

IN MEMORIAM

Our beloved brother in Christ and former shepherd of our congregation ('76-'90), Rev. Glenn Johnson died peacefully of natural causes on Saturday, January 15th at his daughter Lisa's home here in Santa Cruz, surrounded by his family. He was 90 years old and had descended from 200 years of Swedish Lutheran pastors. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife Barbara in 2004.

Glenn had moved from La Posada to Lisa's home within the past year due to his deteriorating memory, but was still active in his long-time volunteer work with Grey Bears as he accompanied his granddaughter Marta for deliveries of food to senior residents. He did this up until the end of the year, when his physical health went into a sharper decline.

I was able to visit with Glenn, Lisa and Marta about a week before. It was a lovely time together as we prayed over Glenn and sang one of his favorite Swedish hymns - Children of the Heavenly Father. I also thanked Glenn for his service as an ordained minister of Word and Sacrament in the Lutheran Church, and his continued service to St. Stephen's for almost 25 years after his retirement from a congregation in Seal Beach, CA

Glenn will be remembered for the many faithful ways he lived his life like his prayers offered for the church and his family out loud in his beautiful baritone voice each Sunday. his jolly presence that often broke through in the form of his Swedish heritage and Scandinavian accent, his leading of our Eucharisitic Ministers team for several years (complete with home-baked apple pie at each meeting), his friendly presence at La Posada where he often stationed himself near the entrance to engage socially with his fellow residents.

I deeply appreciated Glenn's support of me as his Pastor and his continual concern and prayers for the well-being of our family.

No service is being planned at this time due to Covid-19 restrictions. There will be a time to gather and remember this joyful servant of God as a church family at a later date.

Blessed be the memory of this Child of God. May light perpetual shine upon him.

We had hoped that this year would see the end to the Covid 19 pandemic and a return to work and school for our Santa Cruz County neighbors. Almost to the day of our annual meeting this year, our family will mark the passing of an entire year since Leslie almost lost her life. That was, of course, a particularly dark time for us. Waiting in the ER for hours, wondering if she would survive.



And then suddenly a little light broke through with the trauma surgeon's news that she was somehow miraculously spared so many expected injuries. Then a little more light came in when she woke up a few days later and we could see her waving to us on our first Zoom visit. And then...the floodlights came on as God's Spirit sustained us in countlessly beautiful ways and we were filled with the blessings of being part of a church family as Leslie progressed day by day and she returned to us.

Very few people escape this life without experiencing a major tragedy like our family experienced. But being a part of the Body of Christ as we walked through the valley of the shadow of death, has been a privilege for us because God's presence and love has abounded through you. We have seen and felt God's Spirit with us perhaps more than ever this past year.

Indeed, as we say each Lent: "The Light shines in the darkness. And the darkness has not overcome it."

We were by no means the only ones to experience a difficult year, as many in our church family claimed their baptismal promises from God to everlasting life. This was made even more trying because of the pandemic restrictions about gathering, and we were not able to share table fellowship with each other after services. We did hold a very special All Saints Day Memorial Service where we honored and remembered 7 saints that we were not able to gather for previously. It looks like we will be doing this again, given the start to 2022.

It was also a very hard year filled with other kinds of goodbyes as we wished some long-time members Godspeed and Farewell in their moves away to new homes. All these things seemed to be magnified this past year.

At the same time, we are not surprised that God's Light has shined through in many ways throughout our difficult year. As we began to finally worship together inperson at Easter, we celebrated the baptism of our little Ila – who attended our Child Development Center, and whose Great Grandparents were some of the first residents at St. Stephen's Senior Housing. New life had indeed begun for our congregation. We enjoyed the fine weather and worshipped outdoors until Sun. Sept. 12 when we welcomed everyone back into the sanctuary. Another sign of new life was the beginning of our Confirmation/Youth Group with 6 enthusiastic young people!

And there was a whole lot of new life discovered in our use of the available technology for livestreaming and recording our worship services to our website. A very special thanks to Kent Madsen, Barbara Rice and Jay Johnston for leading us with their gifts. And, yes, we even were able to receive a new family who live in Livingston CA through this online effort!

In MEMORIAM


Rev. Jack Zoellner died 12/23/2021 in Scottsdale, AZ. Pastor Zoellner served as the 2nd pastor to St. Stephen's from 1956-59. He was born in Saginaw, MI. He enlisted in the Marine Corps during WW2 and saw active duty in the Pacific with the 3rd Marine Division. He then served in Tientsin, China. He received his BA from Capital Univ., Columbus, Ohio and his M.Div. from Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, PA.

He served as a Navy Chaplain in Japan and Korea. His 60 years in ministry took him to congregations in Georgia, California and Arizona. He served as an assistant to the Synod President of the Lutheran Church in America.

He was honored at the Vatican for his work in justice and peace.

Eleanor Zoellner died on 8/25/2020 in Scottsdale, AZ. She was born in Sparkill, NY. She graduated college Magna Cum Laude. She taught 4th grade and married Jack. She worked with her husband as church organist and choir director for many years. She also gave private piano lessons. She earned her private pilot's license and enjoyed flying. She then taught first grade, and became a librarian. She taught for 53 years and was married for 66 years.

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church.)

