

Thank you to Kent Madsen and Barbara Rice especially for their bringing our congregation together through their video livestream and recording work. We are incredibly blessed by their sharing their gifts in this way on behalf of all of us.

We were especially privileged to welcome a new family into St. Stephen's on our first Sunday! Judy and Robert Alvarado had been worshipping with us and attending Thursday Bible Studies from their home all the way in Livingston, CA in the Sierra Foothills. The wonders of technology can indeed be used to strengthen God's Church! They plan on coming to church in-person once a month.

In order to help everyone feel comfortable and safe upon returning to worshipping together in body and spirit, our Church Council has been planning some ways that will help us be the most welcoming and caring for the most vulnerable. Please contact me or a Council member if you have more ideas. Here is what has been planned:

### **Health Safety Protocols for Worship**

- 1. Masks will be worn at all times. This way we are able to sing and pray out loud. Pastor Jim will maintain a 25ft. distance as he will be unmasked.
- 2. Air circulation will be constant. Fans will be placed at open doorways and the HVAC system will be running with the proper filters.
- 3. Holy Communion will continue to be shared using the pre-sealed cups and wafer. These and the bulletins will be available as people enter. Everyone will be asked to use the hand sanitizers as they are greeted.
- 4. All will be asked to maintain a 6ft distance from other family groups/individuals. (Taped off sections will guide this)
- 5. Offering plates will be on tables at various locations and we will stagger our approach to them.
- 6. Exchanging of The Peace will be done only with gestures no physical contact.
- . Coffee Fellowship will not be offered for the time being, but we are encouraged to greet one another outside after worship.







(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm.)

1. Devotions centered on the Second Reading for Sunday Sept. 19 from the Book of James Ch. 3-4, which calls us to seek after God's wisdom and to beware of how the world's wisdom may undermine or compromise that. We remembered the truth of the last verse: "Draw near to God and God will draw near to you".



- Pastor Jim also reported that he was able to visit and provide Holy Communion to Rick and Susan Oldfield as Rick entered hospice care at home.
- We reviewed how our first indoor worship went and decided to help people keep a physical distance of 6ft by taping off sections of the pews.
- Sanctuary Banners, a Welcome Mat, and an Outdoor Sign indicating that our church is a "Reconciling In Christ" congregation, were donated by Renee Rice, Council President, in order to celebrate and publicly proclaim our Welcome Statement which is printed below.
- The Sustainability Task Force has contacted most of our membership as we return to indoor Sunday worship and re-gather our church family. Some have decided to continue worshipping from their homes, which, of course, is perfectly understandable and will remain available.
- Mark Linder will be hosting a new community group on Thursday evenings in the Fireside Rm. It is a County of Santa Cruz pilot program where lower level incidents/conflicts are attempted to be resolved without engaging with the regular County Court system.

God's Blessings, Miss Leslie The first time Angela !Khabeb attended an ELCA church service, she and a friend, prepared for an "evangelical" experience, brought their tambourines and Bibles. "We didn't use either, and before we knew it, we were done with church!"! Khabeb recalled.

Curious to learn more, she visited ELCA.org and found social statements explaining the church's commitment to diversity, gender equality and racial equity. ELCA social statements, developed through the ELCA churchwide office and funded by Mission Support, are a frequent starting point for potential members in learning how Lutheran theology applies to pressing issues.

After years of searching for a place in Pentecostal congregations that limited her leadership because of her gender, !Khabeb hoped the ELCA was where she belonged.

She continued her faith journey as an ELCA missionary serving the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Republic of Namibia and a seminary student at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. After calls in Ohio and Wisconsin, she became pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Minneapolis in 2018. Holy Trinity's building is located less than three blocks from the Minneapolis Police Department's Third Precinct, where Officer Derek Chauvin worked. After Chauvin murdered George Floyd on May 25, 2020, protests broke out in the precinct.

Holy Trinity served as a first aid station and a food distribution center during the uprising. !Khabeb preached in the streets and later appeared on ABC's Good Morning America to discuss faith and racial justice.

The simultaneous reckoning with racial inequity and the COVID-19 pandemic forced Holy Trinity to grow in its vocation, she said. "We've made strides in our congregation, moving from the toxic theology of scarcity to the breadth and joy of abundance." The response also amplified her voice.

!Khabeb thinks the ELCA needs strong leadership if it wants to practice the same theology it espouses in social statements. "A lot of times we look to [pastors and deacons] to do the things that all of us are called to do as baptized members of the body of Christ," she said. "If we see violence and division in our society, we find it also in our pews. Lay leaders are key to reminding the church of what we said we would do. God is like a mirror. Just keep holding it up and asking ourselves, 'Are we there yet?""

### **Monthly Special Benevolence Offering** St. Stephen's Child Development Center

We welcome families of all faiths and cultural backgrounds. We provide developmentally appropriate individualized curriculum, teaching to each child's learning style. We offer teacher-directed and emergent child-centered activities through play and discovery. As trained observers, we teach to each child's individual needs and interests. Our small class sizes, 1:6 teacher-child ratio, provide for a nurturing environment while building a solid academic foundation that is well-rounded and fosters love for learning. Social-emotional skills are developed through redirection and teaching problem-solving skills with an emphasis on kindness to self, others.

Each Thursday Children's Chapel service is hosted by Pastor Jim who helps the children light the altar candles, leads songs accompanied by his guitar, followed by a story from "The Beginners Bible."

### In Memoriam—Ron Buswell April 12, 1948 - Sept. 12, 2021

We remember well our dear and faithful brother in Christ whose quiet faith and life of service to the Church and those in need was a tremendous gift to us all. He and Sheila became a part of St. Stephen's 50 yrs ago. Ron served as Treasurer for many years, faithfully stewarding our financial gifts, especially the establishment of S.S.Reserve Acct. after the building of S.S Sr. Housing. He was our construction consultant on our Affordable Housing Task Force, as we entered into the partnership with Mid-Pen Housing, and helped negotiate the Ground Lease. He spearheaded the drive to add a much-needed restroom in our Narthex, oversaw the installation of our solar panels, built the much more welcoming Family Room, installed beautiful cabinetry in the Organ/Choir Loft area, built the preschool "stray cat-proof" sandbox (among many other projects), oversaw the renovation and installation of our church bell, initiated a Memorial Brick program around the bell so that loved ones could be remembered. and also helped construct the present day church offices and Fireside Rm.

There is much more that is not included here. Indeed, his handprint and handiwork offered to the glory of God is felt throughout our church building and people.

Ron also had a "2nd Career" as his family calls it, with the local Chapter of Habitat for Humanity, where he served as Interim Director once, and Chair of Board of Directors for many years. He will be greatly missed. Our lives of faith have been deeply enriched by his witness.

Services will be private, with an All Saints Saturday (Nov. 6) Church Memorial Service for Ron and those we lost during the pandemic time.
