

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

3/14/23 submitted by Shelly Barker, President

- 1) Resumption of Lenten suppers after cancellation of shared meals due to COVID in the past two year was met with enthusiasm as attendance has been 15-17 people for the initial weeks.
- 2) Association of Faith Communities (AFC) held a retreat in early March and there is enthusiasm among Board Members, including Pastor Jim, to seek sustained funding to maintain their services for people experiencing homelessness. These services include the Faith Community Shelter and Safe Parking Program as well as a roving shower trailer. AFC will likely be seeking a full time Executive Director in the near future and the Board is hoping to approach the County Board of Supervisors to seek sustaining funding to for their programs. Their shelter programs have a remarkably high rate of success for clients finding and retaining stable housing placements. Look out for announcements about an AFC Gala fundraising dinner which will also feature a keynote speaker along with live and silent auctions.
- 3) We discussed our worship practices noting that offering wine in individual glasses each week for communion is labor-intensive. The group decided to resume the practice of intinction (dipping communal bread into a shared wine/grape juice chalice). Noting the varied level of comfort among members, the plan is to purchase more sealed individual wine/bread containers and resume intinction when those supplies arrive so as to have that option available for those who feel more comfortable receiving communion in that manner.
- 4) COPA (Communities Organized for relational Power in Action) is inviting participation in a series of planning sessions to finalize details of a 20th Anniversary Convention. Please save the date: Saturday, May 20th, 5-7pm at the Golden State Theatre (417 Alvarado St., Monterey, CA 93940)

We look forward to installing a plaque in honor of Glenn and Barbara and their generosity to our Preschool on our new gazebo shade. The preschool was a long-term dream for both of them and I hope they are smiling down on us as we share in their kindness and continue to fulfill the dream.

SSCDC Stewards of the Month Pastor Jim & Kyle Lapp

The permanent shade structure arrived! All 750 pounds of it in 3 boxes. Pastor Jim and Kyle immediately got to work on the assembly which took 3 days. There were so many steps in the directions and they patiently and efficiently assembled this for us before the next rain storm. John Hopping helped out on the third day as they raised the roof. Not only was the structure a gift but so was the experience of having Pastor Jim and Kyle on campus together to complete this task.

The new shade structure really offers so much protection from the elements. I feel like I am on vacation when I sit underneath it. Not only is it functional it looks so majestic on our playground.

Tut, Tut, it looks like rain! Add in a time change and we are at our best trying to keep California weather children entertained. Teacher Sam made an obstacle course in Fellowship Hall by using colored masking tape. My favorite was the tables put together with dancing ribbons dangling down in a few rows. It gave the feeling of going through a car wash without the water. Brenda, Rosio, and Sam are really putting in the extra fun

while entertaining and teaching our children.

Along with acting out Jan Brett's, "The Mitten", we did a repeat read aloud of "The Bear Snores On." This means each child receives a vocabulary word with the picture drawn next to it. While they listen to the story they look and listen for the word and bring it up to the felt board during the story. Adding movement to literacy help integrate the experience for each child to active learning. The two stories parallel in having the same animal creatures in them.

Our Easter Egg Hunt was March 31. This is a fun event each year and families enjoy coming to watch the fun. We will be closed for Spring Break during Holy Week, returning on April 10th.

Santa Cruz office of Education has included private schools as a group to receive Incident Command Training. This is the same course they are doing with all public schools. These days it is hard to plan for one scenario that requires quick thinking. It is a process of mindset. An incident occurs and the Director must be able to direct others to address the situation as it presents itself. Usually there is little time to plan because response to intruders, natural disasters, or gas leaks, to name a few, warrants individual response. Even though we have a plan which includes evacuation, it may not be what we need at the time of incidence. What if someone is absent, or emotional, or injured? A couple of retired police officers are doing an excellent job to prepare our minds for flexibility, clarity, and action. This includes how to prepare before, be proactive during, and debriefing and preparing after. The group collaboration exercises show us that we can move forward in a crisis if necessary. I have been meeting with about 60 local directors via Zoom for three years beginning with COVID updates. It has been fun to meet these educators in person that we have only met on zoom. There is a great community of leaders out there taking care of our children in Santa Cruz County. It hasn't been easy, but we all have managed to keep things going through many challenging times.

Our big challenge ow is keeping enrollment full as so many children have the option of transitional kindergarten. This is removing a bulk of 4-year-olds from our programs. I was approached by some to find out what we are doing. We have always offered a 3 to 4 aged combo class which serves us well during these changing times.

