It is never an easy thing to confront the difficult realities of our own lives, let alone the ones of an institution like our church, where so many for so long (70 years!) have poured out their hearts and faith and love and gifts to be a light to the Santa Cruz community, and a place that holds our dreams and visions for a better way of life.


Yet, Shelly took on that responsibility as we faced some of the deeper questions that come when the church's finances start to take some bigger hits which start to look unsustainable. She allowed God's Spirit to speak through her preparation and honesty and tears and vulnerability. It became almost a relief to see that she carried the burden for us about the difficult news and decisions we are beginning to turn toward. Thank you Shelly.

We are fortunate to be able to have such a large reserve that there is nothing imminent. Instead, we are able to take some time and look honestly at our congregation's sustainability in the next several years. That is the impetus behind the Council forming a new Long Range Planning Task Force to now carry the vision of what might be next in our story as St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Santa Cruz.

After listening closely in our Holy Conversations that were held in October leading up to our 70th Anniversary, we will now start to form some proposals about how we will respond to what has become an inevitable decline of churches like ours. Some who have agreed to serve on the Task Force have experienced first-hand what it is like when their church has had to close. So that kind of difficult reality will be a part of our vision for our future, in much the same way that we all will face such inevitabilities in our own lives.

At the same time, HERE WE ARE! There are powerful stories and possibilities that we will continue to lift up as we seek to always fulfill our mission. So there will be inclusion of what that means to us right alongside our facing a more uncertain future.

So, as always, please keep these efforts in your prayers as we all seek the best way to remain faithful given our post-pandemic circumstances and the massive cultural shifts we find ourselves in. I am actually looking forward to the ways that God's grace will surprise us along the way!



#### **COPA** Recent Actions

#### Santa Cruz County Canvassing on Measures K and L

On Feb. 16<sup>th</sup> COPA Leaders did canvassing on Measures K and L at the Beach Flats in Santa Cruz. Leaders continued to do canvassing work on Feb. 19<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Church Council / Annual Meeting Highlights**

(meets 2nd Tuesday at 6:30pm in the church or/and Zoom.)

- 1. Devotional time was spent in prayer as we offered our cries for God's help and mercy (Kyrie) and thanks and praise to God (Gloria), both in our lives and for the congregation.
- 2. We discussed the possibility of using "The Congregation in the Secular Age" by Dr. Andrew Root (Lutheran Seminary Professor) as a book study for the coming years devotions. We decided that this content was perhaps better used for the work of the Long Range Planning Task Force because it does a good job of helping to explain the decline we are experiencing and offers insight for how we can honestly face it.
- 3. The Long Range Planning Task Force consists of both people who were sought out and those who volunteered. They are Mark Linder, Steven Hendrickson, Jeanette Dawson, Doug Hahn, Tina Gates and Pastor Jim. They will begin to formulate a vision accompanied by specific proposals leading up to our next Annual Meeting. In particular, this is necessary because the 5 year agreement we came to regarding using up to \$25,000/year from the our \$1.4 million reserve, will expire. Beyond this, it will look to articulate some possible ways we may want to focus our efforts given the our state of numerical decline. Also, facility concerns that have been raised will be addressed. Please direct any ideas and thoughts you have to any of them.
- 4. Officers were elected as follows: President—Beth Stiles, V.P.—Steven Hendrickson, Secretary—Alyssa Burkhardt, Treasurer—Mark Linder. Installation took place in worship on Sunday, February 25th.

I find myself wondering at this time of year, is it really March? It seems like we just calmed down after the Christmas holidays to a regular schedule of activities. March is here indeed and today; the sunshine came with it. Rain is beautiful and necessary for our environment, however, too

many days cooped inside can become hectic for teachers of California children used to being outside. It also helps spread those germs more easily and often.

So let us rejoice as spring is coming, the sunshine is out, and we continue to plan for our activities up to Easter which is March 31st this year. We begin with Dr. Suess, reading his books of rhyme, and eating Green Eggs and Ham on his birthday March 2. This year the MMRR Circle will be supplying us with chocolate gold coins that we use to celebrate St. Patrick's Day which is March 17th. That is a Sunday so we will celebrate and discover shenanigans in the classroom on Monday March 18th. The snack will be Lucky Charms cereal.

Our Easter Egg Hunt will take place on Thursday March 28<sup>th</sup>, as most of our children attend that day. The following week we will be closed for Spring Break. If you would like to donate Easter candy for this event it would be appreciated. Please leave the candy in the **Narthex SSCDC donation crate by March 24<sup>th</sup>** so we know how much to purchase the following week.

Regarding donations, I would like to thank members who have donated their **Thrivent** money to the school. This helps us keep materials current and updated for our classroom and playground.

