

"God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, Things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are" -1 Corinthians 1: 27-28-

The paradoxical nature of these words written by the Apostle Paul to a fledg-ling church in 1st century Greece have always drawn me to our faith by their truth and relevance. They are from the 2nd reading on the Sunday of our Annual Meeting, where we also hear how much God cares for the lowly in the Beatitudes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount in Matthew Ch.5. Lent will draw us further into this way that God has always been about.

As we learned at our Annual Meeting, we are increasingly becoming a remnant of what many of us remember being a part of a church was. Some scholars describe this worldwide situation as a "500 year Rummage Sale" where slowly, decade by decade the church has been cast aside as less and less an influence and source for people's lives. The pandemic further isolated our communities and lives.

Yet, here we are, a remnant church where the above words to the fledgling church are very much welcome and heartening. We still have a powerful call and message to share, maybe more than ever before! As one of our hymns says: "Have no fear, little flock, for God has chosen to give you the kingdom."

The future may look intimidating and scary. We have no idea how this quickening cultural shift away from faith and church is going to play out. But we do know that this is nothing new for God and humanity, and God is with us more and more as we fit the bill!

Still, I am very glad to be a part of this church, where the above words are deeply understood and lived out in so many ways together. Let's continue to seek after these "underneath" ways that Jesus lifted up throughout his 3 year ministry, and join with the ones described above—just like we do with COPA, Santa Cruz al Salvador, our Child Development Center, St. Stephen's Senior Housing, AFC, and the countless other ways we are trying to keep God's main thing the main thing!

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

- 1. The 2023 Proposed Budget was approved at the January 10th meeting. Copies were made available to the congregation on both Sunday, January 15th and January 22nd per the Constitution requirement of two weeks before the Annual Meeting (Sunday, January 29th).
- 2. The fantastic news was shared about the sanctuary roof repairs which were completed before the historic series of storms hit us, and... the repairs were successful! Not a drop came through the two main problem spots that had plagued us for well over 12 years. Many thanks go to church office volunteer Sherilyn Jager and a very highly skilled worker from her office at Knox Roofing, who finally solved the vexing mystery! Also, many thanks were given to our Council Secretary Alyssa Burkhardt, who provided the repair funds.
- Pastor Jim replaced over 50 compact fluorescent light bulbs in our sanctuary light fixtures with LED bulbs—right before Christmas Eve services.
- 4. A worship highlight was the return of "All That Brass" for Christmas Eve. Thanks to Gary Roberts and Nathan Lapp for organizing the stirring music and ensemble. Attendance at the 5pm service was quite low. Next year we will probably eliminate that service.
- 5. Longtime member Don Ray, husband of our beloved Doris Ray, of Ben Lomond, passed away recently. A service will be organized by his daughter Donna Kemper who is a member of Good Shepherd Lutheran in Salinas. Rest eternal grant him O God and may light perpetual shine upon him.

I have known Dave and Amy (Grandparents), and Andrea (Mom), for over 12 years and was delighted when Addison joined our St. Stephen' family.

In January and February, literacy comes to life in our preschool class-room. Lois Ehlert wrote the book "Snowballs". This story describes how all the bird food is covered in snow. So a family uses bird seed, popcorn, branches, string, etc., to decorate a variety of snow family characters, including a snow cat and a snow dog. I have collected many collaging items. Each child chooses which they are going to make. Please look for this display on our large display board at the entrance. You are sure to enjoy it! We also bring to life Jan Brett's, "The Mitten." A boy goes out into the

snow to play and loses his mitten in the snow. Several forest creatures crawl into the mitten. They are stuffed in there until a mouse sits on the bear's nose. The bear sneezes and the mitten flies into the air, leaving the animals tumbling. Each child wears a hat representing each animal. The teachers hold up a big white bedsheet as the mitten. They each crawl in while I narrate. Eventually, the sheet flies into the air and the students come tumbling out.

Valentine's Day is almost here! Leslie and I are partnering up to have the St. Stephen's children make Valentines for out senior neighbors. We try to do this every year. We want them to know that we think about them and care for their well-being!

This year I will make silhouettes of our older students in the preschool class for their parents as their Valentine card/gift. We will also be making bags for our Valentine exchange. We keep it traditional and old fashioned.

I am so fortunate to have the time to do special projects with our students. It is because of our three talented teachers, Brenda, Sam, and Rosio, that I can concentrate on these larger projects as they provide the daily learning and experiences. They are excellent teachers, and I am always grateful. Please give them prayers of thanks and continued strength as they work with our precious children each day.

We have a new student, Sebastian who just turned two joining our Toddler class this month. I continue to have a connection for over 10 years with two nearby home daycares who do infant care where we recommend students to each other. It is a trusted community connection which I appreciate.




Mathew 4:12-23 "I will make you fish for people"

Around 75 leaders from 12 institutions got together to share our stories of the work we engaged in over the past 3 years in our communities—making them safer and more just for people our society often overlooks. We also began to look ahead at what we want to work on in the future.

Specifically, we will celebrate the occasion of our 20th anniversary as an organization of organizations with an impressive record of public victories that have improved the lives of everyone in our communities. This will take place either May 7th or 21st after church in Salinas. We committed to bringing 50 people, so please mark your calendar!

And the work is always ongoing. So we will be announcing our new public agenda at this large assembly where close to 1000 of us will gather with some of our public officials. These kinds of numbers show our relational power and encourage our community leaders to follow through on helping us provide things like more affordable housing, better access to medical and behavioral health care, and better services for our essential migrant workers and their families.


