people have needed the scholarships, but one common thread is the parents were working on their own education or improving their earning ability to provide for their family. Their gratitude has been great. Each year I provided a letter to our donors, so they knew the stories of the children they were contributing to, and the difference it made for each child and their family. We do offer the most affordable tuition rate in Santa Cruz County, but each year we must consider raising the tuition. This means each year it becomes more difficult for families to afford.

School Board President, Barbara Johnston, came up with the idea to designate this fundraiser as another opportunity to provide scholarship opportunities for young children. Last year it was so much fun to gather at Pizza My Heart, including the Lapp family, and fellowship at Pizza My Heart. We would love for



church members to join in whether you eat in, take out, or ask your friends and family to participate. It all counts. If you have any guestions or want to contribute in another way to our scholarship fund in the future, please contact Kathy. Thanks for your consideration! Warmly, Kathy Berens
