

I would like to extend a very big thank you to our Sustainability Task Force for all of their time and efforts in gathering us in various small group House Meetings recently (or soon to come).

Co-Chairs Alyssa Burkhardt and Mark Linder both led by inspiring example during worship, as they shared their faith stories and what they are particularly grateful for at St. Stephen's. They reminded us of the precious gift we all have in being active participants in the life of our church. I was particularly moved by the parts where they had experienced some difficult times in various churches before coming here. It's certainly true that there is no perfect church or one that lives out God's Truths all the time, but they were not deterred and kept seeking a place that was doing better at including ALL of God's children.

Other House Meeting leaders on the SFT are Robert Bartee, Steven Hendrickson and Shelly Barker. All five of them and I will be contacting you to invite you to help me and the Church Council discern the Holy Spirit's calling to what is next for our congregation. We feel that it is time to do this kind of "pulse-taking" after we have emerged from some of the more restrictive aspects of the pandemic.

We were just about to consider beginning a Dinner Church somewhere nearby in a community setting on weeknight. For my sabbatical in 2019, I had engaged with such a "Fresh Expression" of the Church after we had spent a year studying the book "From the Steeple to the Street". This was one way that churches like ours (smaller, declining, mainline Protestant) had connected with the non-church-going community around them. Maybe it's time to renew that idea for ourselves. Or maybe God is moving us in a different direction. Please pray for how you may bring an uplifting and helpful spirit to these House Meetings as we honor the work of our church leaders!

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church.)

- Devotions centered around praying for our congregation by offering our Kyries and Glorias. We particularly remembered both David Balogh as he moved to Ft. Collins, CO and Paul Cunningham who had been hospitalized for a tumor impeding a leg nerve.
- 2. Pastor Jim reported that he had co-chaired the COPA Accountability Session for the Board of Supervisors candidates in Santa Cruz and Monterey Counties. All candidates agreed to help achieve COPA's agenda of building more affordable housing, protecting renters from unfair practices, seeking more behavioral health and substance abuse treatment opportunities, and providing healthcare for immigrant farmworkers.
- 3. Pastor Jim also met with District 1 Supervisor Manu Koenig (who serves where our church is located), as the Vice President of our Association of Faith Communities. He chaired the meeting where he and 3 others petitioned for the funding of our Faith Community Shelter program (serves 20 unhoused people), and our Safe Spaces Parking program (serves 40 people by allowing them to sleep in their vehicles in church parking lots). We requested \$250,000 per year for annual funding.
- Pastor Jim will be working with Interim Bishop's Communication Director Ms. Catherine Slabaugh (recent CLU grad) as she forms a new Campus Ministry coalition.
- 5. Pastor Jim met with Mt. Cross Interim Director Rev. Jeff Burrow (ret. Bishop from Greater Milwaukee Synod), as they seek a new Executive Director.
- 6. Treasurer Kent Madsen presented the preliminary 2023 budget. It will be voted on by the Council at the December 13 meeting to be brought to the Annual Congregational meeting on Sunday, January 29th after worship.
- 7. Steven Hendrickson, Margaret and Bill Schraft, Kent Madsen and Barbara Rice attended the Interim Bishop's Conference 6 Gathering on Nov. 12th

We gathered in the cement sitting area in a circle, overlooking the harbor with lanterns glowing while she reenacted the story of St. Martin. After, we paraded out onto the sand and gathered for traditional German songs sung in German. Then, we gathered on the docks for Lentil Soup with sausage, crusty bread, and cookies. All but one preschool family attended that evening. It was a beautiful night and a wonderful opportunity for families to meet each other as many are new to our school. Who is St. Martin? "The incident for which he is most remembered also occurred when Saint Martin was a soldier. He was approaching the city of Amiens, in Gaul (France), where he met a naked beggar. Martin cut his riding cloak in half and offered half of it to the beggar. That night Martin had a vision of Jesus, clutching his cloak and telling angels that Martin had given it to him. In some versions, he awoke to find his cloak whole again. The experience was enough to cement his belief in the Christian faith and he was baptized shortly after." THE ADVENT WREATH

Wishing you a Happy New Year as the Church begins a new liturgical year. -

The Advent Wreath is a Christian tradition that signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath has no beginning and no end, symbolizing the eternity of God and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The idea of the wreath dates

back to the early 1800's when Pr. Johann Hinrich Wichern who ministered to poor children, used the wreath to help the children mark the weeks until Christmas. In the beginning, the wreath had twenty five candles, one lit each day begin until Christmas. December 1st. In later years the wreath was reduced to four candle that would mark the weeks leading up to Christmas.

This year our wreath utilizes blue candles to mark the weeks until Christmas. The blue color has come to represent hope. Advent is a time of hope and longing for the coming of the Messiah. Beginning with the candle on the front left and then moving clockwise, one candle is lit each week. The candles represent the four themes of Advent: Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace. The large white candle in the middle of the wreath represents Christ. It is called the "Christ Candle" and is lit on Christmas Eve In many churches it burns until Epiphany which marks the visit of the Magi. The body of the wreath is made of evergreens that represent eternal life, because they are always green.

This year as in past years, our family dedicates the Advent Wreath to the memory of my mother Kathryn Lewis Greso who introduced me to using the Advent Wreath to mark the weeks till Christmas when I was a young girl.

We hope as we light each candle on the wreath, your thoughts will turn inward away from the hustle, bustle, and pressures of today's world, and help you focus your thoughts toward Christ who entered the world that long ago Christmas night.
