## **Church Council Highlights**

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church.)

1. The Special Congregational Meeting to ratify the actions taken at our January 30th Annual Meeting (due to the lack of a quorum at the Annual Meeting), was held on Sunday March 20th right after worship. After the surprise lack of a Postlude from our Church Musician :) our President Shelly Barker offered an introduction about what those actions were and received a motion and second to ratify the actions at the Jan. 30th Annual Meeting. It was unanimously approved.

2. Our Child Development Director, Kathy Berens, attended the Church Council as a guest. She introduced a proposal to hire a new bookkeeper for both the CDC And church staff payroll services. Our Treasurer, Kent Madsen, had been consulted and supported the proposal. Council approved the proposal and expressed gratitude to Kathy for taking on this task. This decision was necessary due to our previous payroll bookkeeper, Kathy Allen, deciding that she could no longer serve in that capacity. She will remain CDC Treasurer. Kent Madsen's recovery from surgery has progressed well and he is now able to resume the rest of the Treasurer's duties of paying the church's bills and producing the monthly financial reports.

3. The sanctuary roof repair was completed and Sherilyn Jager was able to secure a "church discount" of \$1000 from Knox Roofing! The total to repair the roof was \$1100. The balance of the Burkhardt donation for the roof repair was designated to the General Fund.

4. An Advisory Listening Panel has been formed by our ELCA Bishop Elizabeth Eaton to investigate the actions taken recently by our Sierra Pacific Synod Bishop Megan Rohrer regarding the removal of the pastor (Rev. Nelson Rabell-Gonzalez) of Mision Latina Luterana of Stockton—a new mission start congregation. This panel will be listening to all parties involved and report to Bishop Eaton, who will make a determination about what actions will be taken next. This is a complicated situation that calls for much prayer for our witness as an ELCA. For more info from all sides you will need to do your own internet search if interested.

I cannot believe it has been over ten years that we started this journey together. We began as a task force to establish our preschool, the dream of many, but **especially Sheila Buswell to build our own preschool ministry**. It took so many people over the years to pitch in and help. You have supported, offered time and talent, prayed for, and donated to our school. **We are on the map now, and people know us and recommend us to others. Our enrollment is full and waiting list is increasing.** Our community blends young families who meet new people in the area and reunite many who grew up here together only to meet at our school again with their children. The intertwining of community gives me goosebumps as I write this today.

There were many challenges to face along the way, but the team you hired to do this work, made it work. Our teacher turnover has been low. Some came without credential but were mentored and educated to become excellent teachers for us. I think about Caryn coming in the beginning and helping me have the courage to build the school. She could read my mind and keep me on task while I was learning so many new things. Brenda created and built our Toddler program. I begged her to join us and consider her the angel among us. There is no one better and we are so blessed that she is celebrating her 8<sup>th</sup> anniversary with us. Both teachers are incredibly talented and truly know the hearts of children. We were blessed to have Rebecca, Nicole, Frieda, Rachel, and Aliana for the time they spent with us. We really scored when Samantha De-Coster joined us and has stayed longer than planned. She is a well educated natural with children and a delight to work with. Just when we were so discouraged in replacing Caryn, Rosio Adame showed up here looking for a teaching job. She was an answer to our prayers, as if we ordered specifically the qualities and qualifications we were looking for. She and Sam make a very talented teaching team.

After years of building and Covid-19 closures, I have finally arrived at my ultimate dream job description. I get to do the administrating of the business,



Two weeks of intensive organizing by COPA wins a ninemonth, \$1.59M extension of the VIDA community health worker (CHW) program in Monterey County.

The vote was 4 to 1 at the Board of Supervisors' meeting on March 8<sup>th</sup>, extending the VIDA program at current levels to the end of 2022. Had the board failed to act, VIDA would have been reduced from 48 to 18 CHWs as of March 31<sup>st</sup>.


This victory was the result of two weeks of intense effort by COPA and its allies to organize support for the extension. Teams of COPA leaders each met with their district supervisor, telling stories about the impact of VIDA and asking their supervisor to support extension. COPA hosted an online event attended by over 100 COPA leaders, as well as Dan Baldwin, Executive Director of the Community Foundation of Monterey County, Supervisor Luis Alejo, Supervisor Wendy Root Askew and Kim Stemler, Director of the Grape Growers and Vintners Association.

Speakers told stories of how the CHWs have been effective in limiting the spread of COVID. One woman who speaks only Mixteco, an indigenous language of Mexico, was able to get her questions about vaccination answered, because Claudia, one of the CHWs, speaks both Mixteco and Spanish. Claudia then helped this woman register for a vaccination appointment. Weeks later the woman contacted Claudia because some of the people in her household had COVID symptoms. Claudia came to the house, administered rapid tests, and helped the infected family members to quarantine.

Fr. Lucas, a priest from King City told of how he had narrowly avoided infecting 200 parishioners at a weekend retreat. Maricela Acevedo, one of the CHWs, and a member of his parish persuaded him that everyone should be tested for COVID, before spending so much time indoors together. Maricela administered the rapid tests, and when one of the women on the kitchen crew was found to be positive, Maricela went with her, to her house, to test other family members.

The Monterey County Hospitality Association, and Salinas Valley Chamber of Commerce spoke at the supervisors' meeting in support of the extension.

COPA first proposed the VIDA program to the Monterey County Supervisors, who voted unanimously in December of 2020 to allocate \$4.9M to hire 100 CHWs. The VIDA program is administered by the Community Foundation of Monterey County.

My #1 priority was to have thoughtful communication and support between the Pastor and Preschool Director. This is not always the case in other places but in my mind a necessity. He has been so supportive of me which kept me going all this time. He is so excellent in leading Chapel and the children dearly love him. Leslie is the backbone for all of us. No matter what, she is always here to help, support, solve problems, lend a hand, and smile when we need a smile. Speaking of smile, John Hopping makes me smile. His devotion to our school, his kindness, and how he protects us when we need help is a gift, which is appreciated from our entire teaching team.

So, we celebrate quietly on April 12, 2022, our ten years together. I have met so many and learned so much! In these times we are unable to have a party or gathering so please, give a prayer of "thanks be to God" on this day, because he guided us all here. As we have unmasked the children outdoors, we are gifted their joyful smiles and the ability to hear them clearly again. The children walk lighter and smile more as we share our faces and expressions. I am grateful.


## **Monthly Special Benevolence Offering**
