My Wilgrimage to the Holy Land!

I am very excited to announce that I will be able to travel to the Holy Land from May 16-28!! This opportunity only recently became available and I was able to work out the time and details right before Easter.

I will be taking my annual two weeks of Continuing Education time (which I haven't taken for 3 years) to join a Travel Seminar with my seminary—Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. It is entitled:

"The Land of the Bible with Ancient Sites & Current Struggles"

Led by Professors Barbara Rossing and Klaus-Peter Adams

We will visit Caeserea Maritime, residence of Pontius Pilate, Megiddo or "Armageddon" and its' 25+ layers of civilization, Tel Dan- a nature preserve at one of the 4 springs that form the Jordan River. Caeserea Philippi—site of Peter's confession of Jesus as the Christ, Magdala—birthplace of Mary Magdalene and site of the Mount of Beatitudes, Capernaum—center of Jesus' Galilean ministry with a 1st century fishing boat, Nazareth site of the Holy family's residence, Bethlehem—Christmas Lutheran Church worship on Sunday, Hebron—Tombs of the Patriarchs and Matriarchs. Bethlehem—Church of the Nativity (oldest Shepherd's Field, church in the Holy Land), **Herodium—**Herod's fortress, Evening with Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb—an instrumental Palestinian Christian leader for peace, Masada—Herod's desert fortress, Qumram—where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered, Jerusalem—August Victoria Hospital, Mount of Olives palm Sunday road, Garden of Gethsemane—site of Jesus' arrest, Via Dolorosa—the way that Jesus carried the cross, Church of the Holy Sepulcher—built over Gologtha and the tomb of Christ, Upper Room—site commemorating the Lord's Supper, Temple Mount, Western Wall—foundation of the Temple destroyed by the Romans in 70 AD, Pool of Siloam—place of healing for Jesus, Yad Vashem—Holocaust Museum, Israel Museum with model of Jerusalem at the time of Jesus.

I was not sure if I would ever be able to make this pilgrimage so central to our Christian faith, but thanks to a generous donation from former members Kirk and Terri Adams, it is going to really happen! I am looking very forward to sharing this experience with you all upon my return!

A Note about the 2022 Budget

First of all, thank you congregation for reaffirming the January 30th vote on March 20th! After the budget was tentatively approved on January 30th, I noticed some issues with the budget as presented at the meeting. The issues were:

- 1. There was a mathematical error in the "Internet Access and TV" section the Child Development Center (CDC) contribution was not included in the subtotal for Admin. Expense. This overstated expenses by \$480. I also increased the CDC contribution to telephone expenses by \$400 since telephone costs have gone up. When corrected, these reduced the total budget exp. by \$880.
- 2. The salary amounts for Pastor Jim, Leslie, and Gary needed to be adjusted so the annual amounts, when divided into individual payments, were relatively round numbers. This reduced total expenses by \$17.

I had omitted the cost of living increase for John Hopping, our independent contractor custodian. This increased expenses by a net \$734. Altogether, the total expenses of the budget were reduced by \$163.

- 1. We met in person in the sanctuary. All other meeting spaces are in use by our Boy Scout Troop on Tuesday evenings. In attendance were President Shelly Barker, Vice President—Steven Hendrickson, Treasurer—Kent Madsen, Paul Cunningham, Jay Johnston, and David Balogh via Zoom. Alyssa Burkhardt—Secretary had alerted us that she would be unable to attend this meeting. Shelly took the minutes.
- 2. After devotions, Pastor Jim announced that he would be taking a pilgrimage to the Holy Land May 16-28 with a Travel Seminar from his seminary—Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. This trip will be led by Dr. Barbara Rossing—Professor of New Testament Studies and Dr. Klaus-Peter Adams. Pastor Jim knows Dr. Rossing from when they both (and Leslie) volunteered at Holden Village for the summer of 1990. In particular, he shared a story about a time when he led the Holden Evening Prayer service and proceeded to lead the Lord's Prayer as it was written in the bulletin at that time: "Abba/Imma in heaven, hallowed be thy name." Abba means father in Hebrew, while Imma means mother. After the service a very green, first year seminary student, Pastor Jim, was immediately charged by a fuming Seminary professor from Ohio and lambasted for leading the Lord's Prayer that way! Dr. Rossing, the Program Director, thankfully intercepted the situation as Pastor Jim quietly exited to the ice cream parlor!
- 3. The roof still leaks on both ends of the low point, but not where it was repaired. Knox roofing has been called back to do further repairs.
- 4. We agreed to continue the current worship practices outlined in the weekly email, despite the prospect of a new surge. This will be reevaluated at each Council meeting.


We chanted "Hosanna" on Palm Sunday. Meaning *Praise God!* But did you know it also means *God help us*????

Encountering God Through Reflection Upon Scripture

Here is a suggestion to enhance your experience of meeting God through Scripture and quiet, receptive sitting in God's presence. Gently, and prayerfully, this is offered if you feel called to try this practice. If not, that is fine too, because our Lord has many ways to reach us, if we but listen and respond in faith.

Find a quiet place where you will not be disturbed for fifteen minutes. Locate a reading from the Bible. Good sources are: the devotional, Christ In Our Home, the Celebrate Insert in the Sunday Church Bulletin, underneath the Prayers of the Church are the readings under the heading, Preparing For Next Week. An app that the ELCA Publishing House, Augsburg Fortress, has is entitled Daily Lectio, is a wonderful source of readings.

As you begin, pray and ask for awareness of God's presence. "I am here, open and receptive, speak to me." Read the passage out loud, softly or in a whisper two times. Then sit quietly for five minutes. The idea is to quiet the mind, like a flower turning to the sun to absorb its rays. Silently, follow your breath flowing in and out, or selecting a sacred word to focus on can be very helpful. This is a very personal choice, but a one or two syllable word works well. Some examples are: Jesus, love, peace, truth, Holy Spirit, Amen, or whatever word you choose. Return to following your breath, or your sacred word when other thoughts intrude.

After five minutes in silence, a personal prayer, the Lord's Prayer, or both, are fine ways to conclude your private time with our Triune God.

Try this everyday for a month, and then assess your own personal experience. If you miss a day, return to this rhythm when you think of it. "Has something shifted in my awareness of God's presence? Do I sense closeness with God more than I did a month ago?"

In gentleness, quietness, and peace, we behold our heart's gathered in prayer. Please feel free to speak with me if you have any questions or responses.


