Letting Go to Reshape Our Imagination

"So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: see, everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

2 Corinthians 5:17

Throughout human history, there has been a cycle of decline, death, rebirth, and resurrection in institutions such churches, civic, fraternal groups and even familial structures. In the present moment, when one surveys the activities and vigor of these organizations, a definite change is underway. What has worked well for an older generation is in decline, with a major change clearly in view. For the intent and purpose of this article, we will focus on congregations and our Synod with a brief discussion.

The first symptom of decline and death, is a marked lack of participation and financial resources. A feeling of fear and sadness in the congregation begins to begin attempts to rejuvenate the "good old days." Other emotions can emerge such as anger as the grieving process begins in earnest. These elements of loss and grief need to be acknowledged, experienced, and seen as a healthy response to a new outcome. This is difficult, so prayer and trust in God's leading are very important. A powerful way to shepherd one another is to engage in thoughtful dialogue to determine next steps. An openness to new forms of ministry can help to promote hope and envision a different model in "being the church." An honest assessment is the product of all the emotions that have been mentioned here. Our congregants need to be aware of the changes and have regular input and voice in decision making. Being led by the Spirit, we all are being asked to be co-creators to envision a conscious transition with hopefully a large blessing given to greater community. New ministry is born with

heartfelt affinities and recognition of worship that is new, vibrant, and reflective of a changed consciousness as a result of "emptying" ourselves from what has gone before.

These thoughts are offered as a way to reshape our imaginations both as congregations and our Synod as a whole. Much prayer, gratitude, deep listening, and especially letting go, along with "Eastering One Another" will awaken us to the power of God moving us forward. Thanks be to God for leading all of us in this difficult but rewarding evolution in our faith lives.......

Church Council / Annual Meeting Highlights

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

- 1. Devotions were offered by our Treasurer Mark Linder. He read the two most important verses from Ephesians and Romans for Martin Luther, about the grace of God being the only requirement for salvation from sin today and forever. We reflected on how this frees us from the images of God as an angry judge waiting to punish sinners, and helps us remember that God is so loving and gracious each and every day of our lives. Remembering this strengthens our commitment to God's ways through what we each can give back to God in gratitude for this lifelong grace. We also thanked Steven for leading worship June 2nd when Pastor Carol became suddenly ill.
- 2. Pastor Jim had just returned from his 2 week Continuing Education trip with his seminary (Chicago), which visited ancient holy sites in Turkey (Asia Minor in the Bible) and Greece, including the island of Patmos in Greece and the 7 churches that John's vison in Revelation was written to. He was very moved to be able to see the places where the early Christian church began and where many references are made in the New Testament Epistles and the Book of Acts. He will be offering his travel reflections as the Zoom Bible Study beginning on Wed. July 10 at 11am and 7:30pm. He expressed deep gratitude to Kirk and Terri Adams and Gray Meeker for making it financially possible to attend with the other 43 students and alumni.
- 3. Judi and Robert Alvarado attended via Zoom in order to express their needs to restore some of the video coverage of Sunday worship after the Council removed one camera in response to a visitor feeling uncomfortable being publicly recorded. Council will make a decision at the next meeting.

I am writing this while in Trout Creek Montana visiting my parents. It is so wonderful to be here again after a whole year. It is cloudy and drizzly but I love to do my stitchery project and read while looking out at the beauty. It promises to warm up this week and I will get out into nature. I have to be careful though because black bears and mountain lions have been spotted on the property. To think that a few years ago I would walk all over by myself not considering that I might be approached. My family put a stop to that! Last year I attended a 2 hour class about bear safety at The Grange. I definitely do not want to have to try out the skills I learned!

In May, we honored 7 students who graduated. It was a special ceremony where each child was lifted up in their individuality and celebrated for what they have accomplished. We had so many people attend including my dear neighbors who are friends with Addison's family. My neighbor told me that he has never attended a graduation where each child is described and celebrated as their unique self, demonstrating that they were really seen. It was the ultimate compliment because this is exactly my goal each year; Seeing and teaching to each child's uniqueness to build a foundation that represents who they really are. They love receiving a children's bible, library bag, certificate, and a portfolio scrapbook with pictures and artwork. A memento I have been told that some like to enjoy at bedtime. You can read about each child on our display on the entrance board. The following are the expressions of one child's grandmother who enrolled her grandson. Other than his sister, he had few social engagements and had not attended preschool. They were worried because he was unhappy and lonely. He bloomed like a beautiful flower under our care. He is now cheerful, humorous, confident, energetic, and friendly with everyone! He will go to kindergarten with the tools he needs for learning and making friendships.

