From Pastor Jim



Right before worship on May 21st, I was greeted by our dear Sandi Crouser with these beautiful words: "Pastor Jim, you must feel like a proud Papa!"

She was referring to her first experience at a COPA Convention, which took place on Sat. May 20th at the Golden State Theater in Monterey. A bus had been reserved for folks from Santa Cruz, so Sandi was able to attend this time.

What she was referring to was that I was honored to be able to tell the COPA story, since I was a founding pastor of the organization. I told about how Rev. Michael Wilker and I applied for small grant from the ELCA and received \$10,000 to begin to explore the possibility of starting a new 2-county Community Organization to address some of the large-scale problems our congregations were facing like the lack of affordable housing and adequate health care for the poorest.

I was joyfully able to proclaim that that initial \$10,000 had turned into tens of millions of dollars of public money that went toward alleviating those very problems (\$18 million for our own St. Stephen's Senior Housing!), thanks to the work of so many COPA leaders over the years.

What I was even more proud of was the work that COPA leader Maria Elena Manzo from Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Salinas was celebrating through her new organization Mujeres en Accion (Women in Action). For the first time, we had a significant number of Latina women leaders from the towns along the Salinas Valley participating and helping lead the Convention. These are the communities that are really hurting the most and we've been working a long time to see this come to fruition.

I was also very proud to carry on the work of our dear brother Rev. Herb Schmidt (who recently resigned) as Vice—Chair of the Board for the Association of Faith Communities homeless shelter programs. It was very heartening to have 13 people from our church attend the May 13th Gala Fundraiser at Holy Cross Catholic Church. We had so much fun that our table got "Church-Ladied" by a neighboring table because we were laughing so loud!

Much more importantly, \$24,000 was raised! And even more importantly, the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors just approved \$350,000 for our programs! This stable funding enables us to adequately staff well into the future.

Thanks be to God for all of you as we really have much to be proud of as we fulfill our mission as a deeply biblical church by being partners with God in mending our communities in these ways and many more!

Church Council Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

- 1. Devotions led by Pastor Jim centered on several scripture passages of examples of how God's leaders were often unlikely folks and reluctant to serve. Moses, Jeremiah, and the disciples remind us that God is more interested in the heart and soul, rather than credentials and experience. The willingness to serve is all God needs for us to be chosen as leaders for God's church.
- 2. In attendance were Shelly Barker, Steven Hendrickson, Alyssa Burkhardt, Kent Madsen, Beth Stiles and Iva Tracey. Jay Johnston was out of town.
- 3. Pastor Jim reported that he will be on vacation/ continuing education from June 12— July 7. He will be visiting some of the important Luther and Reformation sites in Worms and Augsburg Germany. He will also visit his family heritage Lutheran Church in Rhodt, Bavaria, where he has been able to trace his Great-Grandmother's family back to 1620. The original church is gone, but the baptismal font is still used in the present church—the same one his ancestors were baptized in. The church became Lutheran in 1570—about 50 years after Luther's trial and famous proclamation of "Here I stand. I can do no other" when he was excommunicated for not recanting the 95 Theses he had posted on his church door in Wittenberg.
- 4. Rev. Carol Been will preside at worship on June 18th. Rev. Gary Stevenson will preside on June 25th and July 2nd.
- 5. Barbara Johnston was approved to serve on the CDC Board as Mary Kelley faithfully completes her 2nd three yr. term.
- 6. Pastor Jim will be calling a Mutual Ministry meeting (Kent Madsen, Jeanette Dawson, Bill Schraft) to discuss replacing our Treasurer and begin to plan for our 70th Anniversary on Reformation Sunday Oct. 29th.

Child Development Center

Our regular school year ended in May with celebrating our graduates. In total, Tanner, Waylon, Selene, Elsie, Everett, Jack, and Beau. Waylon and Selene's families have been with us for 5 years; they are the younger siblings of Elio and Amelia. Four of the seven students will be moving to Universal Pre-kindergarten (UPK). Pre-Kindergarten is now provided for families at public schools. This marks an era of change for childcare and preschools like ours. We are licensed for children ages 2-6. Now we will serve children 2-4. This means we will generally tailor our curriculum for a younger group. We are currently working on enrollment for September 2023 while providing our summer program.