- We moved our meeting to an online Zoom format, due to the highest number of active Covid-19 cases ever in our County that week. The February 8th meeting will likely be on Zoom as well.
- 2. We discussed our worship practices and decided to scale back some of the things we had been doing: Holy Communion will be received only through the pre-sealed elements. Masking over the nose will be emphasized. No Children's Church of Coffee Fellowship for the time being. Pastor Jim will remain in the chancel area until the Recessional Hymn. We will re-evaluate on Feb. 8th.
- 3. David Balogh agreed to be nominated for a Church Council position. If the proposed Constitutional Change of reducing our Church Council from 9 to 7 is rejected at the Annual Meeting, then we will need to take nominations from the floor and fill the remaining 2 positions during the Annual Meeting.
- Steven Hendrickson and Margaret Schraft have volunteered to be nominated as our Synod Assembly delegates, The Assembly takes place June 1-4 at the Nugget Casino Resort in Sparks, NV.
- 5. The 2022 proposed budget with COLA increase was approved unanimously for the Annual Meeting.

We are all very grateful for Sam's gifts of time, supplies and expertise in the installation of our new security camera system. The hard wiring and installation of the 5 camera was a multi-day effort on his part. He has shown us what it means to take care of what God has blessed us with at our facility. Our Church Council decided it was time for this system as a deterrent to vandalism (church bell), and a more safe environment for our preschool staff and families. We could not have done this with out you, Sam! He & John Stout also cleaned out and installed gutter guards for us!

Child Development Center

The name of the game at the preschool is patience, resilience, and pivoting. We returned from the holiday break, then closed for ten days due to a positive testing student. Our families are real champions at restructuring their daily lives as we navigate the latest surge. We returned on January 18th. Teacher Sam and I have been trained to test the children and teachers so after an initial return of testing every other day, we hope to put this surge behind us, yet have the tools to monitor if symptoms begin for any reason.

Socialization is the main goal for our students, it always is, but now even more important. During Circletime, the children really want to share what is on their minds. The story or another comment will trigger the hands to raise and anecdotes to be shared. The children are wiggly as they are not used to attending so we have creative ways to redirect. The day of this writing I observed the children in the classroom, for some their first day back. They were so quiet yet engaged with each other. Some were parallel playing rather than cooperative play. You could sense relief in the room. It was very evident that the main gift to give these children who are ages 2-4, who have not known a world without Covid, is the routine we offer. We offer them a place to be themselves, choosing what they would like to do, choosing who they would like to play with. Inside our preschool they are free yet stabilized with familiar structure that has not changed. Although we offer good curriculum it is not the same as before because their need to engage with each other socially is the priority while this latest surge passes.

SSCDC is so very grateful for the benevolence donations in 2021. It was enough to purchase a new computer for the Preschool office. After years of troubleshooting, I am delighted to report that we have Wi-Fi in the office, with a new updated computer, connected to the printer that won't disconnect anymore. We also have 2 years of Geek Squad coverage which will be a great support. The balance of the donation will go toward improving the playground.

February is always a fun month for children, making valentine crafts, and our celebration. Please pray for our children and their families. This is a precious group of people who are really riding the waves. We pray that their lives will return to the kind of routines we remember when raising our children, or at least closer to, considering the changing times.

I mask people even when they aren't wearing an actual mask.

I mask people even when they aren't wearing an actual mask. This person is white, or this person is young, or this person is Black, or this person is Asian/Pacific Islander, or this person is Arab/Middle Eastern, or this person is Latinx, or this person is old, or this person is a farmer, or this person is urban, or this person is Lutheran. You can fill out the list. I ascribe characteristics to all of these people without really seeing them.

And then, I wonder about the masks I wear. Wife, daughter, mother, sister. Pastor, friend, the PRESIDING BISHOP (yikes!). When interactions are fraught, the staff have identified what they call my "Queen Face."

What masks do we all wear? Some are appropriate—we don't have to emote all over everyone all the time. It's good to have boundaries—some are needed for safety. But none of these is who we truly are, and all of these take energy.

As we have been returning to in-person worship and once again celebrating communion, I've witnessed a beautiful phenomenon. When people come forward to receive the host, they momentarily remove their masks. One by one, in the face of our Lord's body, they reveal themselves and are revealed. Their faces appear. No mask. No covering. No defense. No need for defense. For that instant they no longer carry the burden of wearing the mask of their demographic, heritage or ethnicity. They are no longer called upon to be stoic.

At that moment they realize on earth what we shall know in heaven—God sees us. God loves us. In God we find our true selves. We find rest.

For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known (1 Corinthians 13:12).

WHAT MASKS DO WE ALL WEAR?

Getting ready to leave the house—for work or errands—takes a couple extra steps during a pandemic. Do I know how crowded my destination will be? Did I remember to take a mask? Of all the annoying things about this pandemic, I find remembering to take and to wear a mask is one of the most irksome. Masks aren't comfortable, they make it more difficult to understand conversations, and they are a daily reminder that we are not out of the woods yet.

Let me be clear—masks are an effective way to stop the spread of this terrible virus, and I will wear one for as long as it takes. I urge all of us to do the same. This isn't about personal choice, but it is a physical manifestation that in baptism "we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans 12:5). Wearing a mask is as much for our protection as it is for protecting others. I will continue to mask up.

I always thought it was silly that bandits and robbers are depicted wearing only a mask from just below the eyes down. How could that possibly be a disguise? One's eyes, hair and ears are all visible. You can hear the voice. You can figure out a person's stature. What's the point?

It turns out that sighted people get an enormous number of nonverbal cues from someone's face. Infants can read faces even before their eyesight is fully developed. An amazing amount of communication is possible even when interacting with someone who speaks a different language.

I don't think I'm unique in this, but I mentally fill in what a person looks like behind the mask. I make determinations about a person's age and disposition, not to mention physical characteristics. When I do see someone's unmasked face, it turns out that I am always wrong. This could be as benign as not imagining a person had a moustache to more significant assumptions about the person's character.

February - St. Stephen's Scholarship Fund