Inflation donation continues and we appreciate your donation of food and supplies such as Kleenex, Clorox wipes, medium Nitrile gloves, Kirkland/Costco baby wipes. Ritz, Keebler, and graham crackers, Goldfish, Pirate Booty, Cheerios cereal, and Kraft macaroni and cheese. Those are the basics of what we use. Kards for kids continues and our SSCDC envelopes are in the narthex on the volunteer sign up table. We are so grateful to have received gift cards from Safeway, Amazon, Costco, and Home Depot! Also, please donate buttons for sewing.

I was very excited to facilitate having our bathroom, kitchen, and hall-way floors cleaned in February. Barring the general wear and tear over the decades, rest assured that the floors are clean, waxed and/or sealed. We

will have the Fellowship Hall carpets cleaned during Spring Break after most of the rain has passed. It is nice to be able to take on some deep cleaning projects after having such a tight budget over the last few years as we recovered from our Covid budget.

It is your prayers and generosity that keep our little school thriving. As things are reducing around us, the love that you share for your preschool continues to grow bigger and touch the hearts of many. God has blessed our preschool over the years and continues.

We have 22 students, and they are full of energy and keep us on our toes. I will be sending out registration forms this month as we look forward to planning for next year. Universal Preschool will have a big impact on our next school year as we will have 6 students leaving for kindergarten, and 3-5 leaving for Universal Pre-kindergarten (UPK). That leaves us with 11 current students returning. We do have 5 on our list to enter the Toddler class in September, and 2 in January.

The enrollment amount will have to balance with how many teachers we will need, however, 4 of us is the best number for total coverage. We will have more children potty training and need coverage since the bathroom is not attached to Fellowship Hall or outside. We must stay at the legal ratio 1:12 for coverage while a teacher is in the bathroom with children. Also, we will have to look at our curriculum and facilities overall and change our expectations as we will be predominantly a school for two-year-olds, and three-year-olds turning four. We are still a child development center, but I may not be able to do my more advanced projects as I have my whole career with four-year-olds going on Five. I must admit I am mourning that a bit as that was my favorite age group to teach. Who knows, we may luck out and have some families enroll that prefer private to public Pre-kindergarten and continue having some in that age group. Only our Lord God knows the plan. I have faith that we will meet the challenge and forge ahead, especially if all of you are praying for us.

So let us return to the new hope of spring and the opportunities to enjoy our children while they are here as we garden, sew, learn, celebrate, and play together.



#### My Second Life By Beth T. Stiles, Council President

As Pastor Jim was installing the Church council I was daydreaming. 45 years ago I was in the in the hospital for 5 weeks and 2 days. During that time I did not realize that I was near death. I was so sick that I thought I saw God but not sure at age 19 years old. I had major surgery and a collapsed lung. I had a chest tube in my left side. I said to God if you get me over this illness I will do your work for you. After getting over surgery and the collapsed lung I received a diploma from high school and a certificate in Early Childhood Education. After many different jobs and self employment I found my niche helping people with disabilities.

As I take this leadership advocacy course I will be learning how to advocate for you AND people with disabilities.

From Steven Hendrickson, A Book Preview:

#### "The Congregation in a Secular Age: Keeping Sacred Time against the Speed of Modern Life"

By Andrew Root, Baker Academic Books

A number of ELCA parishes are abuzz with this groundbreaking study of exactly the times we are living in. An effort to share the contents of this book will be offered to the St. Stephen's Long Range Strategic Planning Task Force. In this first installment of a series of articles, a synopsis or overview is given. The ideas expressed here are of the author Andrew Root, a Lutheran theologian.

A dominant feature of today's world is the pervasive impact of technology and an acceleration of the speed of time. We are being asked to do much more in less time. Keeping up with email is a good example of this. Speed and innovation is a constant demand. Most of us cannot keep up because of the impossible rate of speed. A general malaise and chronic depression result, and according to Root, is a common feature in many congregations. Leaders feel great pressure to implement change and develop innovative programming. This demand is asked of parishioners who are already stressed out with the demands of life. Locally for instance, many people need to work very long hours just to keep up with the expense of living here, As we see our numbers decline, we are already exhausted! In this text, Andrew Root names three essential realities and then attempts to explain their implications and explore possible solutions:

- 1. The increase of speed in which society is moving and changing.
- 2. The decreasing rate of decay or the time it takes for something to become obsolete.
- 3. The loss of communal identity that results in a freedom of expression. One must curate a personal self that is always relevant, changing, and innovative. Root contends that this is an idolization of self that leads to exhaustion.

Pastor Jim and I will be working together to present these ideas and how we at St. Stephens can respond to the congregation through the Task Force, Church Council and these columns in our newsletter. We pray for love through being filled through God's Spirit, and a humble resolve to move forward together.


#### **Easter Lilies**


