All have different, but significant meanings. Each of which does apply to US.


Let's pray:

Contribution income for May was above budget. We were blessed with \$7,500 in Miscellaneous Income in April as well as the income for the Paycheck Protection Program loan which was forgiven in April. Expenses have been reduced by the grant from the Silicon Valley Community Foundation for Pastor and Administrator salaries (those funds were fully used by the end of April).

While the church has restricted activities, our expenses continue. Thank you to those who have mailed contributions or made them online on our website.

### **Church Council Highlights**

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm.)

The June Council meeting was cancelled due to lack of a quorum and the lack of any action items. Normally the Council does not meet once during the summer.

The July and August meetings will be important given our return to public, inperson worship Sept. 12. A "Re-Opening" Task Force of Paul Cunningham, Bill Schraft, Jay Johnston & Pastor Jim have met and will present a list of recommended new practices for in-person, indoor worship. All of this is contingent upon no significant increases in new Covid-19 cases and County Health Dept. recommendations. There is some concern about a resurgence this Fall due to the virus' new and more virulent variant, which may spread more quickly within the unvaccinated population.

Other items on the agenda are a report from the Facility Security Task Force, update on replacing the bell clapper, and a report on new street signage indicating our Reconciling In Christ status.

### **Child Development Center**

After all the excitement and celebration of our graduates we have settled into the playful days

of summer! The heat has brought out waterplay, bubbles, and watering the garden. Each summer month our enrollment is a little different as some leave for kindergarten and new children begin. August 6<sup>th</sup> will be the last day for those leaving and most new students will begin August 9<sup>th</sup>.

After the June 15th Covid-19 opening of California our regulations and procedures are remaining the same. We are all still masked and following cleaning protocols and health screenings. It has worked well for us, and until policies are fully confirmed for preschools it is better to keep doing what the children are already comfortable with rather than cutting back, then implementing again. Once public school opens in August, we will likely have improved guidance on what is appropriate for children.

Universal TK has been in the news lately, but not a new topic. For now, we are not impacted. We are carefully watching the process as we may have a reduction in 4-year-old enrollment impacting our Pre-K program once it is offered. We are told that will be at least one year. We are hopeful when the time comes there will be families who want to continue private, Christian preschool, and we do remain the most affordable. We are mindful that we may have to shift to concentrating on a younger program which continues to be in high demand. Most inquiries are from children turning two. I have toured many over the last few weeks.

On a personal note, I finally get to travel to Montana and see my mother after 13 months of missing her. I have never been away from her this long! After all this time trying to figure out how to do business with Covid-19 shifting it will be nice to know the school is doing well, is safe, in very good hands with our three teachers. I can clear my mind in peace and beauty with my best friend, mom. I will be gone for the month of July. Mom and I will return for a visit mid-month so she can finally meet her great grandson Luke 7 months, and attend Levi's 3rd birthday, then we return to Montana.

I wish you all an enjoyable summer with your families as the state opens and we can do this again.

### A Note regarding Nelleke Meerman


(recipient of a \$1,000 scholarship from the Lois Meeker Memorial Fund)

Though I'm the daughter of a Marine and great-great-granddaughter of once-enslaved people, I still get chills when I see photos of Black men in Union uniforms from the Civil War, the way I imagine my ancestors did in the 1860s.

"How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news," the Apostle Paul quotes the prophet Isaiah after asking, "How can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent?" (Romans 10:14-15).

If you've been taught about Juneteenth at all, the common telling is that President Abraham Lincoln's 1863 Emancipation Proclamation pronounced freedom for all enslaved people in states that had seceded from the Union, but that Black Texans weren't informed until June 19, 1865 — two and a half years later. The delay is sometimes blamed on distance and limited communication or the idea that enslavers weren't inclined to comply with the law. While these may have been contributing factors, these explanations obscure why the Black residents of Galveston, TX, actually celebrated the first Juneteenth — and obscures how that celebration still speaks to us today.
