

7 REASONS

NOT TO FREAK-OUT ABOUT THE DECLINE OF U.S. CHRISTIANITY

This is the title of an article by Mitchell Atencio of Sojourners community magazine, which is a publication I have long respected, edited by Jim Wallis.

It's quite an attention-grabber for sure, but it also expresses and addresses the very sentiment that I am picking up from our congregation's leaders and members, as we try to be faithful to our Christian calling to share the Good News.

It draws from the Sept. 13 Pew Research Center study that shows 4 hypothetical scenarios should current trends continue. The models **project** that the U.S. population who identify as Christian would decrease from 64% in 2020, to between 35-54% in 2070. (Clearly Santa Cruz is ahead of the curve on this!)

This projection continues the last 30 yrs of accelerated decline of people who identify as Christian in the U.S., and the increase of people who respond "None" when asked about their religion.

I will highlight a few of the 7 responses from various faith leaders, but I encourage you to look up the whole article.

Most of the responders agree in principle that what we are experiencing are the birth pangs of new expressions of Christianity that come when the "old things pass away, and the new has come". The predominant expression of Christianity in the U. S. declining is necessary because it has aligned itself too closely with the values of the state (strong emergence of Christian Nationalism in the last 30 yrs).

Some lift up the times in history when Christianity (including it's very beginning) was the minority and how that enabled it to correct itself as an institution more closely resembling what Jesus Christ came for, taught and ushered in for humanity. Parables about things like a small mustard seed provide the hope that something new and more beneficial will grow from a smaller expression of Christian faith in the U.S. Closely following Jesus seldom wins popularity contests in the New Testament.

- 2. Devotions from Frederich Buechner reminded us that despite King David's many faults and shortcomings which might have led people to dismiss him, the time when he danced for God from his heart as a true expression of his worship and love for God, was enough for God to be seen. As we enter another uncertain time in the life of our church emerging from the effects of the pandemic and some decline in participation, we are seeking ways that we can offer our heart-felt dance and witness of faith, so others will want to be a part of our Christian community.
- 3. House Meetings will be organized for our congregation in early November as we seek to discern where God's Spirit may be leading us in our ministry together. We welcome all without regard to addictions, physical or mental health, imprisonment, socio-economic circumstances, or anything that too often divides us. Our unity is in Christ."

Child Development Center

For this article I will share some of the email entries I sent with pictures attached to the school families the first weeks of school. We are a play-based school who tailors the experience to each individual child. Parent education and explaining the learning in the play is how we foster the Home-School connection.

We welcomed new children Room 2, our Toddler class. It is a very big deal to begin school for the first time when you are used to being home with mommy. Each experience is different. The experience reminded me of the most important part of our ministry and school. Connecting with young hearts and gaining trust. All humans need time to feel familiar with surroundings and new routines before experimenting with the environment. To feel the trust of a young child is a privilege. Social emotional growth is the important gateway to gaining knowledge.

Today we read the "Kissing Hand" about a mother raccoon who kissed her child's hand and put it to his cheek. He was told when he missed his mother to hold his hand to his cheek and remember that mommy loves him. It is charming and a great back to school story. We read "Rawr". Did you know that is how a dinosaur says hello? We sang songs during transition times, and Brenda read the favorite, "Big Blue Truck".

To begin the year, at the sign in table, in the Preschool class, we start with name recognition. To stimulate thinking we have a Question of the Day. Today's question is "Which apple will you like the best?" They took their name and attached it to the apple row they chose. This is teaching them to predict today for tomorrow's tasting. After they taste they will decide and place their name on which they did like. This makes the activity scientific for them. Later for math, they will count apple seeds.

At Circletime, we started our first SEEDS literacy, Repeat Read-Aloud story accompanied by the flannel story pieces. Each child held a vocabulary word which they looked and listened for. Once heard they brought it up to the flannel board. We discussed what the word definition was as they were passed out. This interactive activity helps them to take in the knowledge through an activity that feels like play. Four of the vocab words were Bb words, the letter of the week. After, I extended the story by singing, "The old Oak Tree." "One little owl said who, who. Two little owls said who, who. Three little owls said who, who, as they sat in the old oak tree. (Lift arms like branches)" Each child picks an animal and tells us the sound it makes, and we sing

• game of lost and found stuffed animals, re-

iminds us that each of us matter. We are

like sheep and sometimes stray away from God. That makes God very
sad, but he NEVER gives up on us. He keeps searching for us and calling to us. He wants to draw us back regardless of how lost we are.
This is termed "Holy Hope".

Luke 16:1-13 "The Dishonest Manager"

Our lesson was a little different than the adult take-away. We learned about honesty. #1. Say your mom gave you two cookies to take to the neighbor. It is your favorite kind of cookie, and it smells so good. Your mom said after you come back you can have lunch and eat four cookies. But you are hungry now. Is it the right choice to eat one cookie on the way to the neighbors? No one will ever know. Or is it the right choice to take both cookies to the neighbor? #2. Your Grandma gave you \$10 to buy her a pie at the bake sale. After you do, you have enough money left over to buy a cool toy you saw. Do you bring the change back to grandma, or do you use the money to buy the toy? Honesty is shown by both what we say AND what we do. We always have a choice. When we are honest with the small easy things, then Jesus says we can be trusted with bigger and harder choices.

Like the Bumble Bee, make good choices: Bee truthful; Bee honest; Bee faithful; Bee like Jesus!

The surprise box sharing activity teaches children to work with their parent to make 3 clues so they can be an activity leader in class. After saying each clue, they learn to call on each other when raising a hand. They think through and give ideas. Most of all they learn turn taking. All this combined with sharing. Again, learning through play. I share this so you know what curriculum is hiding in the play. The children are enjoying the activity and practicing how to be involved and engaged.

October is benevolence month for our Preschool. We continue to be unable to host the Aebleskiver Breakfast since it is a large gathering. Last year all were so generous and we really appreciated it!! This year in addition to benevolence we are going to create a new fundraiser called **Inflation Donation**. 
