This is one of reasons I started my advocacy business. My volunteer work started in the church. As a member, I have been a part of many different committees at church (throughout my life). Then I was elected to the Church Council. I watched the previous President, and I wondered if I could do the job. As I looked at the Council, I thought about each person (becoming President) When it came to me, I thought, with help, I could do the job. Then afterwards, Pastor Jim said that I was the first Council President that had a disability in (our) church.

From Pastor Jim: We are truly blessed that Beth serves as our President. She brings an entirely different perspective as someone living with the disability of cerebral palsy—one that connects us closely with the 3 year ministry of Jesus Christ. She inspires us all to offer our gifts to God through our church. Thank you Beth!

From Pastor Jim

I have really been enjoying sharing my
Continuing Education trip to Turkey and Greece
with my seminary—the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. Each
Wednesday at 11am and 7:30pm on Zoom, I've been able to re-live this
trip of a lifetime led by 2 wonderful professors Rev. Dr. Barbara Rossing
(New Testament) and Dr. Esther Monn (Old Testament)

(New Testament) and Dr. Esther Menn (Old Testament).

It made a very powerful impact on me to be able to trace some of the earliest known expressions of our Christian faith as we visited places where our ancestors gathered and began to share with the world this new way of Jesus Christ. It is amazing that even today, 2000 years later, we are still uncovering and learning new things about the beginnings of the Christian church. To sing and pray and reflect on our faith in these same places where the Body of Christ began to live as the church, deeply connected us all to our calling to follow Christ and lead God's people in the church today.

It was especially meaningful to be reminded that these hallowed ancestors, like Paul and John, were just regular human beings like you and I, and yet look at all the ways in which they were able to provide so

much for so many over 2 millenia.

Recently, one of these more recent ancestors of mine, Rev. Gerald O. Pedersen, was lifted up in our Synod as he claimed his baptismal promises at 99 yrs and 11.5 months old. Pastor Gerry was one of my early mentors as I served as a Youth Minister with him for 3 years at Mount of Olives Lutheran, Mission Viejo. A regular old son of Danish immigrants to the Midwest, he was one of the last surviving navy veterans to have been present at the WWII surrender of the Japanese on the USS Missouri as a 19 year old. After the horrific nuclear bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the words of Gen. Douglas MacArthur that day, to now build a "world founded upon faith and understanding, a world dedicated to the dignity of man and the fulfillment of his most cherished with for freedom, tolerance and justice." propelled Gerry into ordained ministry.

Fulfilling that kind of Christian calling often led him to be called too controversial and offensive as he confronted our society's proclivity for war and military spending, especially. But he will always serve as a faithful beacon for this pastor and the Christian church, to stay dedicated to the truth of God's ways of peace and justice for the least in our world.

Church Council / Annual Meeting Highlights

- We held a Zoom meeting due to Covid, and devotions were led by our Secretary Alyssa. They reminded us of how God's grace and Spirit is present with us throughout our lives—even and perhaps especially when we may feel distant from God.
- 2. Pastor Jim reported that he is giving more time to our Lutheran Campus Ministry effort as the Chair of the Board. It is going through a major transition as Rev. Paul Larson, Cal Sate University Monterey Bay & Good Shepherd—Salinas announced he will be moving away in September as he takes a call to be pastor of a congregation in Carson City, Nevada. Also Rev. Jon Perez, Chaplain at CSUMB and Epiphany Episcopal/Lutheran—Monterey announced his retirement for June 2025. At the same time, our UCSC joint ministry with the LCMS will be coming to an end at the end of 2024. This was necessary due to the way the ELCA now provides funding for Campus Ministry. It no longer comes through the Synod, but directly from the ELCA Churchwide office which requires us to fund only ELCA efforts or those shared with our Full Communion denominational partners like Episcopal, Presbyterian etc.. So things at UCSC will be undergoing a redevelopment where we will form a new vision for what is possible now. We are very grateful for the many years that Messiah Lutheran (LCMS) has served as host of this ministry—both their facility and staff/ pastors—particularly Rev. Rick Rice, who will continue in this role until the end of the year.
- 3. The Long Range Task Force is finalizing their proposal to the Council for compensation for pastoral leadership for the next 5 years. The congregation will vote on this at our next Annual Meeting on January 26.

Greetings from Seattle airport on my way back to Montana (August 20). In June, I was exhausted and looking forward to summer rest. **Our teaching team is so excel-**

lent that I was able to really heal and revitalize this summer, taking enough time to feel balanced. I wasn't expecting to see my mom again this summer and I am so grateful to return and enjoy beautiful Montana and her.

In August, we bid farewell to Jade, Lily, Sienna, and James as they left for public Universal preschool. This means we had 10 children leave our program this year. As of today we are enrolling 6 new students, all but one are 2 years old. This is a much younger school now. I was able to rearrange some of the materials to make our classrooms better prepared for this younger group. We are looking forward to seeing how this next group develops. In the beginning it might be challenging with so many new children in the resting room especially, but somehow we always make it through and children thrive.

Now I will share a cute community story with you. Two of our children went to the same school in Soquel for TK. They went to morning day-care first, then had to find their way to the classroom. One of them was a bit tender about it. They saw each other and took each other's hand and walked to class together. It made all of the difference! So sweet. I ran into one of them at the Dollar Store. He was often shy and reluctant as he was especially attached to his parents. This child was happy, smiling, and sharing the great things about his new school. This is what our job is at SSCDC: fostering caring, kindness, and confidence so that children can go out in the world and find their next place to thrive.

