committed to being re-formed

Synod Council Appoints the Rev. Claire S. Burkat as Interim Bishop

After consultation with the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and per the Sierra Pacific Synod Constitution (S8.54), the Sierra Pacific Synod Council has appointed the Rev. Claire S. Burkat as its interim bishop. She hopes to begin working in the synod the week of July 10.

Burkat joins the Sierra Pacific Synod from the Southeastern Pennsylvania (SEPA) Synod, where she served two terms as bishop (2006-2018). She is a 1978 graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and has served as a congregational pastor, assistant to the bishop, and mission director with the SEPA Synod, New Jersey Synod, and the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania.

Since her retirement as synod bishop in 2018, Burkat most recently served as interim chaplain of Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pa., and stepped in as acting bishop of the Delaware-Maryland Synod during Bishop William Gohl's sabbatical.

The Sierra Pacific Synod Council and staff warmly welcome Burkat and thank the Office of the Presiding Bishop for its support in this time of transition.

The teachers are treating the children to plenty of outdoor water play and other fun experiences of summer.

I extend a special thank you to Kathy Allen who has volunteers as our treasurer, above and beyond towards helping us reach our goals. Thank you for all you have done to support our preschool, and helping me learn business financing, and agreeing to continue as a contractor for payroll in such an organized fashion!

Now I will share my personal adventure of summer. Memorial weekend I traveled to Carson City to celebrate my father's eightieth birthday. During this visit I spent a day in Virginia City. My father donated some furniture, including a giant wooden poetry cabinet that was in his home that was previously filled with our family pictures, to Mackay Mansion. Encountering God in the Book Of Creation: Nature

Dear Beloved Community,

How is your daily practice of reading Scripture and quiet reflection going? Hopefully, your pattern of hearing God speak and silent listening are blessing you with a closer relationship with Christ. Our sensitivity and intimate experience is growing deeper.

Walking meditation and sitting quietly in nature reveals our Lord's beautiful handiwork. The Book of Creation, Martin Luther teaches, that there are two books of Scripture. The first is the Book of Creation, then the Scriptures we are familiar with in the Old and New Testament. Now, we are learning to appreciate God's Being in all of Creation.

In walking meditation, one proceeds in silence, opening to all of the senses, absorbing all of the sights, smells, and observing everything around us. Taking it all in, we are immensely grateful, thanking God for the beauty and connectedness. Five to ten minutes of walking is a good beginning, but you decide the duration of the walk. Prayer naturally arises as an ending response. Sitting quietly outside, preferably in a very quiet location, will reveal sounds and sights not normally experienced. The area around you may come alive with activity. Observation and gratitude surfaces within. As in all of our quiet times, we are open and receptive to God's Holy Spirit.

These are suggestions, if you feel led to practice them. Enjoy the beautiful weather outside as we expand our awareness and move our bodies as well. Please remember to bring your Bible with you.....

After eight years, making little to nothing, he walked with his friend 100 miles to Virginia City to mine there. No matter his circumstance he was always grateful for work, no matter the work he had to do. He honored all working people no matter their socio-economic level, and was an honest man (So the story goes). In his early forties, he struck the largest silver mine in the Comstock load and became the richest man in the world at that time. got to tour his mansion/mining office (Which is the size of a two-story family home in our time). I knocked on the door, was sent away. Then, the museum docent ran to my car and invited me in to see all of the antiques. Mackay went on to live a good life as a respected man. The history, especially California, and San Francisco, was very interesting to me. A month later, after visiting my grandchildren when my mom got to spend time with her great-grandson's, my mother and I went to Montana for my annual summer visit. I began reading "The Bonanza King," the story of John William Mackay and the entire process of mining the Comstock Lode in Virginia City. Also rich with California history, the Civil War, and the building of the trans-continental railroad in the mid-eighteen hundreds. This book included information about where my daughter lives in Plumas Lake which was flooded in 1863 with 49 inches of rain before the installation of levees. Now I understand the name of her town.

Today at church in Trout Creek Montana, a lady new to the church sat next to me at the Fellowship luncheon who is moving from Reno. Her husband and son are miners in Virginia City where they previously lived. What are the odds of that!? My book and travels came to life as we shared stories of the area. She will be my parent's new neighbor. How invigorating that my interest in historical reading came to life.

Next, we celebrated my grandson Levi's 4th birthday at the Sacramento State Fair. I had never been. It was really fun. Please keep Levi and his family in your prayers as they continue to help him with his development. There is so much room for hope through prayer. I am blessed to have two beautiful grandsons. God is good, all the time. - Kathy Berens