"Dear Kathy Brenda Sam and Rosio!

Our family is so thankful to your loving care, creativity, kindness and professionalism showered on our ***** this year. You truly have made a difference in his life that will indeed bring him into this world going forward with more confidence, happiness and success. I am saddened that he (we) are leaving you, but it is with knowing that he is ready to take on his next adventure. Love heals and God bless."

Additionally she wrote upon receiving his portfolio: "Hi Kathy, ***(His father) and I so appreciate the binder with ******'s progress. ***(His father) told me how impressed he was with it and me too! We agreed it is a keep-sake for ***** and look forward to sharing it with him when he is older."

This is why we do what we do. My teaching team, Brenda, Sam, and Rosio each have unique gifts to share with our students providing a well rounded experience. My favorites which remind me of my childhood and current interests that I share are: Pinecone turkeys, a full pumpkin pie, handprint wreaths on burlap for Christmas, silhouettes, gardening, Maypole, and teaching them how to sew by hand and machine! One child clamored for a year to get to sew. His father finally asked "when will he sew" because he couldn't stop talking about it. I replied, "Today, and he is first!"

I am resting all I can this summer. For all the joy there have been many challenges that required us to reinvent many things we do because of Covid, learning loss, and Universal preschool for 4 year olds. We have reduced to 16 students for summer which will allow me time to arrange Room 5 as a teacher resource room. I will organize my office and reduce to just the necessary paperwork. Curriculum will be tailored to a younger group, however, saving pre-kindergarten curriculum for those who stay until kindergarten. We worked very hard last year with 23 students requiring me to be in the classroom (You should see my office, yikes). The Schrafts have been so generous with their donations! My goal is to strive for balance and relevance towards a new beginning. It will be my twelfth year as your director. Thanks be to God!

"It takes more than meals to feed the world". ELCA World Hunger is a comprehensive and sustainable program that uses multiple strategies—<u>relief</u>, <u>development</u>, <u>education</u>, and <u>advocacy</u>—to address the root causes of hunger and poverty. We respond to neighbors around the corner and around the world. We respond to hunger and poverty in the U.S. and around the world by addressing root causes. People are connected to the resources they need to lift themselves out of poverty. **Between 70-75 % of funds are spent internationally, and 20-25 % are spent domestically.**

Together, in Christ's name, we experience the transforming power of connection. As individuals, congregations, and synods, our humble offerings and actions are gathered, blessed, and multiplied. Together, we are ELCA World Hunger.

Housing Matters is the largest nonprofit in S.C. County working exclusively on the issue of homelessness. We connect unhoused community members with housing. We run nine different programs carefully designed to connect people with housing. We end or prevent homelessness for over 300 people each year. And again, we're just one organization working on the issue in our county.

People are getting out of homelessness and into housing every. single. day. It takes a tremendous amount of work and support. And yet they're doing it. WE — as a community — are doing it. It's beautiful and inspiring and transformational.

Prayer Children for 2024 - Here's another look at the program from Steve Barrett of Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Salinas:

Since 2003, we have been connecting sponsors, from our 7 participating churches, and 120 children from the K-12th school in the rural commu-

nity of Guillermo Ungo in El Salvador, a community that was built from land provided to refugees and ex-combatants at the end of the civil war in 1992. The prayer child program uses the Sponsor's \$125 suggested donation to provide needed school supplies to the students and the school, plus a food basket for their families as well as a special gift (all purchased locally) for the students. In addition, sponsors and students exchange letters and photos and pray for each other. Strong relationships are often built as the students are encouraged in their lives and studies by their "padrinos" and "madrinas" and sponsors are inspired by the ability of their modest donations, prayers and efforts at communication to really make a difference in the lives of their students. Each year, on our delegations to El Salvador we have meals in the homes of the prayer children of all our delegates and witness the sincere appreciation expressed by the families and students in the gratitude, hospitality and kindness they share. It is really a delight to see the close friendships that have begun through the exchange of letters and quickly develop during our short trips.

A very dedicated local scholarship committee, consisting of teachers and parents, led by the excellent principal of the school, Maria Paz Asencio, works hard to select the students, monitor their eligibility, purchase the supplies and gifts and meets several times a year with the students and their parents (They also oversee our University Scholarship Program). We recently received the updated list of 120 students for 2024 from the committee and are looking for new sponsors for about 20 new children during the month of May. We would love to have sponsors for each student! So please consider sponsoring a child this year if you are not already doing so. You can choose the approximate age and the gender of the student you want to start a relationship with and your card/letter, donation and prayers will be of great support and encouragement to your "prayer child" and their education. Please contact either Jeanne or Kent if you want to have a prayer child of your own.
