A Message From our Church Administrator

The great news is I've been given permission to ease back into work! My body will be my guide. I am out of the worry zone - except for the fall factor. The old me (pre accident) would charge ahead and think later, I've had to say goodbye to her. Unfortunately I still have issues with sitting for long periods and looking at a computer screen. Hmmm, this will be interesting. But ya'll know I'm one to rise to a challenge. As I progress, some are using the word "miracle". Aside from my survival & healing, it is a miracle that I am not angry, or afraid. My apologies if this reference is getting old, but I have not quite moved on!

My return to worship on Easter was an emotional gift. I did not have the courage to sit outside in my wheelchair, so I stayed in the car. Throughout the service I was met with your beautiful faces, distance hugs, and hand hearts. Literally followed by a reception line at my window. I was deeply moved by your love.

I was also blessed to return to the Women's Cafe group. To be surrounded by women of faith whom I have known and trusted for many years was absolutely exhibarating. Their witness as they met without me was inspiring. God is continuing to reveal

many blessings through my trauma.

Thankfully, I am now able to read....so I am reading LOTS. Nuggets of inspiration have come from surprising authors. This makes me realize that the old me, was searching for God and my calling in BIG things rather than every day life. But, it's the interactions and stuff of everyday life that God uses. I have gained more truth through my vulnerability. My circumstance has allowed me thoughtful time that I have never allowed myself. I feel that this is something many of us have in common. We convince ourselves that we are too busy to take spiritual time for ourselves. But my reality is that life is too short for us to not take that time!

As I reflect on my faith journey, I'm reminded that I come from beginnings rooted in simple tradition. Sure, we went to a large beautiful church, in a town (Ft. Wayne, IN) and time when every home had a church (either protestant or catholic). But I did not see faith in everyday activities beyond giving God credit for everything good and asking for help when things were rough. It wasn't until my confirmation that I had a "friend" from church. This friendship has been life long, and life changing. Going to Cal Lutheran for college and working at Mt. Cross each summer gave me the insight and permission to grow and showed me how to put my faith into action.

Prayer is everything. There is no perfect script. But finding one that works for you is so important. Inspired by Psalm 23:1 "The LORD is my shepherd; I have all that I

need." This one speaks loudly to me:

God, You have promised to care for us.
We bring You the needs of our hearts,
the needs of our relationships,
the needs of our situations,
and we trust that You will meet them.

You are our provider, our comforter, and the one who sustains us. Amen.

Remember:: We have EVERYTHING we need for this day, tomorrow, and forever!!!!

IN MEMORIAM

Jean Petersen February 2, 1931—April 27, 2021

Our beloved sister Jean died unexpectedly of cardiac arrest after receiving a pacemaker and recuperating in the hospital. Pastor Jim was able to visit her 3 days earlier in the hospital, as the first in-person visit in a hospital since February of last year. During our conversation Jean was feeling hopeful and well enough to tell me she was hoping to return as a volunteer in the church office with Leslie as she recovered.

Jean served as Council President and as a regular Reader of the holy scriptures in worship. She and Delores Price (who passed away just last year in July) gave the church our baptismal font, and dedicated it in honor of their husbands who also passed away within a year of each other.

Jean is survived by her son Mark, whom we were fortunate to get to know when they had to stay at the church for a week after being evacuated because of the CZU Complex Fire in the Santa Cruz mountains. Her daughter and other son passed away very close to each other in 2019.

Betty Kievlan July 29, 1940—April 23, 2021

Betty was a long-time member of St. Stephen's going back to when the church building was located on Pennsylvania Ave in the Seabright neighborhood from 1953—1961. Betty's daughter Lorie Juhl raised her 4 children at St. Stephen's and we were able to be with Betty for a service of Commendation of the Dying as she had been on Hospice Care for some time. She specifically mentioned to the Hospice Chaplain that she already had a pastor whom she wanted to preside at her funeral, but found comfort in praying the Lord's Prayer with her. A private memorial service will be held on May 3 at Pacific Gardens Chapel.

Betty is survived by her husband George, children Lorie, Elizabeth & David, and grandchildren Bradley, Jeffrey and twins Jessica and Briana.

El Salvador Sister Parish News



Like many of us, people in El Salvador are still dealing with the pandemic. Fortunately all teachers, both public and private, have been vaccinated and the country is working to get the general public vaccinated, working their way down from oldest to youngest. In-

person school attendance was scheduled to begin the first of April but that was pushed out a week and it will only be for a couple of hours, two to three times a week. This is a very complicated situation and it remains to be seen how everything will be once they start.

