El Salvador Sister Parish News

Welcome to the sister parish corner, with news and updates on the work with our companion communities in El Salvador, Guillermo Ungo and Fl Pilar

Guillermo Ungo School has been difficult this year in Guillermo Ungo due to the Covid-19 pandemic. In some ways, not too different from the remote learning here in California, but the difficulty with internet connections (see photo at right, "Seeking a Signal") and suitable equipment made it more challenging. The school year runs from January to early November, so it is just finishing up. The new year will continue with remote learning in January 2021. We are expecting the list of scholarship recipients soon. I will be contacting student sponsors once we have the new list. Stay tuned as we figure out an alternative method of providing the students with sponsor gifts and



greetings. In the past, we have asked you to fill one-gallon zip-style plastic bags with small items appropriate for your student. This year, due to the pandemic, there will not be a delegation going to El Salvador in December/January to carry the gifts. This will be the first time since 2001 that we will have an entire year without a delegation.

Your sister parish is the special benevolence for the month of November. Please give what you can to support our projects. The bulk of the special benevolence money will support scholarships.

We just completed Phase 5 of the composting latrine El Pilar project, with a total of 61 latrines built. Our original commitment was for 83 latrines, but we suspect the communities have grown since we started. We have enough funds already raised for at least another ten latrines but will need more to reach the goal.

Santa Cruz al Salvador continues to be very grateful for all the amazing support from the people in our congregations. Thank You!

It was felt that we wanted to have Suzanne's Memorial Service before the holidays, when so many of us will be grieving her loss as one who brought so much joy and meaning through music to so many during those times in previous years.

Please come if you are comfortable doing so. It will be an important expression of our love and appreciation to God for her witness and gifts shared among us for over 20 years as our Church Musician. We will also grieve together how it was too soon that she left our physical presence and suffered so much at the end of her life. At the same time, there is much to celebrate about who Suzanne was for the life of our congregation and the way she helped sustain our spiritual lives through music.

Blessed be the memory of this child of God. May light perpetual shine upon her.

Reconciled In Christ Welcome Statement

(Approved at January 2020 Congregational Meeting)

"We welcome all who are seeking God's love and grace. We welcome all because God welcomes all, regardless of race or culture, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, or relationship status. We welcome all without regard to addictions, physical or mental health, imprisonment, socio-economic circumstances, or anything that too often divides us. Our unity is in Christ."

Council Highlights

- 1. For devotions, Pastor Jim chanted the Psalm 96 for Sunday and related it to our current situation, reminding us that we are to tell our faith out among the nations and to never concede our loyalty to any empire, while working to allow God to be praised by restoring creation where we have harmed it.
- 2. Pastor Jim reported that there has been a slight decrease in participation and views in Bible Study and of our worship service, respectively. As the pandemic continues to affect so many and threaten so many others, there is a weariness and malaise that we tend to fall into because we can't gather as we used to. He reminded us of the importance to keep trying to engage with each other and participate in worship at home. Maintaining regular spiritual practices is essential to keeping ourselves hopeful and healthy as we get through this time together.
- 3. Pastor Jim reported that the family of Suzanne Duval and her close friend Katy have decided it is time to hold an outdoor Memorial Service on Sunday Nov. 15 at 11am. It will be set up like we do on the Sunday mornings we have had worship in the parking lot. This will be our first Memorial Service since we suspended in-person worship services.
- 4. Pastor Jim was a Co-Chair for COPA's Accountability Session with the District 1 candidates for County Supervisor. Both John Leopold and Manu Koenig agreed to all points of our agenda and to meet with us within 2 weeks of taking office to begin accomplishing our goals. 210 people attended the Zoom gathering with about 20 from St. Stephen's.
- 5. Council approved a motion to compensate Rev. Carol Been the amount of the Synod Guidelines for Pulpit Supply—\$275 for one service. There was some discussion about whether we might offer an additional amount taking into consideration the last minute extra effort that went into holding a Zoom worship service due to the unforeseen absence of our video production team.
- 6. Jay Johnston made a motion to return to regular in-person, indoor worship services beginning in November. The motion was defeated 8-1, but it led us to discuss what it will take for us to be able to return to regular in-person, indoor worship services. Pastor Jim expressed he would not consider leading a regular indoor worship service until a vaccine was received and made more broadly available. He suggested that we form a Task Force to think about how we might approach returning to regular in-person, indoor worship services. Jay Johnston, Paul Cunniungham and Bill Schraft volunteered to help with that. Pastor Jim will gather some info trom our Synod and local churches to help begin our conversation and potential plans and potential problems and issues with doing so.
- Council voted unanimously to hold another outdoor parking lot worship service on Sunday Nov. 22—Consecration Sunday– at 10:30pm

