Virtual Fundraiser 2.0:

Thanks again to all who donated to our Virtual Fundraiser! As of this writing, we have raised over \$18,000 toward our projects. The Santa Cruz al Salvador Board of Directors has decided to allocate \$11,000 of those proceeds to University

Scholarships for Guillermo Ungo students and the remainder of \$7,000+ to composting latrines for El Pilar. We are moving ahead with construction of 12 more latrines to bring the total to 83, our original commitment.

The drawing for the Monterey Bay excursion on the "Salty Sheep" was held on November 1, 2021 at the Board of Directors meeting and Marilyn Minke of Christ Lutheran Church in Aptos was the winner! Other items have been delivered.

Prayer Child Sponsorships - Sponsorship renewal has been delayed to December. We will be doing this by e-mail again this year, so watch for an e-mail from Santa Cruz al Salvador with your electronic Commitment Card. We will be collecting your donations as well as a contribution for the locally-sourced gift baskets for the student families. Last year was the first time we did this, replacing the gift bags we collected and took to El Salvador with our January delegations. The gift baskets were very well received, thanks to your extra contributions.

January 2022 Delegation - Due to ongoing health concerns about international travel in this time of Covid-19, we will not be sponsoring a delegation in January 2022. We are considering a summer-time trip, but there is nothing firm at this time.

Peace in Christ, Kent Madsen, St. Stephen's



This wonderful and very direct Advent phrase will be the one that we pray each Sunday as our Prayer of the Day. In Latin it is: excita. So that gives us a clue that something very uplifting and positive is meant to be conveyed.

This short, 4 Sunday season is always about preparing for the coming of God as one of us in Christ on Christmas. This year especially, it is clear that the best preparation is to "Stir Up!" something in our lives and church and world.

What is God stirring up in you these days? How will you join with God's Spirit in this kind of anticipation for something that needs to and will happen?

In our family's life, we are attempting to Stir Up something that is very daunting and has been a constant source of frustration: our son-in-law's ability to be rejoined with his spouse Rachel and his meeting his daughter for the first time in-person.

He has been approved to receive his Spousal Visa after his final interview on Dec. 30th at the US Embassy in the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa. However, simmering centuries-old ethnic conflicts have led the US Embassy to evacuate much of its staff and visas are no longer being processed. So his date to receive the visa is now postponed indefinitely.

We are reaching out to as many people as possible to Stir Up! the system and see if there is any way for him to be able to receive his visa now, given the uncertainty and danger that he is in. He has had to flee his hometown because it has been taken over by military force and he is essentially a refugee in his own country. Your prayers and possibilities are needed for this joyous event to happen.

As we gather each Sunday of Advent, look forward to the ways that your life can be stirred up to participate with bringing about God's ways of hope, love, new life, compassion and justice. Stir Up your power, O Christ, and come!

THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent Wreath is a Christian tradition that signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath has no beginning and no end, symbolizing the eternity of God and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The idea of the



wreath dates back to the early 1800's when Pastor Johann Hinrich Wichem who ministered to poor children, used the wreath to help the children mark the weeks until Christmas. In the beginning, the wreath had twenty five candles, one lit each day begin until Christmas. December 1st. In later years the wreath was reduced to four candle that would mark the weeks leading up to Christmas.

This year our wreath utilizes blue candles to mark the weeks until Christmas. The blue color has come to represent the Advent season. Advent is a time of hope and longing for the coming of the Messiah. Beginning with the candle on the front left and then moving clockwise, one candle is lit each week. The candle represent the four themes of Advent, Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace. The large white candle in the middle of the wreath represent Christ and is called the "Christ Candle" and is lit on Christmas eve and in many churches burns until Epiphany which marks the visit of the Magi. The body of the wreath is made of evergreens that represent eternal life, because they are always green.

This year as in past years, our family dedicates the Advent Wreath to the memory of my mother Kathryn Lewis Greso who introduced me to using the Advent Wreath to mark the weeks till Christmas when I was a young girl.

We hope as we light the candles on the wreath this year, it will help focus your thoughts to Christ entering the world that long ago Christmas night.

The Spiritual Discipline of Rest

Sarah Coomber completely uprooted her life. The strain of the COVID-19 pandemic had convinced her and her husband, both ELCA members, that after nearly two decades in Washington state they needed to move home, near family.

Coomber and her husband knew they needed a breather. That led them to Spent Dandelion retreat center, owned and operated by Anna Madsen, an ELCA pastor. The couple immersed themselves in nature and, discussing topics such as vocation, caring for themselves as parents of a child with special needs, and reclaiming rest.

"We unpacked our hearts." Coomber noted. "Anna reminded us that, no matter what our future looks like, God is in the midst of it, active in every single moment. Acknowledging that in itself [brought] rest to our hearts and minds."

"Anxiety and exhaustion are being lifted up as pressing matters, not just of one's physical well-being but also spiritual well-being," she said. "People are desperate for rest." Madsen noted.

(But) "So many of our society's dominant narratives mitigate against rest," said Cynthia Moe-Lobeda, a professor Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. "We get seduced and sucked into constant activity, and a lot of it is good, worthy, important activity, but it obliterates space for rest. I really think that the capacity to hear the Spirit and to [flourish] as a person are built partly by having rest."

As part of her work, Moe-Lobeda has led student groups focused on rest and self-compassion as spiritual practices. She sees rest as a spiritual discipline because, for most of us, it requires intentionality. "I consider rest a deeply spiritual thing because I think the Holy Spirit within us is partly God's longing for our well-being," she added. "One of the things the Spirit does—if we listen— is guide us toward well-being." An expert in ecojustice and director of the seminary's Center for Climate Justice and Faith, Moe-Lobeda looks to creation for lessons on rest. She points to farmers leaving the fields fallow for a time so that the soil can be renewed.

"The earth itself teaches us to rest," she said. "Trees go into rest in the wintertime and come back much more alive and vital and pulsating with life in the spring after they've rested." And in Genesis, God rests on the seventh day and blesses it as holy.

As people created in God's image, we, too, need rest. Yet rest often evades us. (Full article Aug. 2021 Living Lutheran)
