What does having a home church mean to you and your family?

My parents first met each other in this church. They got married here, and when they had me and my sister we were baptized here. I still remember when the room next to the fire-side room was where all the toys were, and me and my sister would play in there and fight over which of us was older. I remember how my parents always chose someone from church to babysit me, first Shelby, then Rachel, and then Nelleke when she was old enough. I remember when we went through different Sunday School teachers after the one I knew for so long left. I remember when the senior housing was just an empty field which we would use for church celebrations. Every memory I have of my childhood somehow ties into the church, the people in it, or the things my parents would teach me about it. I liked to go to church because I got to see people who had known me when I was a baby. I liked to show off how much I'd grown up, and I would always follow what my mother

One day I was out at 38th Ave talking to this old man named Roger. He was telling me about how he could barely paddle because of his shoulder. That was the worst thing on the long list of injuries he had. I asked him, "If you're in so much pain, why do you still come out here and try to surf?" He replied with, "This is my church. If it weren't for surfing I probably wouldn't still be here."

was doing so I could look more like her. Even when I was old enough to make the decision whether I wanted to go to church or not, I still decided to stay because this is like my sec-

That day made me realize how important surfing really is. To me, God is connecting with a Higher Power, which is exactly what you're doing when you're surfing. The whole goal is to be so much in sync with that wave that you can get to the nose and hang 10. But that's not possible without turning when the wave allows you to be able to set up for cross-stepping. Every other problem bubbling around in my mind goes away that moment. As I'm looking down the face of that wave, everything is clear to me. That's exactly why I consider surfing bringing me closer to God.

I feel most close to God when I'm at my lowest points. Whenever I am struggling and stressed, I turn to God and he is always there for me.

One question I have about faith is how vast the spiritual side of this world really is and what it is like.

I tend to view God in 3 different ways; those being the father, the son, and the Holy Spirit. I view God the father as this incredible being that is incomprehensible. When I close my eyes and envision him, I see him as a great white ball of light. I view Jesus as a human being who is like a friend that is always there for me. The Holy Spirit to me is the part of God that is within all of us as his creation.

I would say I feel most close with God when I'm by myself, especially without my phone. When I'm around a lot of people, I feel like there's a lot to comprehend and I kind of lose track of God. And when I'm on my phone, all of my other thoughts fly out the window. Every single time I've felt myself slowly get closer to God, I was either in church or by myself. The biggest doubt or concern I have about my faith is that I feel like sometimes I look at Jesus as more of a moral role model, and not as a risen messiah. I know everybody experiences and interprets faith differently, but I feel like that's my biggest concern, and I need to work on that.

The biggest thing I've learned from Pastor Jim is to understand that the Bible sometimes needs to be brought into modern day context. The example I still tell people about is how one verse in the Bible says that if you find green splotches in your house, you need to call a priest to cleanse your house, and if it doesn't go away, you have to tear your house down and put it in an unclean part of the city. We now know that the green is just mold, and not something that you need to call a priest for. My favorite part of church is holy communion. When I was younger, it was just something I looked forward to for the wafer and grape juice, but now I really like the idea that God is forgiving, and that at any point I can get a fresh start. I think a unique gift God has given me is that I'm driven. I think I'm good at staying motivated and positive. I understand why that's important.

I love having a home church because it's a place where I can always come back and feel welcomed doing so. Places like school and volleyball are usually places where I feel comfortable and welcomed, but there will always be times when I won't. The one thing I might change about my home church would be that I would bring more people in. It's not that I don't like having a pretty small church (because I actually do like it), but the more the merrier!

My mom was the one who introduced me to Christianity. I think the most important thing she taught me was that God is *always* there for me. She always told me about how she found comfort in God at her lowest points. God being a higher power that no human can understand can be sort of intimidating, but in a way, I feel like it's a little comforting to have something so big and beyond the realm of understanding always by my side.

The song "Fly Love" from the movie *Rio* sort of encompasses what I feel about God. To be honest, if I didn't know any better, I could be convinced it's a gospel song. The song starts with the singer saying "Wasn't really thinking, wasn't looking, wasn't searching for an answer, when I saw your face" which I think perfectly represents how God often shows up and comes to support you when you've given up or when you're not expecting help. At the end of the song, the singer says "Now I know love is real" which I think could represent how vast and true God's love is.

