

Will WE JoIn HIm?

It wasn't easy for peasant fishermen in first-century Palestine to make a living. To begin with, they didn't enjoy free access to the Sea of Galilee because the Roman Empire and its elite controlled the fishing industry.

Herod Antipas, a provincial Roman governor, romanized the region and put it under Emperor Tiberias' control, noted <u>Ched Myers in "'Let's Catch Some Big Fish!' Jesus' Call to Discipleship in a World of Injustice.</u>" Antipas wanted to multiply fishing in the waters around Tiberias. He created an industry for commercial export, not local consumption. While the local people depended on fish for their main food, Antipas extracted it for profit. Fishing also was a costly business because each step of the process was taxed. Fishermen had to get a lease from local brokers, and they had no option but to sell to Antipas' factories, which exported fish to the entire Roman Empire. As a result, many fishermen became destitute.

Jesus spent most of his ministry in fishing villages like Capernaum, Gennesar and Magdala because there, wrote John Dominic Crossan in God and Empire (Harper One, 2009), "the radicality of Israel's God confronted the normalcy of Rome's civilization under Herod Antipas."

Luke 5:1-11, included in our February lectionary readings, tells of a miraculous catch of fish and of Jesus inviting Peter to fish for people. **Traditionally, we've understood Jesus' statement, "fish for people," to connote the vocation of "saving souls."** But in prophetic traditions, Jeremiah (16:6), Amos (4:2) and Ezekiel (29:4), to fish for people implies a divine judgment of God's enemies.

Why did Jesus use this metaphor?

According to the Gospels of Mark and Matthew, Jesus called on Peter; Andrew; James and John, the sons of Zebedee, to follow him after Herod Antipas beheaded John the Baptist, possibly at his royal palace in Tiberias on the Sea of Galilee's shores. These fishermen / disciples were victims of Herod Antipas too.

This story is not about the disciples changing their vocation from fishing for fish to fishing for people. Rather, it's about inviting them to join Jesus in turning over Rome's unjust social order and replacing it with God's kingdom. Fishing for people is a political and spiritual statement against Roman imperial power. By providing fish, Jesus demonstrates that he, not Antipas, is in control of the lake.

Jesus called his disciples, who were anticipating God's intervention to end the Romans' oppression. Jesus preached the good news, the coming of God's reign to replace the Roman emperor's and Antipas' reign. In Binding the Strong Man (Orbis 1995), Myers wrote: "[Jesus] is inviting common folk to join him in his struggle to overturn the existing order of power and privilege." Will we join him?

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church.)

- 1. We met via Zoom as Secretary Alyssa Burkhardt began the meeting as the President and V.P. positions were vacant. She led the elections of Shelly Barker as President and Steven Hendrickson as V.P. David Balogh was welcomed as the newly elected Council member from the annual meeting.
- 2. Pastor Jim contacted the Synod Secretary Jeff Pennington about our having not had a quorum (29 present—31 needed). We were advised to hold a special congregational meeting with a quorum "to ratify the actions taken at the January 30th annual meeting." This would be the only item of business.
- 3. Our El Camino Conference Assembly took place on Saturday, February 12th via Zoom. Steven Hendrickson and Shelly Barker attended with Pastor Jim. - 5. Next meeting is March 8th at 6:30pm via Zoom.

Additionally, we thank Sandra Eldridge, for donating funding for wood chips to upgrade our playground and make it safer. The playground has a special place in her heart as her young grandson Max Fairon enjoyed playing there. He is now a successful Stanford student heading towards a promising future. He came to stay with his Ola (Grandpa), and Morning (Grandma) during some difficult times in his young life. Max connected with and loved coming to church, especially the children's program. Sandra is "Paying forward" the joy Max experienced to our young preschool children with gratitude and in honor of Pastor James Lapp, and in remembrance of Pastor Glenn Johnson for their kindness and stability shared with her grandson. How beautiful!

