

#### Good News!

Last month I told you about something new for us — working directly with El Pilar community leaders to build the next group of composting latrines. Previously we worked through an NGO with people on the ground in El Salvador to handle funds and oversee the construction activity. We negotiated an agreement during the January 2020 delegation and put the final version together once we returned home. Eliminating the "middle" man" saves a considerable amount of money. Communication is also key. Due to the expanded use of smartphones in El Salvador and the availability of messaging software WhatsApp we can readily exchange information. Construction started in February with the transfer of funds; the industrious Salvadorans went right to work. You are seeing here one of



the first three completed latrines under this plan. The fourth is under construction. Thanks be to God!

God's work. Our hands.

For many people in the ELCA it means coming to worship with the assistance of a mobility, audio, visual or sensory device. Unfortunately, in many of our churches or places of worship it is our siblings in Christ who have disabilities and need such devices who feel the least welcome at the table. Why? A lack of ramps, braille or large print hymnals, or elevators are not the only (or first) obstacle encountered. Many times it is the language used when talking about or concerning disability that is problematic or unwelcoming to many.

Talking about disability can feel awkward sometimes. The language doesn't feel right. We often don't know what to say or how to speak publicly in our liturgy, sermons and prayers. At times we will fall into the trap of affirming who a person is "despite" their disability, rather than simply honoring who they are. A beloved child of God. Whole, complete. Just as they are. What needs to change? Where do hospitality and authentic welcome to worship begin?

Using person-first language is a great place to start. This language is meant to acknowledge that a person is not their diagnosis or disability in a negative way. It reminds us that someone is a person first and foremost, whose identity is rooted in being a child of God. Also, in person-first language, we avoid language that talks about suffering, or that victimizes or infantilizes the person.

Example: a wheelchair bound person vs. a person who uses a wheelchair.

Disability Ministries has prepared a document that can help us think about how to use person-first language in worship and in the whole of our lives together. The document helps us understand what person-first language is and provides examples for how it can be used in worship. It also serves as a reminder to us that language around disability is constantly evolving and is often contextual.

#### Disability vs. varied ability vs. differently abled

"For myself (Lisa Heffernan), terms like varied ability and differently abled wrap up disability into too nice of a little bow. This language feels condescending to me. I have a disability. I own it. I'm OK with it. This is how I was made. Yes, we all have varied and different abilities. I am a paraplegic. I use a wheelchair. Saying I have a disability does not take away my identity or sense of self and who God made me to be. 'Varied' and 'differently abled' don't own that part of who I am enough for me. I am not 'disabled'; my wheelchair and spina bifida do not hinder my life. They, largely, make it the gift it is. I HAVE a disability, and that's OK. The self I bring to worship has a disability but is not broken or 'less than' because of it."

We hope this document is a starting point or a conversation starter as we work toward making our worship and the language we use in it more inclusive and barrier free. Our language isn't perfect, but we serve a God who guides us as we come together as the whole body of Christ, where all are truly welcome.

As we each face the unimaginable circumstances surrounding the coronavirus pandemic, I am trying to feel my way through how we can continue to be church despite not

We are also called to dig deeper into what our faith means to us in these days when so much that we are used to being able to do, can't be done right now.

One aspect of our faith that is certainly helpful is that we believe that God's Spirit draws especially closer during times of uncertainty and difficulty like now. So I encourage you to really look for the ways that God's grace and love will surprise you as we endure this time together. Already, I sense that we are becoming a much closer congregation, and we are drawing a deeper strength from our understanding of how living God's ways prepares us well for the living of these days. Here are a few ways to sustain our spirits in the coming weeks:

**Sunday Worship Service Recordings:** We will offer a recording of the worship service on our website. Please gather your family or just yourself on Sunday morning March 29 and April 5th (Palm Sunday), and bring some bread and wine or grape juice for when Pastor Jim celebrates Holy Communion.

Wednesday Lenten Worship, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday: Pastor Jim will offer a livestream opportunity for us to gather online for worship at 7pm on Wed. April 1, Thursday April 9 & Friday April 10. An email will be sent to you with a link to a Zoom meeting. Just click on the link and join the gathering.

Phone Calling Connection: Our Sustainability Task Force members, led by Chair Mark Linder, will be checking in with members of the congregation to learn how they are doing and to find out if they need anything. It is important that our congregation remains a strong community. This is a continuation of Task Force efforts to keep fostering a relational culture at St. Stephen's that strengthens the Body of Christ that we are trying to be in our community.