The Circle is requesting that the Church Council begin a Kitchen Upgrade Task Force. Several reasons were offered and they volunteered to be part of the new Task Force. This was approved unanimously.
- 2. Beth Stiles reported on the plan for our 70th Anniversary Celebration. The cake will be ordered by the Confirmation parents and we will try to do a fun interview of some of our long-time members. Pastor Jim will set up the displays made by Lisa Johnson some years ago, which show St. Stephen's history. Don Smawley has agreed to provide the main course for the lunch after church and people will sign-up to bring side dishes.
- 3. Pastor Jim reported on his presiding at 2 non-member funerals at Oakwood Cemetery, & on his leadership as V.P. of Assoc. of Faith Communities, on the Regional Strategy Team of COPA & as newly appointed President of Lutheran Campus Ministry SC and Monterey.
- 4. The Holy Conversation sign-ups went well and 4 gatherings were held. Summaries of the discussions are being compiled by the Sustainability Group to be presented to the Church Council. This will help us determine the direction of our ministry in the next 5 years or so.
- 5. Pastor Jim, Leslie and about 10 folks from St. Stephen's attended the Memorial Service for our dear brother, Marshall Bautz on Sept. 23. It was held at Christ Lutheran—Aptos. We also met the new pastor there, Rev. Jonas Ellison.

Child Development Center

There are many things I am thankful for; I can find them near and far. There are many things I am thankful for, let me tell you what they are...

Wow! So many friends from St. Stephen's are participating in improving our preschool in different ways. First, I want to thank the Saturday workday volunteers for painting the entrance door and our sandbox. We send a special thanks to Doug! It looks fantastic! The sandbox is special because Ron Buswell built it for us from a drawing I made, and I (We) appreciate the help preserving it.

Thank you to all who donated for benevolence month in October. Every penny helped to get us through some time of struggle. Additionally, we reached out to our school families, and they pitched in as well. Thanks to our church and school friends we are stocking up on supplies we always use through Inflation Donation. Kards for Kids is affording us the ability to purchase the food and supplies we need. Not only do I (We) appreciate the actual donations, but I also feel embraced by all of you who have participated. The prayers especially have turned things around with our 5 new students beginning in November! Although SSCDC benevolence month has ended in October, we will continue to appreciate donations through Inflation Donation (Kleenex, Ritz & Graham crackers, Mac & Cheese, Clorox or Lysol Wipes, Lysol Spray, Ketchup, and Ranch salad dressing.) Kards for Kids (Costco, Safeway, Amazon, and Home Depot), and prayer.

The best part of now is the hope we see. We are cleaning out our spaces and redefining things. We are still safe and cautious as additional fun activities are returning. I am enjoying the time to do many things for and with the children, rather than supporting and enforcing health policy. Along with that I can move beyond the shock of losing our 4-year-old children to public school as we are at full enrollment. That means 21 are enrolled, with 15 attending full days. We have two siblings joining in Jan/Feb 2024 which brings us to 23. Families come here for our teacher child ratio and home feeling atmosphere. We also have excellent curriculum learned in a play atmosphere. Everything we do is developmentally appropriate. Therefore, this is a good number of students to serve while meeting our expenses and rebuilding our reserve.

We have just wrapped up our Halloween activities including the parade around senior housing. This is a fun community gathering and parents get to enjoy and meet other parents in addition to sharing with our senior neighbors.

We have two sets of twins starting this month. One fraternal for the Toddler class, and one identical for the preschool class. All girls. We also welcome our

Zellie to Room 2! We will be working to settle them all in.

This month we will have Picture Day on November 9th. **We will celebrate Saint Martin's Day on November 14th as we have for several years with our German family.** We meet at Crows Nest in the evening to see the play of St. Martin giving his fancy cloak to a poor beggar man who needs warmth. Each child made a paper lantern, and we parade in the sand together, sing German songs, then eat a hearty soup together back in the table area. This is another great way for the parents to get to know each other and we always have a big turnout. Then we move onto pie baking with the children on the 16th and 17th, so they learn the meaning of Thanksgiving by bringing something they have made to their family to share. We are closed Thanksgiving week. After Thanksgiving, we have Central Fire visiting us along with their big fire engine to teach fire safety to the children.

We planted a winter garden with Brussel Sprouts, broccoli, cauliflower, and red and yellow onions. Our first full winter garden. I hope it thrives!

Recollecting God Experience By Steven Hendrickson

In one's journey of faith, life happens! There are high and low points, and of course, the ordinariness of everyday. We trust and know that our Lord is with us, but are we really paying attention? 