I would like to thank Sandra Eldridge for her 6 years of volunteer service to our school board. Her advice and wisdom was greatly appreciated. She is a wonderfully supportive person of whom I truly appreciate! We are looking to recruit another member. If you are interested, please contact Bill Schraft or Kathy. The commitment is mostly Zoom meetings the 4th Monday of each month. Most of our building is done,

but the support and fellowship is so helpful to keeping our school supported with talented and caring minds who share.

Moving forward with our school board, I especially appreciate the devotions when Pastor Jim incorporates perfect reflections and verses in support of our mission and ministry at the preschool. I welcome Bill (President) and Margaret (Recorder) Schraft, and member Barbara Johnston who continue to serve. I am especially grateful for Kathy Allen, our treasurer. Her commitment and support has brought me great comfort and thrills as we have created our third annual budget together! This has helped realize the best balance between size of school and quality of care. This year a little less is more as we guide a very young group.

Congratulations to Teacher Sam who was accepted to nursing school. She will remain with us part time and we are so thankful for that!

SSCDC Benevolence month is in October. Kards for Kids (Safeway, Costco, Amazon) and Inflation Donation (Mac & cheese, Ritz & Graham crackers, Clorox cleaning wipes, Costco baby wipes, Kleenex, and frozen Chicken Dinosaurs) are still our fundraisers for this school year. Your generosity collectively helped us create a rainy day fund and proceed with confidence as we transitioned through summer. Every penny makes a difference and we appreciate you!

I look forward to working another year with John Hopping who is so helpful to our school! I also can't wait to ride on Leslie's endless energy and enthusiasm for our church and children. She truly cares and I love working with her. May the Holy Spirit inspire Pastor Jim as he shepherds us through another year. May Gary find inspiration as he creates music for us. Who else will step forward and stand out with their time and talents this year? I see those out there supporting our church, and appreciate all the efforts of time and talent. We are small but loyal and mighty.

May the peace of our Lord rest in all of us as we worship together and support another group of children in our preschool ministry.


Hygiene Items Needed!

Romans 12:4


As all of us are very well aware, there is a crisis of sustainability in our world. Spiritual, cultural, political, and economic realms; and all of our earthly environment are in imminent danger of massive negative changes. Many institutions, families, and life itself are at a major inflection point. We cry out to God, "How long?" and "What are we to do?" The above verses written by Paul may offer humanity a way to center themselves in God, if viewed in a personal and macro view.

The first verse addresses the major need for a change in how we think, relate, and treat one another. Our shared history and personal inclinations are clearly not working, needing a profound transformation. By being renewed with an "experience of God in Christ," new pathways and Godly discernment are available to all. Remember, we need to see this in terms of a personal and enlarged view of our oneness with all of creation This is happening now and has always been in existence. The change that is needed is to move from "knowing about God" to an experience of Presence within our hearts and all of creation. This knowing of God present in everyone and everything was much stronger from the days of Christ until the sixteenth century when science, rationality and consumerism changed the overall thought process of the world.

The second verse refers to the many God given gifts that we have to share with one another and an interdependent world. As beings who experience God in many different traditions and cultures, we can grasp God's love in Christ in a beautiful tapestry of colors, customs, and infinite demonstrations of grace care, and compassion. As was stated above, we benefit most when enlarging our view to encompass all of creation, and what our individual contribution is.

This short and incomplete explication of these verses are offered as "starting" or "seed thoughts." As we surrender ourselves to God's love, asking for insight and direction, we then act as disciples of Christ.

(First Tuesday of the month)



Thirty Years and Counting! Santa Cruz al Salvador (SCaS) is celebrating thirty years of accompaniment with communities in rural El Salvador with a special event at Watsonville Public House, Saturday Septem-

ber 21 from 2-4 pm. This Public House is a nonprofit, community brewery and an outreach of the Presbyterian Church that is run

by minister/brewmaster, Robby Olson. It is also dog friendly!
We will also have a special guest, Joseph Russ, a Presbyterian Mission Worker living in El Salvador and studying migration in the Northern Triangle of Central America. Our delegations have really enjoyed meeting with Joseph the last couple of years and learning about his mission to create a plan for immigration that works for everyone. A \$30 ticket to this special event will include one glass of beer, wine, cider or sparkling water and lots of delicious hors d'oeuvres. Proceeds from this event will go toward water and sanitation projects in our communities.

At the recent SCaS Board retreat, Kent Madsen shared some memories from those early trips to El Salvador as we reflected on the changes that have occurred there-and how we might continue to be helpful and relevant in 2024 and the future. While much has changed, it continues to be a challenge for students to receive a quality education in rural communities and the government does little to provide basics such as composting latrines and water in homes - more than a third of homes in rural communities do not yet have water piped to their homes and most that do only have running water a few hours a week to fill their pilas or barrels.

There is growing concern for human rights and environmental abuses and while this is not specifically our mission, we will continue to spend time on our November 18-26 El Salvador delegation studying these issues and understanding the current reality in El Salvador. Yes, we need to examine what we are doing in our lives and missions to make sure we are still effective and relevant, but also recognize the special opportunity God has given us with each trusting and loving relationship with which we are blessed.

There are still opportunities to become a prayer child sponsor for children in our communities. An annual donation of \$125 can provide great encouragement and tangible support for individual students and for the school in Guillermo Ungo that we are so privileged to accompany. 