The baskets that were provided by our student sponsors were very well received by all 120 students. In fact, this new approach worked so well, our Board is considering doing this again in January 2022 and focusing on other, non-essential items for the student to make the baskets more exciting. Stay tuned for more updates as we get closer to sponsorship time in the fall.

Our Board is also working with the school to setup what we are calling an 'Internet Café'. The internet signal at the school is very weak and this created problems when students were required to do distance learning. Establishing a stronger signal at the school and making it more available would certainly help and it is a step in the right direction for improvements at the school. Currently have \$1,200 in 'seed' money for the 'Internet Café'.

Our annual Wine Tasting Fundraiser has been tentatively scheduled for Saturday, September 25th at Bargetto Winery in Soquel. Last year, again because of COVID-19, we held our first ever 'Virtual Wine Tasting Event' which was very successful. More to come on this later.

We are also considering sending a delegation in January 2022 depending on the situation with the pandemic. If anyone is interested in participating on a delegation, please contact Kent Madsen. We are not asking for commitments at this time, but would like to know what the level of interest is at St. Stephen's.

Bishop Eaton issues statement on Gun Violence

He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed (1 Peter 2:24).

Dear church,

As a nation we have lived through a very difficult two weeks following the mass shootings in Atlanta on March 16 and again in Boulder, Colo., on March 22. The shooting in Colorado was only the most recent of **104 mass shootings** already in 2021. Colorado has a painful history of mass shootings. Since 1993 the deadliest incidents have been the 1999 Columbine High School massacre, the mass shooting in a movie theater in Aurora and now the 10 lives taken, including the life of a responding police officer, at a supermarket in Boulder.

Together with God, we grieve with the families and communities impacted by gun violence — especially in communities where it is an everyday occurrence. These shootings are not isolated but rather a pattern of the gun violence crisis in the United States. The numbers of victims tell only a part of the pain — the trauma caused by gun violence ripples across family members, friends, neighborhoods, communities and this country.

As we near the Sunday of the Passion, we enter into the suffering of Christ and into solidarity with the sufferings of the world. As we look to the healing power of the cross, we celebrate the gift of peace through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As followers of Jesus, we are empowered to take up the challenge to prevent violence and grapple with the complex causes that make violence so pervasive.

The ELCA is a church in society **striving for peace** in all the world. Let us join with others in calling for greater gun safety, including preventing easy access to assault-style weapons and strengthening our federal system of background checks for all gun sales. We call for support and protection for those living out their vocations to protect and defend society, enforce the law and work toward restorative justice. We pray for rostered ministers who provide support and counseling services to those affected by gun-violence-related crimes even as we pray for the perpetrators of violent acts. We call upon congregations to hold safe space for those dealing with the fears and threats related to violence in all its manifestations.

They made it easy for us and we have appreciated them and the efforts their parents made to make this all work! We will miss them very much. The good news is several have siblings who will continue with us so we can enjoy a relationship with their families. What fun it is when graduates come to visit while picking up their younger siblings.

We have started to tour several families from our waiting list. Some have waited a year! When we do have an opening in August we don't have to delay their enrollment any longer. Our resting room is limited, so full time spots are hard to come by. We already have 3 for 2022/23. We have met wonderful people through this process and look forward to knowing many of them better!!

Highlights in the classroom this month are making Mothers Day gifts and sharing family culture and traditions. I get the opportunity to share my favorite hobby with our graduates, sewing. We make sachets. First they sew buttons on the fabric of their choosing. They catch on quick!! Then they learn to sew on the sewing machine creating little pillows to stuff with dried lavender. The younger children paint mini birdhouses. Teacher Caryn introduced a family culture project. This can be food, or any traditions in a simple way that their child can share as parents are still not in the classroom due to Covid. The most recent was Eva sharing pictures of El Salvador where her father is from. We ate pupusas! Particularly special as we have a connection through our church ministry with El Salvador! Another child will bring a pinata for her birthday, just to name a few. We appreciate Caryn's efforts in sharing with our community this way especially when we have been limited in what we can do. We are slowly tending to our garden and planting flowers. We have had many monarch caterpillars and we are trying not to disturb this very exciting metamorphosis in our own garden, especially since we want to encourage the population!

The very best part of this month is the return of my dear partner on campus, Leslie! I have missed her so much, however I have also had the opportunity to visit with many of you who stopped by and enjoyed getting to know you better! 