This got the good vibes going as I met with an arborist recommended by a longtime family of our preschool. Turns out 30 years ago the arborist benefited in a life changing way by attending one of our facility use groups. It changed his life. He told me that St. Stephen's has been serving the community for decades and he would like to give back by giving us a very low estimate to have 6 large trees serviced on the playground. This saved us at least \$2000. Then, when I thanked the parent, Zach Smith from Smiths Gopher Service (Who has been giving us free gopher and pest removal services for the church and

IAF Orgs in Oklahoma, California, Arizona and Texas Protect Families from Displacement

As the pandemic and its economic impacts persisted into a second year, organizations from Oklahoma to Texas to California worked furiously to keep low-income families housed.

Catholic press cites organizing efforts to keep people housed across West & Southwest US.

TMO secured \$11.3 Million in federal funding for rental assistance in Brazoria County.

Marin Organizing Committee enacted moratoriums on rent increases (rent freezes) in the seven census tracts most affected by the pandemic in wealthy Marin County.

One LA-IAF leaders protected 12 units of affordable housing near a Central LA synagogue.

After state tenant protections changed, COPA leaders in Central California quickly mobilized to ensure renters accessed expanded support.

These women reached tens of thousands of laborers with prevention education, PPE and support during quarantines.

First, these are some reasons why our congregation and all the other member institutions of **COPA** have chosen to partner with the IAF to help us fulfill our baptismal mission "to strive for justice and peace in all the earth":

- Founded in 1940, it is the nation's largest and longest-standing network of local faith and community-based organizations.
- 2. The IAF partners with religious congregations and civic organizations at the local level to build broad-based organizing projects, which create new capacity in a community for leadership development, citizen-led action and relationships across the lines that often divide our communities.
- 3. The IAF created the modern model of faith- and broad-based organizing and is widely recognized as having the strongest track record in the nation for citizen leadership development and for helping congregations and other civic organizations act on their missions to achieve lasting change in the world.
- 4. The IAF, which includes the West / Southwest IAF and Metro IAF, currently works with thousands of religious congregations, non-profits, civic organizations and unions, in more than sixty-five cities across the United States and in Canada, Australia, the United Kingdom and Germany.

California IAF Revamps State Tenant Protections to Keep Low-Income Families Housed

This summer, over 600 **California IAF** leaders convened on Zoom to call for the extension of the state eviction moratorium and expansion of protections to allow greater flexibility with rental aid. Catholic Bishop Oscar Cantú, Episcopal Bishop Lucinda Ashby and two state legislators joined the call. After hundreds of leaders contacted their elected officials, protections for renters were expanded.

I met with **future Eagle Scout William**, and he is organizing the Troop to shovel in the woodchips, along with Bill Schraft who will supervise. We also discussed the possibility of William refurbishing our entire gardening area for his Eagle Scout project! **The scouts always tell me how grateful they are to meet here and they like to give back by helping us out.**

A few days ago, I was unloading my rabbit from the car and a lady and her dog, who I recognized stopped to look at the rabbit. She loves animals. We chatted for about 10 minutes as she shared how much she loves living in the senior housing. Due to past experiences, she is fearful at night, and having the security, beautiful grounds, and nice people around has changed her life and she truly is grateful. She also loves it when the children walk around the gardens from our school. I have the good fortune to have these conversations with people of so many generations as I am here so much of the time.

The message I received from all these encounters filled my heart. As we plan for the future of our church and school during times of great challenges, we need to be reminded that seeds we have planted over the decades are still blooming and flourishing. There are people all through the community that have benefited by the different activities, groups, worship, senior housing, and now our preschool. They talk to each other about what St. Stephen's has meant to them and their families. On some days it is hard to see how we continue to come full circle as the seeds we planted are scattered everywhere in big ways and small. My experience, having only been here for 11 years, those before me touched many lives, and those I have been active with continue to contribute. The small seeds grow, travel, return, and plant more for the next generation.

As our 10-year anniversary approaches, the celebration should be in all of our hearts. Jesus is still working through our ministries even when they look different, even when it is hard, even through a pandemic, and especially in the children. I see their loving eyes and hearts each day. They experience happiness because we are here. Their parents feel secure. Our congregation remains ever faithful.