#### **Council Highlights**

1. With Pastor Jim on vacation in a more remote part of Mexico without reliable wifi, while all of the coronavirus events and decisions were rapidly developing, we were unable to make many decisions about how our ministry would adapt until he returned on March 14. President Renee Rice and Pastor Jim made the decision to cancel the Council retreat and regular meeting, which was to have taken place the next day, Sunday March 15. At that time there was only a restriction in place that prohibited gatherings of over 50 people and it was too late in the week to notify everyone of a cancellation, so Pastor Jim employed safe distancing among those gathered, did not offer Holy Communion of Sharing of the Peace, and sanitized doors and handles. About a dozen people attended each service, none of which were from the "vulnerable" population. The next day an email vote was taken by Council to cancel all church and outside group activities through April 7th in order to comply with the County Public Health Order. Future plans will be contingent upon what the County, State and Federal Governments require as we support the efforts to slow the spread of the coronavirus.

Below is a correspondence we received from former member and Council President Erik Larson, who now lives in the San Jose area. We rejoice with him and his new congregation at this wonderful news! It is yet another extension of the fruit that was born through St. Stephen's pursuit and development of our land for affordable housing.

"I am pleased to announce that the County of Santa Clara Board of Supervisors has just approved allocating \$16 million of measure A funds to construct housing for the homeless at Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church property (1710 Moorpark Ave. San Jose). We are one step closer to realizing our vision of renewing the mission at IELC. Hallelujah!"

#### **Lent Statement on building homes for the homeless**

(Sent to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors)

My name is Erik Larsen. I am the Church Council President of Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church of San Jose. We are a small congregation at the corner of Leigh and Moorpark. And we have big plans. For two years we have grown a partnership with Mid Pen Housing to develop 106 units for the formerly homeless. It's an exciting project.

During these two years we have been guided by scripture and prayer. Hebrews Chapter 13: verses 1-3 talks about Welcoming the Stranger. Hebrews says, keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters. <sup>2</sup>Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. <sup>3</sup>Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering.

Poverty in Santa Clara County is crushing families and individuals. The majority of working people are unable to earn a living wage. The stress of just paying \$2000 to \$3,000 per month rent is unbearable. People are pushed out of homes. And there are the long commutes. If you cannot find a place on a couch, if you cannot find a car/RV to sleep in, if you cannot find a room to sub rent, you end up on the green ways of HWY 280 and other places. You see it every day.

I am tired of remembering those imprisoned by poverty, suffering from alcohol or drugs abuse to numb the pain, or going crazy because of how damn hard it is to live here. Our church is called to LOVE and show HOSPITALITY to strangers. We are called to liberate the oppressed. And I am here today on behalf of my church to take one small step towards to creating a new reality right here and right now.

I want to thank you for your leadership and for your support for this project and voting just a moment ago to allocate \$16 million in Measure A funds to build housing for the homeless at Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church. LOYB, it is a powerful thing. The HOSPITALITY of cre-



#### Sunday School

Normally, Lent is my favorite time in the church year. To me it's just so real and personal. It's also the most challenging time to be a Sunday school teacher. So many tricky lessons that even adults struggle with. I planned to journey into the wilderness each week, climbing the mountain to receive God's message. But now, with all the fear and unknown, the Lenten wilderness has become our daily lives. I pray that within our family cocoons, we may see Jesus and remain hopeful that the darkness is only temporary...

Matthew 4:1-11 Jesus was led up by the Spirit to the wilderness and tempted. Our focus was on Jesus saying NO to the evil in the world. I don't use the "D" word. We remember right from wrong = good vs evil. We climbed our virtual mountain to retrieve God's rules, and practice following them.

I've noticed that with this curriculum, there isn't the telling of all the traditional stories that we learned as kids. I will be trying to link some of them in. We read about Jonah. It was fun to see how interested they were because of the fantastical nature of the story. Jonah not only didn't want to do what God asked, but he actually thought he could hide from God. News Flash: God see's you! Eventually, after hardship, Jonah obeyed God and had quite the testimony because of it. We discussed what a parable is, and how obeying God produces good in everyone!!!

These are a few of the lessons we would have done together:

John 3:1-17 A new life in Christ / Born of Water and Spirit Nicodemus came to Jesus late one night because he was "Hungry". No he wasn't looking for a late night snack; he was hungry for spiritual food. He was hungry for the truth about the kingdom of God. He came to Jesus because he had questions and he knew that Jesus would have the answers.

Nicodemus reminds me of the book The Very Hungry Caterpillar. He ate and ate but was still hungry. He built a small house (cocoon) and slept for weeks. He then pushed his way out transformed into a butterfly, a totally new creation. That's the way it is when we are born again and let Jesus re-create us!

John 9:1-13 Jesus Heals a Blind Man One day Jesus was walking with his disciples when they passed by a blind man. When they saw him the disciples asked Jesus who was to blame for his blindness. Was it because of his sin or was it because of his parents sins? Jesus answered them and told them that no one was to blame, he was blind so that God's works could be shown in him. Then Jesus healed the man and the people praised and glorified God for his goodness.

Dear Lord, the difficulties in our life seem small when compared to what others may be facing. Help us not to grumble and complain, but to praise and alorify you in every situation. Amen. 6 ~ Miss Leslie
