- 1. Pastor Jim led devotions centered around us seeking God's voice and call for how to lead our congregation into the next few years. He introduced the song "O God, We Call" from our new hymnal supplement—All Creation Sings.
- 2. Pastor Jim gave an update on the Synod: Simon Wong began as new Synod Council VP. He and Interim Bishop Claire Burkat will be meeting with our 9 Conferences Sept-Dec to listen and gather a vision for healing. Ours will be meeting in early Dec. on a Sat. Pr. Tita Valeriano, Asst. to the Bishop for Outreach has taken a call to serve at the Churchwide office in Chicago, and will be greatly missed.
- **3.** The Mt. Cross Exec. Dirs. Adam & Rev. Sara Erickson have resigned as of Aug. 15. Retired Bishop of Greater Milwaukee Synod Jay Burrow will serve as Interim. Mt. Cross has received \$250,000 from the Synod.
- **4.** Amelia "Lia" Tracey will be attending Cal Lutheran Univ. this Fall in the University Honors Program as a Theatre Arts and Education student. Congrats!
- **5.** Our Child Development Center requires water testing for lead this Fall. The Church and School will split the appx. \$650 cost.
- **6.** Council approved the purchase of 60 new <u>All Creation Sings</u> hymnal supplements using appx. \$1,100 from the Memorial Funds from the following saints triumphant: **Jean Calvert, Suzanne Duval, Rev. Glenn Johnson, Jean Petersen & Lu Sluiter.** They will be acknowledged on the inside cover of the books.

It is a milestone year with some new beginnings here at St. Stephen's Child Development Center. Now that we have reached ten years of operation under our own license, we are moving forward on this foundation, rather than building, and worrying about everything we had hoped to build. Short- and long-term goals have been achieved through the support of our teachers and the SSCDC School Board Members, along with generous volunteers, and your prayers.

Beginning this month, SSCDC has an annual budget that will serve the scope of what we can offer here. It took ten years to be informed well enough to create this budget in which Kathy Allen was instrumental in completing with your director. This includes fair compensation for our teachers. The school can serve 20-22 children configured by full and half day attendance. To navigate the building, and due to location of the bathroom, potty training, educating, and making sure each child is in constant site supervision while individually cared for, we need 4 full time teachers, including me as Director/Teacher. This allows us to make sure each child gets the individual attention that we market ourselves on. It also ensures that if a teacher must miss work, 3 teachers can cover the load as there are no substitutes available. The fourth teacher is insurance that we can weather illness or what else might happen. It also allows for everyone to get their breaks. A short staffed school is very hectic and leads to burn out rather quickly.

So, we move forward to this exciting new year! Our teachers are excited as we just had a "regular" curriculum meeting. Meaning NOT all about Covid, rather, what experiences can we create. As our team pulls together our talents, we each have unique activities to facilitate for the children. This is the best, most cohesive teaching team I have ever worked with. We are a peaceful group and honor and appreciate each other. I do not have to manage personalities as we all manage our own. This again, is unique.

We are creating activities in our existing environments keeping what is tried and true while creating new experiences. Putting everything away for Covid gave us a new lens on what is best to provide now, while cleaning out what we have not used and donating so our storage system is efficient.

While all of this is in place and the beginning is here, we have had some families

Please keep us in prayer, especially all I have mentioned in this newsletter. I am now ten years older than I was when I began this adventure, so my abilities are changing with age. I am excited to create an environment where I can run this place efficiently with out the stress and muscle it took to build it. I feel very blessed. I also believe in this often burn-out occupation, especially after Covid, that keeping my own balance is so important to being the leader I need to be for all who I care for in this process.

So where is all the news about exciting plans? This month we are learning ABC, and 123, through different activities. We are going to do yoga, act out stories, cook, continue to garden, and make wonderful art, to name a few. Since it is "All about me" this month we will do body tracings and hang them in the hallway. We will do apple activities and make homemade tortillas for quesadillas. We also focus on different feelings through stories including reading big brother/Little sister stories, etc. for those who have that role at home. This is our traditional curriculum for September.

We are especially excited for our new year with "Chapel Jim!" It is always fun to introduced children to the Chapel experience that they all grow to love! Today in Chapel our quietest boy raised his hand to help Pastor Jim sing a song in front of everyone and you could see his confidence build. The next boy who is usually a follower, volunteered to help too. He sung his heart out in front of us using all the hand motions (This little light of mine). In that space he got to be a leader! That is why we are here; a safe place for children to appropriately develop in their own way.