Our School Board thanks and celebrates Mary Kelly. She has completed 6 years as a volunteer, supporting our program. Mary generously has helped our school with planning. She contributed to making our playground a safer and more usable place by donating to improve it. It has been a pleasure to work with Mary! Thank you for all your support!

I want to thank Kent, Barbara, and Jay for their service in recording the Worship services. My grandson played little league this year which has been a joy. I appreciate getting to view the service when away. Now that summer is here I will be taking some time to enjoy my family. It has been a year since I have been to Montana. I look forward to returning.

This summer we will be providing water play and fun outdoor activities. None more rewarding than our garden this year. The chicken manure really did the trick. It is in full growth. We sent home bouquets of sweet pea flowers to all the families to enjoy. I invite you to take a peek if you're on campus it is sure to make you smile. The children LOVE going into the garden. Our new item is a greenhouse. Now we can grow seeds. John arranged the redwood stumps to be a balancing course, a new activity. Thank you John! Everything is finally cleared out and taking on the vision we have had for our playground.

Summer is a time to reflect and implement some new ways of doing things as we flex with the changing times. I completed incident command training in May and will be putting best practices into a plan to provide for, and respond appropriately should we ever have a dangerous situation during school hours. I am appreciative of the County Office of Education (COE) for including Preschool Directors in the training and partnership with our public schools.

As I contemplate and plan for our school year, I share this with you. Last month we had a student return to us who had been with us briefly when he turned two, as was his older sister. They left during Covid. He did not return to any preschool until now at age four back to us. Separation can be a big deal in this kind of situation. This child arrived and it felt a bit familiar to him. Within his first hour he was playing and smiling. In his first week I watched him melt into the fabric of childhood while enjoying all that was around him as he discovered his place. His family is so relieved and grateful. We do this for these moments when children find their place and thrive.



Kids are perplexed by the term "church family", but turned to impressed that you all pray for them without really knowing them.





Interiority in Liturgical Worship

Being in touch with your inner self in liturgical worship can be meaningful and even life changing! We pray for God's presence in a way which invites dialogue of communication and response. As Jesus said to the Samaritan woman at the well, "But

the hour is coming, and is now here, the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship God. God is spirit, and those who worship God must worship in spirit and truth." (John 4:23–24 NRSV) So Christ is inviting us to bring our whole selves in worship. Especially what dwells within us as our interior expression.

Some inner intentions we may bring to a liturgical setting are: praise and thanks for God's presence and help, a longing for God, "As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God. My soul thirsts for the living God." (Psalm 42:1-2) We also bring our brokenness, sin, and need for forgiveness. We bring our joys, hope, and most of all our issues over what separates us from God. Our relationships with others, and our desire for peace and healing in Creation that surrounds and is within us. We have our own messages, pleas, and wishes to express in a way that no one else may know. When one knows the liturgy well through constant worship, another track opens that provides space to "pray in the spirit" simultaneously while speaking the words. Also, the verbal expressions themselves, open new vistas for revelation through the Holy Spirit. And to top it off, singing hymns can become a full body experience which teaches and expresses our inner intentions and wishes. All these radiant events take place in community which bring us into oneness with God.

In conclusion, our daily quiet time with scripture and reflection enables one to experience the inner self in relationship with Abba, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. Reading the Bible while following the Lectionary, prepares us for the upcoming liturgical service and encourages revelation into our daily lives. I pray and trust that you are continuing this practice of silence and reflecting on Gods Word. May we all grow in the spirit together....

We run nine different programs carefully designed to connect people with housing. We end or prevent homelessness for over 300 people each year. And again, we're just one organization working on the issue in our county.

People are getting out of homelessness and into housing every. single. day. It takes a tremendous amount of work and support. And yet they're doing it. WE — as a community — are doing it. It's beautiful and inspiring and transformational.