Boundless

Stories of Christ's Abounding Love & Grace

"I can proudly say I am now able to run successful projects without fear of failure. My family lacks nothing, I have all that I once dreamt of having, and I am a proud mother." These are the words of Rumbidzai Tomu, a woman in the Mwenezi District of Southern Zimbabwe who is involved with the Integrated Rural Development Project of Lutheran Development Services in Zimbabwe. She always had ambitions of providing her family with a better life. With help from LDS she accomplished her goal.

In 2017, LDS established garden and fishery projects in Rumbidzai's community, giving her and others the opportunity to generate a consistent income. Two years later, though, their water source dried up and the projects would not continue. She was again without an income. In 2021 they submitted a proposal to LSS for a new project that wasn't' as reliant on water: the poultry project.

As the poultry project excelled, sufficient rainfall came to replenish the community's water source, enabling Rumbidqai to bring back the garden project and add vegetable sales to her streams of income. She also participates in a community income-saving-and-lending group, which increases the investment capital of everyone in the group.

"The money I obtained from selling vegetables, I multiplied it through income saving and lending and then used it to build the chicken housing." Her aspirations didn't stop with her chickens and garden. With her savings, she opened a small shop. Her husband, who can now afford travel documents, imports items from South Africa and Mozambique to sell in the store. She also bought pigs to add another source of income.



"It's not about the Bunny, it's about the Lamb" &



Oblate Ceremony Reminisces

On February 18, I became an Oblate at New Camaldoli

Hermitage in Big Sur. What follows is a mini glossary to help in understanding:

<u>Oblate</u>- one who is an associate of monks in a monastery. The monastic practice of community, meditation, and Lectio Divina are followed. Silence and stillness are emphasized in a life lived in the world.

<u>Camaldolese</u>- the Order that the monks and oblates are part of. In addition, they are part of a larger group, the Order of St. Benedict.

<u>Lectio Divina</u>- a prayerful, slow, meditative reading of the Scriptures, usually the Gospel. The reading is repeated three times. The first time, one listens. The second time, a word or phrase is selected, the third time, each person reflects upon what the Spirit is saying to them. Silence is kept in between each reading and sharing is optional.

<u>Threefold Good</u>- the central tenets of the Camaldolese Charism (an extraordinary power given by the Holy Spirit for the good of the church). These tenets are community, silence, and solitude, and sharing one's gifts.

<u>Personal Rule of Daily Life Practice</u>- a way of being using monastic practices in living a clearly articulated lifestyle. It states what the practical life looks like as one lives in the world. Personal context and responsibilities are woven into a spiritual whole.

With God's grace and help, I am now a Camaldolese Oblate. The ceremony went well, and much love and beauty were ever present. Fr. Cyprian and Fr. Steve Coffey were very gracious and I remembered my response to the promise questions. Seven others were witnesses: family, friends, and my Pastor Jim Lapp and spouse, Leslie. The monks were very supportive and positive. Afterwords, we enjoyed an amazing picnic lunch overlooking the ocean. A visit to the Bookstore framed an ending to our time at the Hermitage.

On an inner level, the vow marks an auspicious moment in my spiritual journey.

Living in the Threefold Good and a Personal Rule of Daily Life Practice will keep me in union with the monks and all of you. It's all sinking in, slowly and beautifully. Thanks for your love and support!

How It Works

Habitat for Humanity is not a giveaway program. Families purchase our homes with a down payment, sweat equity, and an affordable mortgage.

Homeowner families are chosen according to their need, their ability to repay the no-profit, zero-interest mortgage, and their willingness to work in partnership with Habitat. Each Habitat homeowner contributes 500 hours in sweat equity towards the construction of a Habitat home.

Who It Benefits

Habitat for Humanity is a community-based organization, and we strive to make a positive impact on as many people as possible.

There is more to our program than just providing affordable home ownership for low and very low income families. Partner families attend workshops on budgeting, conflict resolution, home maintenance, repair, and landscaping. Our partner families acquire skills and knowledge that will enable them to establish a foundation upon which they can gain economic stability and build a brighter future for their children.

Our volunteers come from a wide range of backgrounds with a massive variety of skills. Anyone can come and put decades of knowledge to work building affordable housing, or come in with no experience and learn how to construct a home from the ground up.


