

From Pastor Jim



The day before Ash Wednesday, I learned of our dearly loved former long-time member Gwyn Larsen's untimely death of a recurrence of cancer.

It was kind of a blow to my spirit because we had just received her Christmas photo and letter where she had said that she was confronting the recurrence as if it might be something that she would be able to receive treatment for and get past.

Gwyn had battled cancer before and all of us knew her as the kind of joyful and strong spirit who would likely be able to overcome it again this time. She had just moved away from their home on Depot Hill in Capitola to Oceanside, CA to be near her daughter Chelsea and her new family. Her and her husband Dave's move happened right around the same time that the pandemic had begun, so we were unable to do a much-hoped for Farewell and Godspeed in worship.

They had been part of this church family since 1985—that's 35 years where she raised her 3 children (Zack & Peter) and served our congregation in many different capacities. She was the Council Secretary when Leslie and I arrived and could be counted on to help with just about anything the church asked for.

To see her warm and loving smile in her obituary in the Sentinel was just about unbelievable. She was one of the few folks who was about a generation ahead of Leslie and I, and we looked to her and the others as role models as we set out on our own journey of raising a family here. She was so encouraging of us, especially when she knew that some of our extended family would be coming to town to celebrate a baptism or confirmation or some other milestone. Her hospitality is something we will always be grateful for and see as God's Spirit ministering to us.

As a pastor's family we are often the ones extending God's love and welcome on behalf of the church. Gwyn was one of those who knew that and that it sometimes brought it's own challenges and difficulties for us. So she would make special attempts to care for us and we felt like extended family to her at times.

But most of all she provided us some hope. We looked to her and her family as something we could look forward to when we reached her place in life. It would be fun (and not as scary as we might have thought) to raise teenagers in Santa Cruz. That was a real gift for us as many of my extended family lived too far away to be more involved in the raising of our family and all the questions and doubts that come with that.

Of course, I wish we could have been closer so that there wasn't the inevitable drift from church that happens when one's children have grown and moved on. I wish we could have had that Farewell and Godspeed and had the opportunity to lift up her gifts one last time. Instead, as Ash Wednesday reminded us, we will trust in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection to life everlasting. Rest well dear Gwyn. You are always in the heart of your church in Santa Cruz.

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

- 1. Devotions consisted of sharing some of our faith stories as we get to know each other as a new Council. Half of us offered these at the last meeting and the other half will do so at the next one.
- 2. Pastor Jim gave his report which included updates on some members whose health is declining. He also was called on by the Interim Bishop of our Sierra Pacific Synod, Rev. Claire Burkat, to serve as her Advisor as she began implementing a Draft Policy for Discipline of Rostered Leaders when an allegation is made. He also shared his activity as the Vice President of the Association of Faith Communities and their work to shelter 20 people, as well as the 40 Safe Spaces Parking clients, and then helping move them into permanent shelter. All County Supervisors have been approached to provide permanent funding for these programs which have the highest success rate of any in the County.
- 3. Both the minutes of the Annual Meeting and the last Council meeting were approved.
- 4. Treasurer Kent Madsen introduced some elements he has added to his reports in order to make some aspects of financial accounting more clear. He was thanked by all the Council for the great amount of work he has put in as our Treasurer for the last several years.
- 5. Pastor Jim updated the Council on the next steps for COPA. Plans for our 20th Anniversary Assembly in May are getting underway. We are trying to bring 30 from our congregation, 10 from St. Stephen's Senior Housing 10 from our preschool. A clergy gathering will take place March 30th.
- 6. We were saddened to learn of beloved former long-time member Gwyn Larsen's untimely death from a recurrence of cancer on Feb. 13th. Blessed be the memory of this child of God and may light perpetual shine upon her.

I introduced them to the concept of community outreach/service; Kindness to neighbors, or picking up trash off the beach, etc. This plants the seed for them as they get older and might want to share in other ways with their community.

The children dress as the animal characters with a hat and each crawl into the mitten (Teachers holding a white sheet) until the mouse sits on the bear's nose, he sneezes, and they all come tumbling out! We honored William Bulfin on Scout Sunday as he and his crew renovated our garden area. We will hang a plaque in his honor in our garden this spring. We are looking forward to getting our garden going. I do need to add some chicken manure and other things to replenish the soil. Last year growing season wasn't that great, not even at my home. This year we hope for a successful garden, including milkweed for our Monarch butterfly visitors. The caterpillars were voracious eaters last year and we ran out of leaves. If you know of a source for local milkweed plants that are affordable, please let me know!

The teachers and I look forward to some regular activities with the children that are not completely holiday focused. I like to play games with them that teach numbers and letters in a fun way. We finished all the conferences with the parents and now it is time to play and practice what we are building on.

I was recently informed that Amazon smile will be discontinued as a source for donations to schools. I thank you for considering this and did not realize it would be short lived. I will research any further opportunities for this kind of thing and let you know if we pursue it. We do continue to have a wish list for items on Amazon.

Inflation Donation is still up and running. Thank you for the items that help our snack and supply budget. A new list can be found on our display in the Narthex.

I continue to meet each Monday morning with the County Office of Education (COE) and the Superintendent of Santa Cruz City Schools, along with other Preschool directors, about 60 each week. What began as a Covid information session has become information on other subjects that effect directing schools and implementing safety. Due to the bad news regarding safety of children on school campuses the COE will be conducting four 2.5 hour sessions over the next 4 months for emergency training. Preschool Directors have been included to join public school teachers to learn together how to protect our children. I appreciate being included.



Our December Benevolence Is making a difference



Matthew 5:21-37 Forgiving & Forgiven



Psalm 51—A Scriptural Template for Lenten

As we enter the season of Lent, how is your daily scripture reading and quiet time going? Especially now, we are greatly encouraged to hear God's Word and embrace self examination. King David's words reflect this prayerful inner dialogue. Noting his shortcomings, blockages, and sinful inclinations, his experience and heartfelt desires frame the structure of the Psalm. Even though the entire Psalm is to be commended, verses 5 and 19 seem problematic, but these need to be discussed at another time.

Verses 6 and 10 are rich for reflection. "You desire truth in the inward being, therefore teach me wisdom in my secret heart (V. 6)." " Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me (V. 10, NRSV)." These are hopeful pleas in one who knows that what proceeds from the heart is not pure, Godly, or in keeping with the spark planted deep within. To put it bluntly, the issue is human sin, his and ours. On our own, the effects of our sin in the world are grotesque and ghastly. But, thanks be to God, we are not left as orphans twisting and spinning in the wind. Through David, we know that God's forgiveness helps to mitigate our existential predicament. These verses are lifted up as context clues as to where God's power emanates from. David is aware through God's Spirit that evil and good coexist in our heart, but truth and light are our inheritance through the image, likeness, and DNA of the Triune God. Apparently, David attributes confession, humbleness, and a teachable attitude are a means to access a changed life, and most of all, communion with God. The numerous pleas for help in overcoming sin gives us much to reflect upon in the forty days of Lent. The number 40 means completion, after we humbly engage in confession and changing our mind. Easter and new beginnings arise like bright "Sonshine."

Let's "return to the Lord" over the coming days and weeks leading to the Crucifixion and Easter. Sitting with this Psalm and the other appointed readings can refresh us with a renaissance of faith. Blessings to each of you in Lent.