Faith Responses to Climate Change

On September 16, 2020, a Founder's Day event took place in Berkeley at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. An announcement was made about the institution becoming a Center for Climate Justice and Faith. There was a celebratory atmosphere as the featured speaker, Bill McKibben, (350.org) a preeminent Cultivating Hope & Healing for All spokesperson for Climate Change issues, was



introduced. What followed was a soft spoken, very humble, direct talk about what we face in Climate Change and what a faith response looks like.

After explaining that the world has about ten years to reverse highly accelerating temperature changes leading to catastrophic results, Bill named a number of behavioral changes for congregations and individuals to respond in faith and love.

We need to make a strong environmental witness by:

- a. standing up to "powers and principalities" by investing in a non fossil fuel portfolio in our congregation and personal financial lives.
- b. participate in direct action to stop destructive pollution
- c. vote for representatives who will implement changes
- d. preach from the pulpit about climate change at least once a month
- e. whenever the church has potlucks or other meals, be sure that whole food plant based foods are offered as a model of a positive faith response.

Another important action that one can take is to buy local and organic products and to utilize local farmer's markets regularly. Ultimately though, Bill said that "Market forces will not solve this, people need to come together."

At the end of his talk, Bill shared the phrase that connects much of what has happened in 2020 is "I can't breathe." May our love and actions rooted in faith help Earth to breathe again!

Your Tired Body. Our Exploited Earth. They're Connected. By Melody Zhang - Sojourners

Climate change, racism, and environmental violence share the same last name: extraction. They find root cause in the same atrophying of our national moral character and loss of communal responsibility. We are really up against old problems that every so often like to present a new face; today in the ways of police brutality, of insurgent wildfires, or of acid rain.

We all participate in the economy of extraction when we practice the belief that our Earth has no dignity, no life, or inherent value apart from what we get out of it for utility and for short-term profit. We participate in this economy when we continue to strip the dignity from any sort of bodily — or embodied — work and exploit mainly Black and brown bodies for hard labor with criminally low wages and working conditions in exchange for comfort enjoyed only by some. We all fall prey to the logic of extraction when we engage mindlessly in consumerism and accumulation, whether through buying stuff we do not need or wasting what we have. There are a thousand ways to participate in the economy of extraction, and most of the time we do it in willful ignorance.

Yet this legacy of extraction cannot co-exist with God's dreams. In God's order of things, nothing is created in vain, nothing goes to waste, and everything is treated with care. God longs for and is working toward wholeness and healing, toward justice and restoration for all created beings. We know this and we want to participate in building this radical and sacred economy - one where each person and every created being is indispensable and worthy of care.

This election, we have some choices. We could carelessly take a pen and scratch in a few checkmarks in one direction in alignment with our favorite political ideology and think our responsibilities are done. Or we can welcome the ballot as an invitation to examine our lives and consider how we might carefully inhabit our homes and communities in the years to come.

So can we each take our vote on Nov. 3 not as the end, but as a vow toward a renewed beginning? Christ followers cannot be single-party or even single-issue voters; Our alignment is always and only to God: God's desires of wholeness and liberation. God's dreams of radical welcome. God's movement toward justice - especially for members of our community who continue to be oppressed by the relentless churning of the extractive economy. We are not called simply to "vote for climate"; our responsibility is to show up season after season, in the personal realm and the public square, as a people committed to care-giving and to building vital community, no matter our position in the world.
